



### Planting Trees

Recently I was on the campus once again of Freed-Hardeman University in Henderson, Tennessee. A striking new tower has been erected in a prominent spot on the grounds. It is very attractive to look at and the striking of the bell lends a pleasant sound to the activities of the campus.

On the base of the tower are some

plaques and engravings which are mostly of historical significance regarding the university. However, on one corner of the base is an engraving that immediately caught my attention, one that is not directly related to the others. It read:

"The true meaning of life is to plant trees, under whose shade you do not expect to sit." (Nelson Henderson)

I initially assumed that Nelson Henderson was associated historically with the city of Henderson, but my limited research found no connection at all. Rather, the statement was selected for its wisdom instead of because of who wrote or said it.

Mr. Henderson's statement definitely is appropriate in relation to trees. Most trees that ultimately provide much shade require many years to reach the degree of maturity which enables them to do that. The one who plants such trees seldom has the pleasure of partaking of the shade that is later made available. The planting was still a deed of wisdom, of unselfishness, of thoughtfulness, and generosity. There wouldn't be nearly as much shade to enjoy and benefit from if we all had to produce all of our own shade. It's good to be self-sufficient, but we don't have the capability to

be totally self-sufficient...we all benefit from the contributions of others, including those who have gone before us.

While this is certainly not a biblical quotation, it reflects a principle that is prominent in the Scriptures and is very much in keeping with God's will for all of His people throughout our sojourn here. The Bible is full of admonitions for us to provide for ourselves and our families, but that isn't all. We are taught again and again to be mindful of the welfare of others in general, and to be ready to get beyond ourselves in doing good, as Paul teaches in Galatians 6:9,10, "And let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those who are of the household of faith."

Rather than "planting trees" only for our own personal benefit in our own lifetime, as God's people, we must grow to the point that we are more aware of what we can do that will benefit others, even in the years to come. God made it possible for Solomon to have the wisdom to recognize and point out to the rest of us that "There is one who makes himself rich, yet has nothing; and one who makes himself poor, yet has great riches" (Proverbs 13:7). The point seems to be that giving of oneself for the benefit of others can be enriching to the giver in ways unexpected and unintended.

Being parents and grandparents is not always an easy assignment, but those who take their task seriously try diligently to subscribe to the advice of Proverbs 22:6 – "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." We understand that this is a "proverb," which means that it is generally true that a child who has received godly training and parenting will turn out to be an adult who honors and obeys his/her parents and the Heavenly Father. I would suggest that such training is a form of "planting trees" with the future in mind.

Just think what could happen in our congregations if the current members, and especially those in positions of leadership, would give serious study and attention to what could and should be done in an effort to result in the those congregations being spiritually strong and a force for good. Such spiritual "tree planting" would greatly enhance the body of Christ right now, but in addition to that, there could be positive carryover effects being evidenced even in the coming decades.

There is a poem entitled The Bridge Builder. It tells of an old man building a bridge over a deep chasm, not for himself, but for a youngster who would be passing that way and would need the bridge to get across the chasm.

### The Bridge Builder

An old man, going a lone highway,
Came at the evening cold and gray
To a chasm vast and deep and wide
Through which was flowing a swollen tide.
The old man crossed in the twilight dim;
The rapids held no fears for him.
But he turned when safe on the other side
And built a bridge to span the tide.

"Old man," cried a fellow pilgrim near,
"You're wasting your time in building here.
Your journey will end with the closing day;
You never again will pass this way.
You have crossed the chasm deep and wide;
Why build you this bridge at even-tide?"

### Christ Is the *Only* Way

The Bible plainly declares that Jesus is the only way to God. For example, in Acts 4:12, "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." In today's pluralistic society this sentiment is not politically correct. Men

would like to believe that all religions are okay; they are just different ways to reach heaven. To them, it seems very arrogant for anyone to claim absolute truth. In general, men think God is so kind and loving that He will save everyone who is a good person or tries to follow whatever way he thinks is best for him. Many think they do not need a Savior because they can save themselves when the time comes, if they will need saving. It seems foolish to believe that someone else can or should save us. Naturally, pride is the root cause of this attitude.

We also must realize that Christianity is not the only religion to declare exclusivity. We are all aware of Islam's claim to be the only true religion and that Mohammad is the only true prophet of God. According to its proponents, the sole proof of that is the Koran, but one must read it in the original language to see it, and anyone who does not believe it should be punished.

Hindus claim to accept *all religions*, but only if you accept their claim that *true religion* is *a blending of all religions*. They are uncompromising on a few things, such as karma and reincarnation. They also often persecute those who do not practice their religion, such as is going on in India now.

On the other hand, Christianity is tolerant of other religions, even if we do not recognize their legitimacy, and we do not persecute those who believe differently. Almost all cultures have believed there is something better after this life, and throughout the history of the world, there have been many teachers who said that they had found a way to that eternal bliss. Jesus is not the first to declare His ability to show the way to heaven. What makes His claim more credible than the claims of so many others?

Jesus proved His teachings to be true by the miracles that He performed. He said in John 5:36, "But I have a greater witness than John's; for the works which the Father has given me to finish — the very works that I do — bear witness of Me, that the Father has sent Me." He further said in John 10:25, "The works that I do in my Father's name, they bear witness of Me." These miracles were so convincing that even His enemies could not deny that great miracles had been performed. The greatest miracle of all, and the most persuasive proof of Jesus' divinity is His resurrection. Of course, many still do not believe this, but the historical evidence for this miracle is very persuasive, if one will take the time to open mindedly consider it. If the resurrection is true, this prevents us from also accepting other religions as equally true, because Jesus would be the only Divine Being sent from God. On the other hand, if the resurrection is not true, then we cannot accept Christianity as equally good among all religions, because Christ would be the greatest liar and deceiver to ever walk the earth.

Jesus is the only way, because He shows us the Father. "He who believes in Me, believes not in Me but in Him who sent Me. And he who sees Me sees Him who sent Me" (John 12:44,45). Only Jesus can show us the Father, because He is God. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.... And the Word became flesh and dwelt among men" (John 1:1,14). Others cannot show us God, because they have never seen Him. At best, they can only show us what they think God is.

Jesus is the only way because He opened the way to God. "Therefore, brethren, having boldness to enter the Holiest by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way which He consecrated for us, through the veil, that is, His flesh" (Hebrews 10:19,20). Jesus opened or made the way to reach God. He not only opened the way, but He helps us walk the way to God. No one else claims to have made the way or to help us walk the way. They only claim to show us the way; however, since they never walked the way

before, how do we know they reached what they were intending? Their bodies are still in their graves!

Jesus is the author and finisher of our faith (Hebrews 12:2). He and His resurrection provide the only hope for the world. If that is true, why doesn't everyone accept Him? Why are so many devoted to other religions?

While there are probably several reasons, one major obstacle is the demand of Christ, that we come to Him in total submission! Other religions basically tell us to pull ourselves up and save ourselves. There is no Savior, as such, in Hinduism or Buddhism or Islam. Followers of those religions must depend on their own works to save them. This feeds into the pride of humans, as mentioned earlier.

On the other hand, Christ tells us that we can't pull ourselves up. He said in John 15:5, "Without Me, you can do nothing." Paul said that we were all once helpless in sin: "For when we were still without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly" (Romans 5:6).

If we want to be saved, we must depend on Christ, and that dependence involves a total commitment to Him. Romans 12:1,2 defines the degree to which we must submit ourselves to God: "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God."

How do we come to God? "How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach unless they are sent? As it is written: 'How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the gospel of peace, who bring glad tidings of good things!' But they have not all obeyed the gospel. For Isaiah says, 'Lord, who has believed our report?' So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.

Any time one demands total commitment, there will be resistance. Do you resist the truth? Do you resist committing to Christ? Truly there is salvation in no other. Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:6).

## Ascension of Jesus Christ

Comparatively speaking, the Bible treats the Ascension of Christ less often in its pages than several other Christian doctrines. Yet, many biblical passages are more or less dependent upon and imply the Ascension of Christ. Irrespective of the amount of space dedicated to the Ascension of our Lord in the

Bible, it is a crucial and cardinal doctrine of Christianity. For instance, the Ascension of Jesus Christ enabled Him to act as Intercessor ("It is Christ who died, and furthermore is also risen, who is even at the right hand of God, who also makes intercession for us." Romans 8:34), Mediator ("For there is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus," 1 Timothy 2:5) and Advocate ("My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous." 1 John 2:1) for Christians before Almighty God. In addition, note: "The spiritual value of the Ascension lies, not in Christ's physical remoteness, but in His spiritual nearness. He is free from earthly limitations, and His life above is the promise and guarantee of ours" (ISBE).

### The Ascension Defined

The Ascension of Jesus Christ is "...his visible passing from earth to heaven in the presence of his disciples, on the Mount of Olives, forty days after the resurrection..." (McClintock and Strong). Three accounts of the occurrence of the Ascension appear in the New Testament. "So then, after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God" (Mark 16:19 NKJV). "And He led them

out as far as Bethany, and He lifted up His hands and blessed them. Now it came to pass, while He blessed them, that He was parted from them and carried up into heaven" (Luke 24:50,51).

"Now when He had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up, and a cloud received Him out of their sight. And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as He went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel, who also said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven.' Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey" (Acts 1:9-12).

The Incarnation through the Virgin Birth was the mechanism by which Jesus Christ came to earth. Conversely, the Ascension was the instrument by which Jesus Christ transferred from this terrestrial sphere to the celestial realm.

There is just not much information in the New Testament respecting the activity of the Ascension. While conversing with His apostles atop Mount Olivet, our Lord arose into the air and continued to rise until the clouds concealed Him. Two angels nearby on the mountain informed the disciples that one day Jesus Christ would return in similar manner as He departed (Acts 1:11). "Behold, He is coming with clouds, and every eye will see Him, even they who pierced Him. And all the tribes of the earth will mourn because of Him. Even so, Amen" (Revelation 1:7).

### **Prior Ascensions**

The Old Testament records two ascensions respectively of prophets of God, though unlike Jesus, they did not die and resurrect from the dead prior to their ascensions. The first of the two references lacks any elaboration. "And Enoch walked with God; and he was not, for God took him" (Genesis 5:24). A New Testament passage corroborates Enoch's ascension. "By faith Enoch was taken away so that he did not see death, 'and was not found, because God had taken him'; for before he was taken he had this testimony, that he pleased God" (Hebrews 11:5-6).

Then, 2 Kings 2:1-18 chronicles the ascension of the prophet Elijah. Unlike the information pertaining to the ascension of Enoch, an elaborate description — painting a vivid picture in the human mind — depicts

Elijah's ascension. The fanfare with which Elijah climbed into sky was more flamboyant than Jesus' ascent into the heavens. "Then it happened, as they continued on and talked, that suddenly a chariot of fire appeared with horses of fire, and separated the two of them; and Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven" (2 Kings 2:11). The common factor in the three ascensions was the removal of the prophets and Jesus Christ from the earth to heaven.

### **Predictions of the Ascension of Christ**

Predictions or prophecies of the Ascension of Christ appear in the Old Testament as well as in the New Testament. For instance, one learns from Acts 2 that Psalm 110 pertained to the Ascension of our Lord. Part of the first recorded Gospel sermon strings together the death of Christ (Acts 2:23), His resurrection (Acts 2:24-31) and Christ's Ascension (Acts 2:32-36).

"This Jesus God has raised up, of which we are all witnesses. Therefore being exalted to the right hand of God, and having received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit, He poured out this which you now see and hear. 'For David did not ascend into the heavens, but he says himself: "The Lord said to my Lord, 'Sit at My right hand, Till I make Your enemies Your footstool." Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ." (Acts 2:32-36; cf., Psalm 110:1-7)

Furthermore, Jesus Christ repeatedly advised His disciples that eventually He would ascend and not be with them personally anymore. "...because I go to My Father and you see Me no more" (John 16:10). Doubtless, since they had never observed an ascension before or anything comparable to it, they were as puzzled about the Ascension of Christ beforehand as they were about other matters, such as the nature of Christ's kingdom (Acts 1:6).

Consider these utterances of Christ to His disciples about the impending Ascension. "What then if you should see the Son of Man ascend where He was before?" (John 6:62). "And I, if I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all peoples to Myself" (John 12:32). "You have heard Me say to you, 'I am going away and coming back to you.' If you loved Me, you would rejoice because I said, 'I am going to the Father,' for My Father

is greater than I" (John 14:28). "Then some of His disciples said among themselves, 'What is this that He says to us, A little while, and you will not see Me; and again a little while, and you will see Me'; and, 'because I go to the Father'?" (John 16:17). "I came forth from the Father and have come into the world. Again, I leave the world and go to the Father" (John 16:28). "Jesus said to her, 'Do not cling to Me, for I have not yet ascended to My Father; but go to My brethren and say to them, I am ascending to My Father and your Father, and to My God and your God'" (John 20:17).

### **Allusions to the Ascension of Christ**

The New Testament freely refers to Jesus Christ being in heaven, which is the consequence of His Ascension. Some passages say in so many words that Jesus Christ has ascended into heaven (Ephesians 4:8-10; 1 Timothy 3:16). Other, indirect references imply that the Ascension has taken place since Jesus Christ is in heaven now. "For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Philippians 3:20). "Now this is the main point of the things we are saying: We have such a High Priest, who is seated at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in the heavens" (Hebrews 8:1). "Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:2). "He who descended is also the One who ascended far above all the heavens, that He might fill all things" (Ephesians 4:10). See also Acts 3:21; Ephesians 1:20; 1 Thessalonians 4:16; Hebrews 1:3; 9:24; 1 Peter 3:22.

### **Summary**

The Ascension of Christ is so much more than merely moving His habitation from the earth to heaven. First, the Ascension provided an explanation of the whereabouts of the resurrection Lord. Secondly, the Ascension was Christ's grand entry back into heaven and the signal of the commencement of the next phase in the ongoing ministry of Jesus Christ relative to the salvation of human souls.

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### The Providence of God

We have heard it said that the word "providence" is not in the Bible, and that it is simply a word that we use to describe a miracle. We believe that is an inaccurate statement for the following reasons. In Acts 24:2 we find, "Tertullus began his accusation, saying: 'Seeing that through you we enjoy great peace, and prosperity is being brought to this nation by your foresight..." The same Greek word is used in Romans 13:14 and is translated "provision". "But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill its lusts." So when we find God or any person making provision for a person or an event, it is "providence".

In Genesis 22:8 we find, "And Abraham said, 'My son, God will provide for Himself the lamb for a burnt offering.' So the two of them went together." The word "provide" is from the Hebrew "raah" and indicates that God will see it, or see to it that it happens. It is used in various ways in the Old Testament, but one of the meanings, according to Brown, Driver, and Briggs' Hebrew lexicon, is "to regard, to look after, to see after," which is what we mean by "providential care".

In Psalm 78:20, we find, "Behold, He struck the rock, so that the waters gushed out, and the streams overflowed. Can He give bread also? Can He provide meat for His people?" The word "provide" is from the Hebrew "kuwn" and is translated various ways, including "to make provision for," which is what we mean by "providence". Whether it was by a miracle, or in some other way, God promised to make provision for His people, and it was a general word that referred to provision, whether by man or by God.

In Genesis 50:20 we find Joseph saying, "But as for you, you meant evil against me; but God meant it for good, in order to bring it about as it is this day, to save many people alive." When he said, "God meant," the word "meant" is from the Hebrew "chashab", which involves planning ahead, and is translated "forecast" at least

twice in the Old Testament. It is translated "purpose" in such passages as Jeremiah 36:3, "It may be that the house of Judah will hear all the adversities which I purpose to bring upon them, that everyone may turn from his evil way, that I may forgive their iniquity and their sin."

So when God purposes, plans ahead for something to happen, in His "providence" He will provide for it to happen. That is why the word "provide" and "providence" are from the same root word, and there are various words in the Bible to show that God will provide for, or providentially care for, His people. He may do this in a miraculous way, as when He provided manna in the wilderness, or in a non-miraculous way, as when He provided for Joseph in the pit, or Moses in the ark in the river.

It is not correct to say that providence and miraculous works are the same, even though God may in His providence (purpose and care) use a miracle to accomplish His ultimate purpose. Perhaps an example would be in the plagues in Egypt. It was a *miracle* that God sent the locusts in the way He did, but it was a *natural event* that the locusts would eat the vegetation. In the providence of God, and within the laws of nature, He causes it to *rain* on the just and unjust (Matthew 5:45), but *the flood* in Noah's case was miraculous, for God went beyond *the natural course of events* to provide the flood. God providentially took care of Noah and his family, but God did not build the ark Himself, nor did He put those eight souls and all the animals into the ark miraculously, for they could just walk on board.

In Matthew 27:45 we find, "Now from the sixth hour until the ninth hour there was darkness over all the land." God could have, in His providence, had the death of Christ to have been timed when darkness would naturally have occurred. If that had been the case, those standing around would not have known for sure whether or not God had anything special to do with it. However, since the Passover is celebrated at the full moon, when the moon is opposite the sun, the darkness that covered the land during those three hours of Christ's suffering on the cross was doubtless a miraculous event, for it could not have been an eclipse of the sun.

We have tried to distinguish between the miraculous and providential by showing that the *miracles* as they were performed in the Scripture were mostly done as evidence or signs of the power of God and could be recognized as such, because they were an obvious overruling of the laws of nature. On the other hand, *a providential act* would be one in which God is operating "behind the scenes", so to speak, without anyone knowing that He had anything to do with the outcome.

Today, anything out of the ordinary or unexpected is proclaimed by many to be "a miracle", but the age of God proving a new messenger or a new message by the use of miracles is over. This is, in reality, the age of "providential care". So, although we should not speak of providence and miracles as if they were the same, it is true that God can make things happen without humans being aware that He had anything to do with it.

### Providence or Miracles?

The age of revealing a new doctrinal message from God through an inspired prophet, and of confirming both through *miracles*, ended with the completion of the New Testament. God's work today is no less powerful, but it is through His *providential* use of the countless tools available to Him.

### For instance:

- ◆ American Christians supported a missionary in Malaysia.
- ◆ An Indian air controller was in Yangon and met an air controller there.
- ◆ A **Bible course** from the missionary in Malaysia was discussed.
- ◆ The **Burmese man** took the course. The **missionary** came to Burma and taught him and his **family** further, baptizing them, the beginning of the church in **Yangon**.
- ♦ A man from west Burma brought his son to Yangon for medical treatment. Literature from east India had resulted in congregations being started in west Burma. Through a west Burma Christian who had attended a Bible school in Madras, India, knowledge of the Yangon church was shared, so contact was made. Ultimately, working together among themselves and with numerous American Christians, a Bible school was started in Yangon. Churches now exist in many parts of that Buddhist/communist nation. Count up the tools/people/miles involved in this great providential work of God and He did it without a single miracle!



### The Cleft of the Rock

Each year more than one-half million visitors pass through the "cleft of the rock" on foot, riding camels, or Arabian horses to enter the ancient capital city of the Nabataeans. Dating back to more than 300 years B.C. is the rock city of "Petra", sometimes referred to as "Rose City" because of the rose coloration of the rock formations. Petra was located

on the trade route from Palestine, and all parts northward, to Egypt. It was known for its secure surroundings, located in the midst of arid and remote acreage of stone formations.

The city was used for securing possessions of wealthy people and companies. Due to its location, being at the bottom of a chasm opened by an earthquake many years ago, having limbs reaching in different directions, it was virtually impenetrable. There was only one entrance, that being through the "siq" or "the shaft," a deep cut in red sandstone, creating virtually a box canyon. The city had chiseled in the stone walls, buildings with fascia carvings, used for storage of treasury, with tombs located in the upper regions of the chasm. It had an altar (the high place) atop the stone walls for offering sacrifices. The Nabataeans

transported and stored wealth for a fee. They used their rock house as security for those valuables, being guarded by soldiers at the entrance and stationed atop the rim of the gorge.

A far greater "place" of security is provided by God for those who belong to Him. Moses requested of God, "Please, show me Your glory." God said, "Here is a place by Me, and you shall stand on the rock. So it shall be, while My glory passes by, that I will put you in the cleft of the rock, and will cover you with My hand while I pass by." (Exodus 33:21,22). There are numerous passages in the Bible where people fled to the "cleft of the rock" for safety and protection (e.g., Judges 15:8; Song of Solomon 2:14; Isaiah 2:21; 7:19).

Though God kept His hand over Moses' face as He passed by, Moses declared His greatness from the cleft of the rock. Neither he, nor we, could actually look upon God and live (Exodus 33:20), so the nearest we can come to God's awesome works and presence is to be in the cleft of the rock. God, like the Nabataeans, has hidden His beloved people in a secure and safe place, near to His comings and goings so we, His servants, can enjoy His presence.

Could there be an application to our being in the church of our Lord? The church was described in prophecy as being a stone that fell out of the mountain not cut out by men's hands (Daniel 2:34). We are further told that "All spiritual blessing are in Christ" (Ephesians 1:3). The way into Christ is by baptism (Romans 6:3; Galatians 3:27). Those who were baptized in Acts 2 were "added to the church" (verse 47). We conclude that those who were baptized were inducted into the Lord's church and became a part of that "rock" spoken of by Daniel where the glory of God is realized.

Symbolically speaking, reference is made to a "rock" where we find protection, stability, and foundation. It was from a rock that God provided water for His thirsting children in the wilderness (Exodus 17:6). Jesus was referred to as a "spiritual Rock" that followed the Israelites in the wilderness, from which they drank (1 Corinthians 10:4). Peter was referred to as "Petros" with a masculine gender use in

Matthew 16:18. The Lord addressed the man Peter and then declared that upon the confession of the truth of His Sonship with God, Christ would build His church.

A feminine use of "Petra" referenced the truth that Peter declared: the truth that Jesus was the Son of God, which was the foundational rock sturdy enough to uphold the church. Jesus promised, "Upon this 'rock' I will build My church." Just an interesting notation: most of the translations do not capitalize "rock" in that it refers to Peter's rock solid confession about Jesus' identity.

Truth is viewed as "rock" in the story of the wise and foolish builders. It was the wise man who built his house upon a "rock" that can withstand the eroding influences of sin, error, and worldliness (Luke 6:48). Yet another rock is introduced to the Gentiles and unbelievers, by referring to Jesus as a "stumbling stone" and "rock of offence" (Romans 9:33). Hope was given by saying that "...whoever believes on Him will not be put to shame." The offensive Rock in the passage is Jesus.

The conclusion leads us to believe that that which pertains to God and provides spiritual, foundational, eternal, and unmovable benefits is that cleft rock in which we can abide that is so much "higher than I", from which we can see the glory of God!

# OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH THE HOLY SPIRIT

Read Text: Ephesians 3:14-19: "For this reason I bow my knees

to the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, from whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, that He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might through His Spirit in the inner man, that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the width and length and depth and height — to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

"'Spirit, come into the body of this young man!' demanded the preacher as he laid his hands on my head. He had been speaking in an unknown tongue for at least thirty minutes. Several other people in the room were praying and shouting to the Lord. All at once, my eyelids began to flutter and my lips started to tremble. I became aware of the presence of the Lord upon my face. Then I saw a dry riverbed. I walked to the middle of the riverbed and looked upstream. I noticed a small pool of fresh water. Then the water began to foam and bubble. All of a sudden, it gushed down the path of the riverbed straight toward me. As the rushing water reached me I heard myself uttering some sounds I had never uttered before. I knew that these sounds did not originate in me, though they were coming out of me. Great joy overwhelmed me and I began jumping up and down and hugging everyone in the room. I had received the Holy Spirit!"

Do not be alarmed; this story is not about me and is not true. But there are many people in the world who believe that this is the way to receive the Holy Spirit. Many people seek such an experience. And then there are those who do not even have a clue as to what the Holy Spirit is, much less how to receive Him. When I was a new Christian I could not even come close to a proper description of the Holy Spirit, but it is very important that we understand our

relationship with Him. With this in mind, let us first take a look at what the Holy Spirit is not.

### What the Holy Spirit Is Not

Many people regard the Holy Spirit as a ghost. This is understandable when one realizes that the phrase "Holy Ghost" appears twenty-one times in the King James Version. But one must also realize that the fifty-four translators of this version lived in seventeenth-century England. And the meanings of words do change over time! The King James translators did not have the same idea of a ghost as we do today. They thought of a spiritual being. We think of Casper!

Let it be clear in your mind that the Holy Spirit is NOT a ghost! A ghost is defined as the soul or spirit of a dead person that appears in bodily form to living people or inhabits the unseen world after death. That is certainly far from the description that the Bible gives us of the Holy Spirit.

Despite what some people teach, there are no miraculous powers associated with the Holy Spirit today. The Holy Spirit does NOT cause YOU or ME, or some TV evangelist to speak in an "unknown" tongue or to raise a dead person back to life.

There was a time when miraculous gifts of the Spirit did take place, but they ceased to be available to men around the close of the first century A.D. At that time the Gospel had been completely recorded and confirmed by miracles, so miraculous events were NOT needed anymore. Let's make this point plain!

Prior to being sent on the "Limited Commission", the gift of apostleship was given to the twelve before the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ (Matthew 10). On that occasion Christ strictly forbade them to preach to the Gentiles. They were told, "but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (vs. 5,6). Thus, this mission was "limited" to the nation of Israel. With this commission, Christ told them to preach "the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (v. 7), and gave them miraculous power to effectuate their mission. With this power He told them, "heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils" (v. 8). The power to work these miracles would convince people that they and their message were from God.

Later, after His resurrection, the apostles were given a new commission, the "Great Commission" (Matthew 28:18-20). On the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2), after being baptized with the Holy Spirit, the apostles began to fulfill this new commission. Their work now was to go to all nations, rather than just the lost sheep of the house of Israel (Matthew 28:19). The message they were to preach would also be different. Earlier they had been told to preach

the "nearness" of the kingdom (that it was at hand), but now, in the postresurrection era, they were to preach the good news or the message of the Gospel (Mark 16:15,16). This good news would include that the promised kingdom of the Old Testament age had come (the church), and that men could be translated into it and receive the forgiveness of their sins (Colossians 1:13). Christ would also empower the apostles to be witnesses of Him in Jerusalem, Judea, and eventually the uttermost parts of the earth (Acts 1:8).

Christians today are continuing to fulfill the Great Commission, but NOT by using miraculous powers. Though the apostles had received miraculous power on the "limited commission", that power would last only as long as the mission. Since Jesus told them to wait in Jerusalem *for power*, it follows that they did not at that time have miraculous power! But since Jesus had given them power earlier, the necessary conclusion is that this power had been withdrawn once the mission on which they were sent was accomplished. Here we see a link between the duration of miraculous manifestations of God in men, and the purpose for which such power was granted.

The miraculous age ended when the complete revelation of God's will was made in the pages of the New Testament (1 Corinthians 13:8-10) and had been confirmed by the God-given power of the writers to do miracles (Mark 16:20). Miracles are no longer needed today because no new revelations are being made, and because the Scriptures have already been confirmed by the signs and wonders and gifts of the Holy Spirit that we read about in the Bible (Hebrews 2:1-4).

So, if the Holy Spirit is not a ghost, and if the Holy Spirit does not give us miraculous power in this current age, then what is His purpose?

### What the Holy Spirit Is!

It is really very simple. God loves us and wants to be close to us. He wants to be present with us. Just as Jesus reached out and touched a leper because He loved him (Mark 1:40,41), the Lord wants to reach out and touch us and help us live a strong spiritual life. So He gives us **the gift of the Holy Spirit to dwell within us and give us strength.** Paul prayed for the Christians at Ephesus that they might "be strengthened with might through His Spirit in the inner man" (Ephesians 3:16). The "might" in this verse is not referring to supernatural powers, but to growth and strength to overcome evil.

Let us now take a look at some of the characteristics of the Holy Spirit. If I were describing the characteristics of many brothers and sisters in Christ, I would say that they are loving, tenderhearted, intelligent, gentle, humble,

etc. Notice that these are not physical characteristics. The Holy Spirit is not a physical being, but a spiritual being. The Holy Spirit is part of the Godhead.

The apostle Paul wrote, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all" (2 Corinthians 13:14). He was identifying the three Persons of the Godhead. We read in Genesis 1:1 concerning creation: "...the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters. In Genesis 1:26 He said: "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness..." Therefore, the Holy Spirit was present at the creation of the world and is still present today. I read through the New Testament and noticed the following:

### **Characteristics of the Holy Spirit**

He gives eternal life (John 6:63; Romans 8:11; 2 Corinthians 3:6; 1 Peter 3:18)

He abides forever (John 14:16)

He dwells in the Christian (John 14:17; Romans 8:9, 11; 1 Corinthians 3:16; 6:19; 1 John 2:27; 4:13)

He is the Helper (John 14:16; 15:26; 16:7)

He testifies of Jesus (John 15:26)

He convicts the world of sin, righteousness and judgment (John 16:7-11)

He is given as a gift from God (Acts 2:38; 5:32; Romans 5:5)

He is a witness to the proclamation of the Gospel (Acts 5:32)

He is a witness of our sonship (Romans 8:16)

He is a witness to Christ's sacrifice (Hebrews 10:15; 1 John 5:6)

He puts the love of god in our hearts (Romans 5:5)

He helps in our weaknesses (Romans 8:26)

He makes intercession for us in prayer (Romans 8:26; Ephesians 6:18; Jude 20)

He is a Teacher (1 Corinthians 2:13; 1 John 2:27)

He transforms us into the Lord's image (2 Corinthians 3:18)

He is a guarantee of eternal life (2 Corinthians 5:4-5; Ephesians 1:14)

He is the seal of salvation (Ephesians 1:13; 4:30)

He can be grieved (Ephesians 4:30)

He gives joy (1 Thessalonians 1:6)

He can be quenched (1 Thessalonians 5:19)

He speaks expressly (1 Timothy 4:1)

He renews (Titus 3:5)

He is truth (1 John 5:6)

It is evident that the Holy Spirit is on our side. He is a gift from God that renews us and transforms us into the Lord's image. He strengthens the love of God in our hearts and helps us in our weaknesses. That is certainly a wonderful gift to receive! The Holy Spirit testifies of Jesus. He makes use of a very powerful weapon and speaks expressly through the Word of God, which is sharper than any two-edged sword (Hebrews 4:12). Paul said, "Take the... sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God" (Ephesians 6:17).

When a man and woman are engaged to be married, an engagement ring is given to the lady. This ring is a promise that the couple will soon be married and share a lifetime together. In the same way, God's gift of the indwelling Holy Spirit is His sure promise to us that we will share an eternity in heaven with Him. That is exactly what God says through Paul in 2 Corinthians 5:5: "Now He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who also has given us the Spirit as a GUARANTEE."

Think of the Holy Spirit as a seal or a mark. I once coached a little league baseball team. Each summer I had to certify each player by reviewing their birth certificate which contained the state seal at the bottom. The seal identified the birth certificate as legitimate and allowed the player to participate.

In a similar way, God has put a seal of identification on every Christian. The Bible says, "You were sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise" (Ephesians 1:13; 4:30). Christians are special people with special promises. The Holy Spirit, God's seal, identifies us as recipients of these special promises.

Now some of you may be asking, "How do I get this wonderful gift of the Holy Spirit?" I am glad you asked! Let us find out.

### How Do I Receive the Holy Spirit?

Are we supposed to lay hands on one another and utter guttural sounds from our throats to receive the Holy Spirit? Not according to the Bible! Acts 2:38 says, "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

Notice that the gift of the Holy Spirit occurs in connection with one's obedience to Christ in baptism (John 3:5 and Acts 5:32). A person does not receive the gift of the Holy Spirit *in order to make him a Christian*, but *because he has become a Christian* through the new birth of water and the Spirit. The Bible says, "And BECAUSE YOU ARE SONS, God has SENT FORTH THE SPIRIT of His Son into your hearts" (Galatians 4:6).

Isn't it good to know that we do not have to be involved in a "miraculous experience" to receive the Holy Spirit? There are probably many worried souls

among our denominational friends that are waiting for some "experience" to happen, and when it never happens they must lose faith in what the preacher has been teaching them.

Friend, God gives us this gift when we obey His Word and we accept the fact of His indwelling by faith. I cannot explain the nature of such an indwelling, nor can you. We just simply take God at His Word and thank Him for such a wonderful gift that is ours to sustain us in the Christian walk.

### **Conclusion:**

Satan is tough! He is mean! He is roaming about like a roaring lion looking for lunch and YOU and I are the MAIN COURSE! This is tragic because we are so weak and spiritually helpless that we could never defeat Satan. But never fear, the Holy Spirit is here! "HE WHO IS IN YOU IS GREATER THAN HE WHO IS IN THE WORLD" (1 John 4:4). What comfort this verse is to the Christian!

Friends, I challenge you to read Ephesians 6:10-18. We can be STRONG in the Lord! We can STAND against the devil! The battle plan for God's children is right here, and it includes the Holy Spirit. What a comforting passage of Scripture this is.

But if you are not a Christian, you have every reason to tremble in your shoes. If you were once a strong child of God but you have turned away, you are "quenching" the power of the Holy Spirit in your life (1 Thessalonians 5:19). The Spirit "grieves" over your condition (Ephesians 4:30). You, too, have every reason to tremble.

Loved ones, you and I are in one of three conditions: (1) Faithful Christian — the Holy Spirit providing strength to defeat the devil, (2) Fallen-Away Christian — the Holy Spirit grieves and His powers are quenched, or (3) Non-Christian — the Spirit of God is not in this person and provides no strength for overcoming evil.

### In which category do you fit?

In all honesty, are you where you want to be? If not, what are you going to do about it? One must HEAR the Gospel (Romans 10:17), BELIEVE in Christ as the Son of God (John 8:24), REPENT of sin (Luke 13:3), CONFESS his faith in Christ (Matthew 10:32), and be BAPTIZED in water for the forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38), to be born into Christ and His church. Have you experienced that new birth yet?

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### If These Things Are True, How Do We Explain the Facts?

If the theory of evolution is true, why haven't they found any transitional fossils? Charles Darwin, on page 413 of his tome, Origin of Species, said, "Why is not every geological formation and every stratum full of such intermediate links? Geology assuredly does not reveal any such finely-graduated organic chain; and this is the most obvious and serious objection which can be urged against the theory." Almost 150 years of archaeological digging and an incredible volume of fossil-findings later, the objection should be even stronger!

If the documentary hypothesis concerning the author of the books attributed to Moses is true, why can't they find even one copy or fragment? The idea that later scribes and penman wrote the first five books of the Old Testament, some almost 1000 years after the time Moses lived, is widely believed among liberal religious scholars. That there are no copies or fragments of these post-Moses writers has not done much to defuse the zeal of those who teach it. Neither is any attempt given to explain or rebut the many statements in the Pentateuch claiming that Moses wrote the books (Exodus 17:14; 24:4-7; Numbers 33:1,2)

"Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Write these words, for according to the tenor of these words I have made a covenant with you and with Israel.' So he was there with the Lord forty days and forty nights; he neither ate bread nor drank water. And He wrote on the tablets the words of the covenant." (Exodus 34:27) "... So Moses wrote this law and delivered it to the priests, the sons of Levi, who bore the ark of the covenant of the Lord, and to all the elders of Israel. And Moses commanded them, saying: 'At the end of every seven years, at the appointed time in the year of release, at the Feast of Tabernacles, when all Israel comes to appear before the Lord your God in the place which He chooses, you shall read this law before all Israel in their hearing. Gather the people together, men and women and little ones, and

the stranger who is within your gates, that they may hear and that they may learn to fear the Lord your God and carefully observe all the words of this law...." (Deuteronomy 31:9-11).

If the idea of being genetically predisposed to homosexuality is true, where is the genetic evidence of it? The study most supportive of "the gay gene," conducted in 1991 by Bailey and Pillard, said that 52% of the pairs of identical twin brothers studied were homosexual. A much larger sample size, in an Australian study released in 2000 by Bailey, Dunne, and Martin, found only 20% concordance in identical twin males and 24% among identical twin females. Bearman and Brucker, in 2002, found less than 10% concordance (via *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology*, 78(3): 524-36; *Archives of General Psychiatry*, 48 (12): 1089-96; and the *American Journal of Sociology*, 107: 1179-1205).

If the idea that a "fetus" is part of the mother is true, why does that unborn one have its own unique genetic code? Not only that, but the unborn can be a different blood type, gender, race, hair color, eye color, and more.

If the big bang theory is true, what took place and why? Whether it is thought to have been highly concentrated matter, energy, or combination, what force acted upon it? It was there, presumably for an eternity. Why didn't it "bang" before it did? Why did it bang when it did? How did mind emerge from matter? How did morality emerge from non-morality? How did an explosion or expansion form such order out of chance and chaos?

If it is true that making moral judgments about others' behavior is wrong, why is *that* moral judgment not wrong?

None of these questions is intended to exhaustively address any of the theories or world views they represent. Yet, so many people unquestioningly and blindly accept these premises as fact when they are far from it. Seemingly, the last resort, if ever taken, would be to accept and follow what the Bible says. However, that is the fundamental dividing line. Hebrews 11:6 puts it well, that "...without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him."

### A BOOK EVERY CHRISTIAN SHOULD READ



No, I'm not referring to the Bible (although certainly every Christian should read it daily!) Instead, I am referring to one of my favorite books, **The Warren-Flew Debate.** I read it for the first time when I was 18 years old and it inspired my life-long passion for Christian evidences.

The debate itself was on the existence of God. The disputants were Dr. Thomas B. Warren, representing the Lord's church, and Dr. Anthony G.N. Flew who was the leading atheistic thinker in the world at that time. At the time of the debate (September 20-23, 1977), brother Warren was a professor of Philosophy of Religion and Apologetics at Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis, TN, and the editor of *The Spiritual Sword*. Dr. Flew was a professor of philosophy at Reading University in


England. The discussion was held on the campus of what was then known as North Texas State University in Denton, TX. At the time, because of the subject matter and the renown of each of the speakers, it was billed "The Debate of the Century". Five thousand to seven thousand people attended each night.

Dr. Flew was in the affirmative first and defended the proposition, "I know that God does not exist." Brother Warren denied that position. This was unusual in debates on the existence of God because it is usually the atheist that is attacking theism rather than having to defend his



unbelief. In this, Dr. Flew utterly failed. Brother Warren took atheism out behind the intellectual woodshed in this debate!

The last two nights of the debate, brother Warren was in the affirmative and he defended the proposition, "I know that God does exist." Dr. Flew, of course, denied that. With masterful logic, brother Warren showed beyond a shadow of a doubt that God does exist and Dr. Flew was utterly unable to answer any of his arguments, once again exposing atheism for the barren philosophy it truly is. As brother Warren repeatedly pointed out, the weakness was not in the man, for Dr. Flew was a world-renowned scholar, but in the weakness of his atheistic position.



An interesting postscript to this debate came years later when Dr. Flew renounced atheism! His last published book was **There Is a God** (2007)! The sub-title was "How the world's most notorious atheist changed his mind." In this book, Dr. Flew mentioned the debate and was very complimentary of brother Warren. One cannot help but wonder if that debate planted the seeds of doubt about his unbelief, as his defeat in the debate was so overwhelming!

Brethren and friends, **The Warren-Flew Debate** (also available on DVD) is more needed now than ever because atheism and agnosticism continue to grow among our fellow

citizens, especially among our young people. Recent studies show that 15% of the American people now classify themselves as non-religious or secular, with about 5% of them claiming to be atheists or agnostics. Those numbers represented a two-fold increase from a similar study conducted just a few years earlier. So I urge you to obtain a copy of this book or the DVD, to study it, and then to pass it along to your children and/or grandchildren that they might be equipped to "...contend earnestly for the faith once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3). Anyone who reads this debate with an open mind will come away convinced that God exists and that atheism is pure hokum!



### THE WORD OF GOD

Even though my grandfather was a master carpenter, I was not blessed with his construction abilities. My thumb can attest to the accuracy of my hammer strikes. Trying to nail drywall to the stud can be quite the adventure. I suspect that most who have tried to nail something to a wall have had the frustrating experience of having the nail miss the stud. Whatever is being attached simply will not stay.

Solomon is expressing the desire of every preacher. He wants his words to "stick." He works hard and ponders how things can be said that will have the desired effect. His "nails" are "given by one Shepherd." That is, they are given by God. So, God gives us spiritual carpenters the nails, and it is our job to make sure we nail them in the right spot.


There are some significant lessons that we can learn from this:

- First, we're not using just any 'nail.' The words we speak are not ours (or shouldn't be), but are the words of God. Paul wasn't ashamed of the Gospel, because it was "the power of God for salvation" (Romans 1:16). People don't need to be given our "nails" our thoughts, beliefs, opinions. They need to be given the Word that can save their souls (James 1:21).
- Second, we have to know where the studs are. Preachers need to know the people to whom they preach. Teachers need to know their students. How many times have we heard a lesson or sermon that had no relevance to us? We feel like it was wasted time. When we're teaching the eternal truths of God, we need to make sure that they are reaching the hearts of our listeners.
- ↑ Third, we have the responsibility of doing it right. No one wants a carpenter who can't drive a nail in the right place. Equally, no one wants a preacher or teacher who hasn't taken time to make sure that what is being said is absolutely true according to God's Word. James warned that one should be careful about deciding to be a teacher, because teachers will incur a stricter judgment (James 3:1). As Solomon says, we need to become "masters of these collections" of wisdom teachings (which ultimately have God as their source).


the subject addressed.

A printer went to work on me. An effort was made on this phase of my development to make me as attractive as possible and to make sure that the


words produced were exactly the words of the author. just as the author wanted to give the people something of value to read, the printer wanted to encourage people to read me.



#### VERSE SEARCH

1 And I, brethren, when I came to you, did not come with excellence of speech or of wisdom declaring to you the testimony of God. 2 For I determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified. 3 I was with you in weakness, in fear, and in much trembling. 4 And my speech and my preaching were not with persuasive words of human wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, 5 that your faith should not be in the wisdom of men but in the power of God.

**6** However, we speak wisdom among those who are mature, yet not the wisdom of this age, nor of the rulers of this age, who are coming to nothing. 7 But we speak the wisdom of God in a mystery, the hidden wisdom which God ordained before the ages for our glory, 8 which none of the rulers of this age knew; for had they known, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory.

9 But as it is written: Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him. 10 But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit. For the Spirit searches all things, yes, the deep things of God. 11 For what man knows the things of a man except the spirit of the man which is in him? Even so no one knows the things of God except the Spirit of God. 12 Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, that we might know the things that have been freely given to us by God.

13 These things we also speak, not in words which man's wisdom teaches but which the Holy Spirit teaches, comparing spiritual things with spiritual. 14 But the natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; nor can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned. 15 But he who is spiritual judges all things, yet he himself is rightly judged by no one. 16 For who has known the mind of the Lord that he may instruct Him? But we have the mind of Christ.

NOTE: In this chapter Paul contrasts the wisdom of this world with the wisdom of God. The gospel message of Jesus Christ crucified seems foolish to the wisdom of man; nevertheless it is God's wisdom, and it is the message that saves. When we speak, we must speak the gospel message without mixing it with man's wisdom. When we mix man's and God's wisdom, we destroy the power of the gospel.

God's wisdom can only be understood by those who are spiritually discerned. This does not mean that God must directly influence a man's heart in some way before he can understand God's will and respond. The natural man is someone who lives purely for this world and has no mind for spiritual things. To this man, spiritual things are foolishness and he has no appreciation for the value of the things of God. However, we should remember that God's mind and plans are not subject to the criticisms and judgments of man.



# He Dropped the Ball!

We often use the expression, "He dropped the ball," to describe someone who has failed to follow through on an assignment or to reach a certain goal. It is an idiom meaning to make an error, to miss an opportunity.

Some people trace the origin of that phrase to the 4th game of the 1941 Baseball World Series...

The Brooklyn Dodgers were playing the New York Yankees. The Yankees won the first game of the series by a score of 3-2. Brooklyn returned the favor the next game by beating the Yankees 3-2. Then the Yankees took the third game 2-1. In the fourth game it looked like the Dodgers were going to tie the series. Brooklyn was leading 5-3 at the top of the 9th inning. The Yankees were up to bat with the bases empty. There were 2 outs and the count was 3 balls and 2 strikes on Tommy Henrich. Henrich swung at the next pitch and missed the ball. Now, that should have ended the game. But the Dodgers' catcher, Mickey Owen, dropped the ball!

The ball hit off the heel of his glove and rolled toward the Dodgers' dugout. Henrich ran to first base before Owen could retrieve the ball. That started the Yankees' rally. Next up to bat was "Joltin' Joe" DiMaggio. The Yankees then went on to score four runs in that inning, and they held on to win the game 7-4. So, instead of the series being tied at 2-2, that victory gave the Yankees a 3-1 lead in the series. The next day, the Yankees beat the Dodgers 3-1 in Game 5. Thus, the Yankees won the 1941 World Series, and some say it was all because Brooklyn's catcher, Mickey Owen, dropped the ball.

Despite his outstanding career in baseball, Owen was always known as the man who "dropped the ball". When Mickey Owen died, the title of his obituary in the New York Times read: "Mickey Owen Dies at 89; Allowed Fateful Passed Ball." Even in his death he was remembered as the guy who dropped the ball.

You and I have a lot in common with Mickey Owen, for we have ALL "dropped the ball!" "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "For we all stumble in many things" (James 3:2). To make matters worse, "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

But God loves us so much that He gave His Son, Jesus Christ, to die on the cross for our sins, that we might have forgiveness: "For this is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins" (Matthew 26:28) and eternal life with Him (Romans 6:23b).

In order to accept His offer of grace, we must: believe and trust Jesus: "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' So they said, 'Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you will be saved, you and your household" (Acts 16:30,31); turn from our sins in repentance: "Truly, these times of ignorance God overlooked, but now commands all men everywhere to repent, because He has appointed a day on which He will judge the world in righteousness by the Man whom He has ordained" (Acts 17:30,31); confess Jesus before men: "Whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 10:32); and be baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of sins: "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38; Galatians 3:27).

The love of God has made it possible for each of us to be remembered, not by "he dropped the ball," but by "For by grace he has been saved through faith" (Ephesians 2:8,9).

Having dropped the ball, won't YOU take hold of Christ in trusting obedience?

### THE DECEITFULNESS OF SIN

Sin is such a small word with big consequences. It is a short word with long penalties associated therewith. Sin was at the heart of man being expelled from Eden, at the heart of the devastation of the flood, at the heart of the ruin of Sodom and Gomorrah, at the heart of the fall of men and kingdoms, and will cause folks to be lost eternally. It has been, and is truly, a reproach to all people (Proverbs 14:34).

Sin is defined as a transgression of God's law (1 John 3:4), that which is not right (1 John 5:17), a failure to do the good one knows to do (James 4:17), and a violation of the conscience (Romans 14:23). We would say it is a failure in pleasing our God.

To understand sin one must see the deceitful nature of it. Hebrews 3:13 refers to the deceitfulness of sin. It misleads, misguides, beguiles, and tricks. Our introduction to Satan in Genesis 3 has him beguiling and deceiving Eve (1 Timothy 2:14; 2 Corinthians 11:3). Sin appears to be right when it is so wrong. Satan makes sin so attractive, but it is so very ugly. It doesn't appear to be harmful, but it is so destructive, dominating, deadly, and divisive, separating us from God, from each other, and from heaven.


Notice some of sin's deceitful ways:

- **Deceived by Sin's Presence:** Some feel as if they have never sinned or that sin is not to be a very large concern in their lives. "All we like sheep have strayed" (Isaiah 5:3-6). All have sinned (1 Kings 8:46). Not one accountable person stands apart from sin (Ecclesiastes 7:20). All have fallen short (Romans 3:23). We are deceived when we think otherwise (1 John 1:8-10). Paul in Romans 1-3 points that all, both Jew and Gentile, stand condemned because of sin. All have to deal with the sin problem!
- Deceived by Sin's Pleasure: Moses made a choice that many fail to make. He said "no" to sin and its enticement to pleasure (Hebrews 11:24,25). Second Thessalonians 2:10-12 speaks of the pleasures of

unrighteousness. First Timothy 5:6 warns: "...she who lives in pleasure is dead while she lives. The thorny ground in the parable of the sower shows the deceitfulness of sin's pleasures. Don't fall for this old trick.

- Deceived by Sin's Permeation: How many have fallen into sin because "everybody's doing it"? Do not follow a multitude to do wrong (Exodus 23:2). The majority were wrong in Noah's day (Genesis 6). Most are traveling the wrong road today: "Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it" (Matthew 7:13,14). Be not deceived with this facet of sin (1 Corinthians 15:33).
- Deceived by Sin's Progression: Some want to play with the fire of sin. Many see sin as a little thing. It could never get a grip on them! They see themselves as never being dominated by it. They fail to see the path of sin's dominion and destruction. We had best know the trail of temptation-to-lust, to-enticement, to-sin,-to-death: "...each one is tempted when he is drawn away by his own desires and enticed. Then, when desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, brings forth death" (James 1:13-15). Many never would give in all at once, but sin has gotten them to the same bitter end, just piece by piece.
- Deceived by Sin's Promises: Sin has a way of making us think we can sow to the flesh and reap as if we have been sowing to the Spirit. That always fails to work! (Galatians 6:7,8). Paul told the Corinthians not to be deceived into believing that we can live for Satan and be rewarded by the Lord (1 Corinthians 6:9-11). Sin promises freedom and brings slavery. It promises happiness and brings sorrow. It even promises heaven, but will surely bring hell.
- Deceived by Sin's Power: Sin has a way of searing the conscience (1Timothy 4:2). It has the power of bringing one into slavery to sin (2 Peter 2:19). We each can win victory over sin, but only through the Lord, the Word, prayer, and a dedicated life (Revelation 12:11).

Don't be deceived by sin! You will live in eternity to regret it! \*\*



# What Would You Do?

There was a terrible automobile accident. David Urey's wife lay critically injured on a West Virginia highway. The examining doctor said that she needed immediate attention from a neurosurgeon if she was to survive. Others said she could not be saved at all. Many advised him just to stay there with her and hold her hand and comfort her while she expired. He refused to do this. He first tried to charter a helicopter to take her to Washington, D.C., but none was available. In his utter desperation he said, "I will call the White House." Many told him this was ridiculous, that he couldn't even reach the White House, but somehow he did reach the White House, and President Nixon's private helicopter was immediately dispatched to Urey's aid. His bold action was rewarded.



It seems to me the church is in about the same desperate situation today. Many are lying on the highway of life suffering and dying. Some are advising that we merely hold their hand, comfort them, and tell them that everything is going to be all right. Just get them a sack of groceries, pay the utility bill, or see that they have a little something to ease the pain while they wait to die. Many tell us today that it is not soul salvation that is needed, but rather salvation of the body. Satan would love to see the church holding the hand and wiping the brow of a lost and dying world.

If the church is to follow the example of Jesus, we are going to have to be bold and tell men and women that they are lost without Christ, that they are without hope, that bread and drink and house and medication will not save them. Jesus did not die on the cross merely to make the world comfortable. It's true that Jesus did feed some people and heal some, but to these He boldly said, "Except ye be converted, except ye repent, unless you are born again you will perish. You cannot enter the Kingdom of God where there is joy and love and peace" (Matthew 18:3; Luke 13:5; John 3:16; Matthew 7:21).

It is time for the church to realize that we will have to endure the criticism of the by-standers and do what is necessary to save those who are lost in sin. Sometimes, we too, must decide between saving one and merely comforting one.

The real question is, "What are we doing?"

But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say? (Luke 6:46)

Jesus as head of His church sits on the right hand of God; the church which He purchased with His blood is His spiritual body. His spiritual body is composed of many congregations of people, each entrusted with the Gospel, to be used in seeking and saving the lost.

Most congregations have some means of seeking the lost: television, radio, evangelistic meetings, visitation programs, etc. Since God designed the church to be evangelistic, every opportunity of reaching out to the lost should be employed.

One such opportunity to "reach out" to others presents itself when visitors attend Gospel meetings or worship services of the church. What should be our reaction toward such visitors? Some visitors may be family or friends of church members, while others may attend as a result of an out-reach program of the church. Regardless of what might have brought them, they are present and merit some kind of response on our part.

Should we be so wrapped up in our own members that we ignore our visitors?

Should we stand and whisper to another member, "I wonder who those people are?" Should we just make a casual observation to see if someone we invited is present, while overlooking other visitors?

Or, should our primary concern be to greet *every* visitor, become personally acquainted with them, learn something of their interest in the church, and assist them in whatever their present need might be?

Since our ardent concern should be to make every visitor welcome, a good answer to the above questions might be in a proposed question: What would Jesus do in a similar circumstance? The answer most assuredly is that our Lord would be visitor-conscious — and so should we! Young Christians should seek to make welcome other youth who come into the assembly. Adult Christians should greet and make welcome every visitor, regardless of age. Of course, this takes awareness, time, and concern — but that's New Testament Christianity!

When concern is shown to visitors first, then brethren can visit among themselves. One purpose of the open worship assembly is to give outsiders an opportunity to observe and participate in first century Christianity in action in the twenty-first century. There is no greater spiritual joy than to exercise some part in the conversion of a lost soul — such could be the outcome of taking time to greet all visitors and in making them feel welcome!

# "I'm Right and You're Wrong"?

Whenever people disagree sparks will fly. Nobody likes to be wrong. We want to be right. Sometimes the desire to be right — or maybe it's the even-stronger desire *not* to be wrong — causes people to abandon all reason and objectivity, dig in the heels, and not-give-in-at-any-cost. Humans resist giving in to an admission that our actions or beliefs or understandings are faulty. Why? If it is, then that necessitates change. We may despise change (especially personal change) even more than being wrong.

It could very well be that this basic human trait is the driving force that has initiated a major philosophical shift in our world. That shift is under

the broad (and nearly indefinable) umbrella called "postmodernism". The quality of postmodernism that concerns us at this point is that it holds that there is no absolute truth, no absolute right and wrong. Practically speaking, it means that one doesn't have to concern oneself with right or wrong any longer. Everybody is right and nobody is wrong. While that might appear to take a lot of pressure off everyone, the fallacy of this philosophy is evident when applied in any number of practical settings. For instance, what happens to "recognized" moral wrongs like murder and rape? The postmodern loophole closed rather quickly.

POSTMODERNISM: The descriptive and explanatory statements of scientists and historians can, in principle, be objectively true or false. The postmodern denial of this viewpoint — which follows from the rejection of an objective natural reality — is sometimes expressed by saying that there is no such thing as Truth. (Brian Duignan: Encyclopedia Britannica)

One area of great discomfort to many people is an investigation of the many points of disagreement among professed Christians. Who is right and who is wrong? The postmodern dodge is very common: "Everyone has his/her own interpretation." That piece of illogical ground is very crowded. Many people wish to stand there because it is comfortable and it is easy. It gets rid of tension. But the ground is quicksand. It won't support anyone.

Instead of evading the sticky question of who is right and who is wrong, and its inevitable discomfort, one ought to simply recognize that right is located with God. Someone may argue that such an approach is too simplistic and impractical. But isn't that exactly Paul's approach when he said, "We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ," (2 Corinthians 10:5; ESV)? Paul wasn't out to prove he was right, but to bring men into submission to Christ.

Simply put, (and, no, not simplistic) Jesus is right, and when I stand with Him, I am too. If not, I should feel great discomfort.

# Right Belief Leads to Right Action

There is both a divine side and a human side to Christian faith. God is *the author* of the faith and men are *the respondents*. From the human side faith is composed of right belief and right action, both of which are legislated by God. That being the case, right belief may properly be thought of as the ground on which all else pertaining to faith stands. One may adopt a personally desirable moral code, a personally approved attitude, and worship in a personally satisfying manner, but if each is not governed by *right belief* each will be faulty.

Alexander Campbell spoke to the issue under discussion when he wrote, "Revelation has nothing to do with opinions or abstract reasonings; for it is founded wholly and entirely upon facts. There is not one abstract opinion, nor one speculative view, asserted or communicated in Old Testament or New... Facts, then, are the Alpha and the Omega of both Jewish and Christian revelations" (*The Christian System*, p.89). What God has said and done He has said and done out of His own counsel, and love for the Lord willingly submits to both (1 John 2:4; 2 John 6; Luke 6:46).

The teaching of Jesus that all men must honor the will of the Father will remain an integral part of His teaching till the end of time (Matthew 7:21). How can it be otherwise? The Pharisees, Saul of Tarsus, and even idolaters were all religious in their own way. But none of them were pleasing to God. For that reason they were required to change.

It is imperative that, when in the presence of the divine will, all men must consider themselves of unclean lips (Isaiah 6:5). Where God has spoken, no action is right which does not harmonize with what He has said.

# Quick Commentary on Crucial Verses 1 Timothy 2:11-15: 1 Corinthians 14:34-38

Let a woman learn in silence with all submission. And I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man, but to be in silence. For Adam was formed first, then Eve. And Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived, fell into transgression. Nevertheless she will be saved in childbearing if they continue in faith, love, and holiness, with self-control.

Let your women keep silent in the churches, for they are not permitted to speak; but they are to be submissive, as the law also says. And if they want to learn something, let them ask their own husbands at home; for it is shameful for women to speak in church. Or did the word of God come originally from you? Or was it you only that it reached? If anyone thinks himself to be a prophet or spiritual, let him acknowledge that the things which I write to you are the commandments of the Lord. But if anyone is ignorant, let him be ignorant.

Some in the church today are labeling these biblical restrictions on female leadership in the church as "cultural". They argue that the times and the culture have changed, so women in the church should be allowed to do whatever they have the talent and desire to do.

Where, in these verses, is there any allusion to culture? Remember, we are not to ADD to the Word!

What these verses do say clearly is (1) that the reason man is to have authority over woman is because man was formed first, and it was woman who was deceived! The order of authority goes all the way back to the creation! Culture has nothing to do with it!

(2) Paul identified his words as commandments!

(3) Now, a touchy subject: God's intended role for woman was to be the keeper of the home, the help-meet of her husband, and the mother to her children. Being faithful through those challenging years molds a woman into a spiritual giant!

#### Whatever Happened To "Soul-Winning"?

In the two decades that followed the end of World War II, you heard a lot about soul-winning. This was the era of the "cottage meeting" and of courses in personal evangelism. Churches of Christ grew and their works expanded. You don't hear as much about soul-saving projects any more.

Several things have happened. One change was the radical cultural shift in this nation beginning in the late 1960's. Society in general fell on hard times morally. The nation experienced prolonged economic well-being at the same time it was experiencing a social revolution that was largely negative in its impact. This combination fostered a self-serving lifestyle that was more concerned with pleasing self than being right with God. Concern with the "here and now" crowded out concern with accountability in the hereafter.

More than they really realized, churches were influenced by this philosophy, and program emphasis shifted from reaching those outside to keeping the ones we had content to stay put. World evangelism lost ground along with this decline in reaching those outside of Christ, locally. Teaching others the way of the Lord more perfectly began to take a backseat to just getting along, partly due to the fact that our own people often lacked a clear conception of where to stand.

The problems are complex, so simple solutions are not possible. But we must begin somewhere if we are ever to climb out of this ditch of complacency into which we seem to have fallen. First of all, we need to renew our faith in Christ to such an extent that we can take His "great commission" to heart. Christ is still the cornerstone of our religion, and faith in Him is still the power to search our own hearts for spiritual damage. We may be more CONformed to this world than TRANSformed into His likeness than we realize. Then, we need to seek new strategies for reaching the world as it now is, understanding that it is lost, whether it knows it or not. Finally, we need a prayerful renewal among us of dedication and commitment to the will of God.

Buy a Bible with God's money of which we are only temporary custodians ("But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to offer so willingly as this? For all things come from You, and of Your own we have given You" 1 Chronicles 29:14) and GIVE it to a needy soul. GIVE of your strength and **GIVE** of your best physically, emotionally, spiritually and monetarily — to your Master. **GIVE** Him first place in your heart. Remember, He GIVES ALL.

# IN A TIME OF PERSECUTION, CAN I STAND?

It's a question that should haunt every serious Christian: If my life were threatened, or if the lives

of my children or loved ones were threatened if I did not renounce Christianity, how would I stand? Probably none of us know the answer until we are faced with the reality, and we pray we would then have the courage of first century Christians.

We live in a time of relative ease: financially, physically, spiritually. We're not hungry. We don't keep a constant watch behind us because of fear of attack. We can worship as we choose, when we choose, without challenge. We have access to God's word in multiple translations, with any additional aids we desire — concordances, commentaries, word studies, Internet tools, etc.

Looking at the blessings listed in the previous paragraph we should conclude that we, of this age and in this country, are basking in the sunlight of God's love. As a Father — our perfect and heavenly Father — He would want to shower those good things on His children. And as faithful children, we are grateful for the outpouring of our Father's love.

In the midst of our ease and abundance, though, we would do well to remember God's warning to the Israelites as they were about to enter the

land that was flowing with milk and honey: "Beware that you do not forget the Lord your God by not keeping His commandments, His judgments, and His statutes which I command you today, lest — when you have eaten and are full, and have built beautiful houses and dwell in them; and when your herds and your flocks multiply, and your silver and your gold are multiplied, and all that you have is multiplied; when your heart is lifted up, and you forget the Lord your God..." (Deuteronomy 8:10-14).

Sadly, in the past few decades, God's warning to the Israelites also describes many Christians. Preachers and church leaders have grown increasingly desirous of ignoring doctrinal messages while concentrating on teaching the Bible only as history and as guidance in life's morals and values. On the part of some, the silence concerning the oneness of the church, the doctrine of salvation, the New Testament pattern of worship, marriage and divorce, and other "divisive" matters is an attempt to avoid offending their religious neighbors and weak Christians. For others, the silence becomes compromise and ultimate blending with the denominational world, seeing all "believers" as part of the true body of Christ.

The result of decades of silence is that many Christians have such shallow knowledge of God's word that they have no foundation on which to stand.

In addition to the silence from the pulpit and elders, the attention of many Christians has been focused on the world: getting ahead financially, having all the niceties of life, enjoying entertainment: sports, TV, video games, time-consuming nothings that eat up their days. For many, with both husband and wife working five days a week in order to "get ahead" in the material world, then taking part in their children's extracurricular school activities, preparing meals, taking care of the house and yard, etc., etc., there is no time for carefully training up their children or for grounding the family in a strong spiritual life.

"...and they have no root in themselves, and so endure only for a time. Afterward, when tribulation or persecution arises for the word's sake, immediately they stumble" (Mark 4:17).

Without strong foundational knowledge of God's word and without deep conviction that we must hold fast to our faith in order to obtain the

promise of eternal life with God, many Christians are totally defenceless before the increasing onslaughts we are facing.

The world grows more menacing to us every day. Judicial decisions are being made that threaten our right to stand for biblical principles: protection for the unborn, proper discipline and parenting of our children, the condemnation of the practice of homosexuality, the sanctity of marriage — shielding it from "no fault" divorce, from same-sex unions, from polygamy, and from the "live in" practice that has become accepted by many today.

Legally, businesses are being required to do the bidding of homosexuals; there is a growing political move to declare that sermons condemning homosexuality as a sin in God's eyes should be labeled "hate crimes" and prosecuted accordingly. *Must a preacher perform the ceremony for homosexuals or risk imprisonment because of his refusal?* When our justice system has been overturned to the point that we cannot follow particular laws without transgressing God's clear word, will we stand for truth in the face of persecution? Will we go to prison rather than compromise?

Atheism and humanism have been in league for many decades to destroy our biblically-based culture. Now another threat is taking hold in many areas of the world: radical Islam. Their stated goal is to destroy the "western culture" that has already been largely corrupted by these atheistic assaults on our civilization.

In parts of the world where Islamists hold full power, they are brutally slaughtering believers in Christ, strongly convinced that they are doing "Allah's" will. Muslims are proving every day that they are willing to die for Islam. Often, Christians in those nations are accused of "blasphemy" and are hauled off to prison. Before there can be a "trial", a mob may stone them to death or hang them publicly for their "crime" against Islam. The "jihadis" may not incorporate all Muslims but they serve as the military for the developing caliphate, which all will accept or die.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, I beg of all of us that we ask ourselves this vital question NOW: "In a time of persecution, can I endure?" NOW, we still have time to immerse ourselves in God's word and commitment to Him so that we CAN stand. "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall

tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?" (Romans 8:35).

### The Mystery of Marriage

Marriage is a mystery, a part of the very order of creation. It is often used to illustrate the relationship between God and His people, between Christ and His church. It is a special, holy thing. Jesus was passionate about its importance and permanence.

In Genesis, while God was creating the world, He said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make him a helper suitable for him" (Genesis 2:18). People need help and partnership in life. Marriage is God's answer to that need. In Genesis 2:24 a monumental truism is stated about this relationship. It contains three great principles for a successful marriage. These can be summarized by saying that people must "Leave," "be united," and "become one flesh."

**Leaving** involves the discontinuing of other relationships as *primary*. If a mother, a sister, a father, or a best friend has been the most important person in your life, you must no longer count them as "first". You must "leave" that relationship in a sense and make your new spouse number one.



If not, there will be a measure of competition with the other relationship and it will prevent your marriage from becoming what it needs to be.

Being **united** is critical. It involves intentionally becoming partners in life. This means helping each other, discussing things, depending on each other, agreeing on courses of actions, and working together to reach goals. It means attaching to one another emotionally so that you really learn the other's needs and seek to fulfill them. It means building trust with one another by being continual support emotionally, practically, and in every other way.

Becoming **one flesh** is the sexual relationship. While it may come naturally at first, it must eventually be done deliberately, or it will be lacking. It must be done with consideration, which implies the presence of affection and communication and interest in daily life. It must not be neglected or Satan will use the neglect to destroy the marriage.

Because marriage is a covenant — actually between the man and woman, and before God — it is a firm lifelong commitment to the relationship by both partners. Married people must not merely have a relationship, but they must be dedicated to the nurturing and betterment of it. A covenant requires the promotion of understanding by each partner, and a continual effort to deepen and improve the relationship. A covenant is the keeping of vows, which means that each one must actively strive to do what needs to be done for the other.

God has always expected His people to honor their marriage covenant. We cannot casually cast aside those vows. We must preserve them and honor them according to His Word. May God help each of us to work at our marriages, for this is His will from the time of creation.



With her simple and pointed words, she reminded me that love "does not seek its own" (1 Corinthians 13:5), and that all of my excuses were meaningless.

Paul admonishes his readers to literally "redeem" (exagorazō) the time they have been given (Ephesians 5:15). The word "redeem" means to exchange one thing for another, and since we have our children for

only a limited period of time, how are we using that time, and what are we exchanging for it? Surely providing for our families (1 Timothy 5:8) involves more than just material necessities. Am I providing love, security, a good example, encouragement, discipline, spiritual leadership, affection, affirmation, and undivided attention?

To this day, whenever I am tempted to selfishly focus on my own perceived needs at the expense of my children or am distracted from my God-given parental duties, the words of that precious 4-year-old child still ring in my ears: "But Daddy, it's your job!" That's all the prompting I need to readjust my focus and get back on track. Thank you, Lord, for our children, from whom we learn so much!

in our stockings!

The old adage is true. We don't appreciate the water until the well runs dry.

"Nothing raises the price of a blessing like its removal; whereas, it was its continuance which should have taught us its value"

(Hannah Moore).



Consider what God has done in giving us life, sustaining us through the years, granting the blessing of family and friends, saving us from our sins, granting us the privilege of prayer, preparing for us an eternal home. And the list goes on and on. Do we have eyes wide open to the mercies of God?

Hannah Moore has a word in season for all of us: "There are three requisites to the proper enjoyment of earthly blessings:

- a thankful reflection on the goodness of the giver;
- a deep sense of our own unworthiness;
- and a recollection of the uncertainty of our long possessing them.
  - ✓ The first will make us grateful;
  - **✓** the second, humble;

## The "I Am?s" of Paul

When we think of "I am" statements made in the Bible, no doubt we think of the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ. In the "I Am's" of Jesus, He states that He is **the bread of life** (John 6:35), **the light of the world** (8:12), **the door of the sheepfold** (10:7), **the good shepherd** (10:11), **the resurrection and the life** (11:25), **the way, truth, and life** (14:6), and **the true vine** (15:1).

Not only do these "I Am's" of Jesus equate Him with Jehovah (see Exodus 3:14), but it also shows our Lord to be a man of action. He did not say "I was," nor did He say "I will be". He said, "I am". The church has too many "has been's" and too many "will be's" and not enough "I am's". We certainly could learn from Paul's example regarding his readiness and willingness to work.

In the book of Romans, we find the "I Am's" of Paul. What do these teach us about Paul, and what can we learn that might help us to be more diligent servants of our Lord?

Paul writes, "I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise" (Romans1:14). Paul felt an indebtedness to all men from every walk of life. He had come to know the grace of God in the forgiveness of his past sins (Acts 22:16; 1 Timothy 1:15), and in being allowed to preach the Gospel (Ephesians 3:8). Paul desired to share the good news with all men, and his life reflects not only that desire, but his willingness to go into all the world with the message of salvation. Would to God that we in the church today felt the same debt of responsibility to the lost! We owe them the right and privilege of hearing the soul-saving Gospel! We march under the same orders as did Paul and the other apostles (Mark 16:15). Someone took the time to teach us the Gospel. Should we not do the same for the lost around us?

Paul further writes, "So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also" (Romans 1:15). His feeling of indebtedness to the lost did not cause him to despair at the magnitude of the task. He prepared himself to meet the responsibility he had to every soul he met. He was ready to preach. He was ready to declare the only message that can save the soul (James 1:21). So many times we realize our God-given responsibilities, but we fail to prepare ourselves to meet these challenges. We know we must go into all nations and teach the Gospel (Matthew 28:19), but are we ready to do so? Let us realize our mission and prepare ourselves to carry it out!

Paul then writes, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16). Some assume that Paul was saved on the road to Damascus, or that he was saved through a direct operation of the Holy Spirit, or various other surmisings. It was only after Paul heard and obeyed the Gospel in baptism that he was saved (Acts 22:16), and that process is the same for every soul for all time. Paul was fully convicted of the saving power of the Gospel, for he had seen it work in his own life. Until we are fully convinced that the Gospel, and the Gospel alone, is God's means of saving man, we will never be ready to convert the lost! The Gospel is man's only hope! If we keep quiet about it, then souls will never have the opportunity to be saved (2 Kings 7:9; 2 Corinthians 4:3), and we will be lost for refusing the command of our Lord.

"Son of man, I have made you a watchman for the house of Israel; therefore hear a word from My mouth, and give them warning from Me: When I say to the wicked, 'You shall surely die,' and you give him no warning, nor speak to warn the wicked from his wicked way, to save his life, that same wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood I will require at your hand" (Ezekiel 3:17,18).

Are you faithfully doing the work of the Lord? Don't say, "I was" or "I will be." Get busy so that you can honestly answer, "I am!"

There was a certain Levite man called Elkanah of Ramathaim Zophim of the Mount of Ephraim. He was a descendent of Kohath (1 Chronicles 6:22-27). He had two wives. Their names were Hannah and Peninnah, meaning grace and pearls. Peninnah had children, but Hannah was barren. The whole family used to go to Shiloh every year to worship and sacrifice to the Lord Jehovah.

Elkanah loved Hannah, but her adversary "...provoked her severely, to make her miserable, because the Lord had closed her womb...therefore she wept and did not eat" (1 Samuel 1:6,7). Because of Peninnah, her heart was grieved. "And she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed to the Lord and wept in anguish. Then she made a vow and said, 'O Lord of hosts, if You will indeed look on the affliction of Your maidservant and remember me, and not forget Your maidservant, but will give Your maidservant a male child, then I will give him to the Lord all the days of his life, and no razor shall come upon his head" (10,11).

She weaned and brought the child before the presence of the Lord and said to the priest, Eli, "For this child I prayed, and the Lord has granted me my petition which I asked of Him. The great bitterness and sorrow of Hannah's life brought her closer to God. James said, "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (James 4:8). Peter said, "...that the genuineness of your faith, being much more precious than gold that perishes, though it is tested by fire, may be found to praise, honor, and glory at the revelation of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 1:7). God said, "Call upon Me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you and you shall glorify Me" (Psalm 50:15). King David of Israel sang, "Give ear, O Lord, to my prayer; and attend to the voice of my supplications. In the



# Lydia's Open Heart

Recorded in Acts 16:13-15 is the conversion of a woman named Lydia. The apostle Paul (with Silas, Luke, and Timothy accompanying him) had gone to the city of Philippi on his second missionary journey for the purpose of preaching the Gospel of Christ. While there, on the Sabbath day, Paul and his companions went down by a riverside to pray. Some women had also gathered there, including a lady by the name of Lydia. She was from the city of Thyatira, and being a seller of purple goods, was evidently in Philippi on business. She was a believer in God, and had apparently become acquainted with other believers, and in their company had gone to this place of prayer. It was there that she and the others met Paul and his helpers and obviously listened as the Gospel was taught.



Upon hearing the message of salvation so graciously offered by God through Jesus Christ, the Bible informs us that the Lord "opened" her heart

to give heed. As a result of her receiving the Word, she was baptized, as was her household.

Some theologians have mistakenly interpreted the opening of Lydia's heart to mean that in some direct, overpowering fashion, God arbitrarily did the "opening" independent of Lydia's will. This, however, is a false conclusion.

The truth of the matter is that Lydia herself was responsive to the will of God as taught by Paul. Notice that verse 14 clearly states that Lydia "heard" what Paul and those with him had to say. Because of her receptive attitude to the Gospel, the Bible thus characterizes the Lord as having opened her heart. This should be understood in the same sense as the Bible telling us that God "hardened" the heart of Pharaoh. God did not harden Pharaoh's heart independent of his will, but only as he hardened his own heart. [Read Exodus 7:3,13,14, in the light of Exodus 7:22; 8:15,32; 9:34; and 1 Samuel 6:6.] The principle is this: whoever hardens his/her own heart against God's Word, the Almighty One has decreed that indeed such a person's heart will be hardened! But on the other hand, whoever is receptive and responsive to opening up his/her heart to God's message and His will, such a person's heart will be opened. Never does God arbitrarily and directly either "open" or "harden" a person's heart independent of his/her own free will.

Lydia was a person who wanted to obey God, and when she learned what His will was through the preaching of the Gospel by Paul and his companions, she responded to it. She obeyed her Lord by being baptized. Read what Jesus taught in Matthew 28:18,19 and Mark 16:15,16. In that sense...as Lydia listened and heard (received) the Gospel, the Lord "opened" her heart. The principle is also seen in such references as Matthew 7:7,8; Acts 13:44-46; Acts 17:11,12; James 4:6b-8; etc.

If we will open our hearts to God, our hearts will be opened. If we draw near to Him, He will draw near to us. But, if we harden our hearts against God, our hearts will be hardened. If we turn our backs on Him and walk away from Him, He will "give us up" to that course of action. Read Romans 1:20-28.

### Joshua, Moses' Successor Gary C. Hampton

We can learn what God desires in and from a leader by looking at Joshua, Moses' successor, a man of faith. He, along with Caleb, rejected the report of the ten faithless spies and urged the people to go up at once to take the land (Numbers 13:11-14). Their confidence was based on their trust in the Lord's ability to deliver them.

God prepared Joshua for leadership through a series of events. It was he who led the people in battle against Amalek (Exodus 17:8-16). He was with Moses when he went up to God on the mount (Exodus 24:12,13) and when Moses came down and found the people worshiping the golden calf (32:15-20). He witnessed the unselfish nature of Moses when he would not forbid Eldad and Medad to speak for God in the camp (Numbers 11:24-30). The Father directed Moses to lay hands on Joshua to symbolize the transfer of authority (27:15-23).

Joshua's first instruction was to lead the Israelites and their flocks and herds over the Jordan (Joshua 1:1,2), a river which can reach up to a mile in width at flood stage. God promised to give the people all the land He had promised Abraham (1:3,4). The land was to be theirs, based on the condition that they would receive only that upon which they walked with the soles of their feet. It was theirs for the taking, from the Arabian Desert on the south to the mountains of Lebanon on the north, and from the Euphrates River on the east to the Mediterranean Sea on the west.

God promised to sustain Joshua just as He had supported Moses in all the works he did under the direction of the Almighty. Joshua knew that no man — even powerful Pharaoh — had been able to successfully oppose Moses. God promised that none would be able to oppose him either. The Lord's strength was his as long as he obeyed the commands. Prosperity and success would arise from keeping the law which was designed for man's good (1:5-9). We, now, must be careful to obey the new law, the law of Christ, if we want God to be with us.

# What About the Ten Commandments?

The question comes to me, "If we are not under the Old Testament, which includes the Ten Commandments, does that mean we are no longer under the Ten Commandments?" You might be shocked, but yes, it certainly does.

Does that mean we can kill, steal, commit adultery, etc.? Certainly not,

for these laws are included in the New Testament, with the exception of one of the Ten Commandments, "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it Holy" (Exodus 20:8) That is why Christians no longer worship on Saturday — the Sabbath — but on Sunday, the Lord's Day, the first day of the week, the resurrection day of our Lord, in honor of Him who died for us.

We have no command in the New Testament to obey the Sabbath day and keep it holy, yet the other nine of the original Ten Commandments are there, with elaboration that reaches to the heart of each one. This is no mistake, but is the will of God for man today.

Remember the words of the apostle Paul in Romans 7:4, "Therefore, my brethren, you also have become dead to the law through the body of Christ, that you may be married to another — to Him who was raised from the dead, that we should bear fruit to God." In other words, when Christ died on the cross, the Old Testament Law (including the Ten Commandments) was taken out of the way. "But now we have been delivered from the

law, having died to what we were held by, so that we should serve in the newness of the Spirit and not in the oldness of the letter." (Romans 7:6). Should you follow a law from which Christ has delivered you? Certainly not, and that is why we follow the New Testament of Jesus Christ.

"... clearly you are an epistle of Christ, ministered by us, written not with ink but by the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of flesh, that is, of the heart. ... But if the ministry of death, written and engraved on stones, was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not look steadily at the face of Moses because of the glory of his countenance, which glory was passing away, how will the ministry of the Spirit not be more glorious? For if the ministry of condemnation had glory, the ministry of righteousness exceeds much more in glory. ... But even to this day, when Moses is read, a veil lies on their heart. Nevertheless when one turns to the Lord, the veil is taken away. Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Corinthians 3:2,3,7-9,15-18).

## Law or "in God's Image"? Was "the Law of Moses" God's first law for humanity?

# Is the Church Building a "Sanctuary"?

A congregation should build an attractive facility it can afford. Some have overbuilt and planned greater than they can finance. A church may choose to erect a building with architectural design rather than just a "cracker-box". It may include a steeple and stained glass if this adds to attractiveness and aesthetics. God believes in the beautiful, as is seen in a bank of luscious red roses. He gives us a beautiful sunset to enjoy.

However, even with many embellishments of the "auditorium" it does not become a "sanctuary", yet there seems to be a trend to use that terminology today without Bible approval. This has become an acquired view because the Old Testament sanctuary was for worship, and since the auditorium is set for worship, the conclusion by some is to call it a "sanctuary". This does not have divine sanction.



## SANCTUARY IN THE OLD TESTAMENT

In the Old Testament, the sanctuary and temple were to be reverenced as holy. From the following passages, they were a part of Jehovah worship. "And let them make Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among them" (Exodus 25:8); "You shall keep My Sabbaths and reverence My sanctuary: I am the Lord" (Leviticus 19:30); "Praise the Lord! Praise God in His sanctuary; Praise Him in His mighty firmament!" (Psalm 150:1). [All Scripture references are from the New King James Version,

unless otherwise noted.] It is observed that the Sabbath and sanctuary were in the same verse, which shows both were of the Old Covenant.

Jesus cleansed the temple, which was holy. "Then Jesus went into the temple of God and drove out all those who bought and sold in the temple, and overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves. And He said to them, 'It is written, "My house shall be called a house of prayer, but you have made it a 'den of thieves'" (Matthew 21:12,13). This rebuke does not apply to the Christian age in our church auditorium.

In the time between the testaments, the temple was desecrated by a Syrian heathen emperor, Antiochus Epiphanes, in 167 B.C. He conquered many countries, including Jerusalem. He erected in the temple a heathen idol, Zeus Olympus. On this idol he offered a sow (pork) and smeared the furniture with the liquid in which the sow was cooked. He was captured by Judas the Maccabean. Antiochus violated the temple that was holy (*Digest of the Bible*, p.619).

#### THE NEW TESTAMENT SANCTUARY

No longer are we under the Old Covenant, but now we have a New Covenant. "But now He has obtained a more excellent ministry,




inasmuch as He is also Mediator of a better covenant, which was established on better promises ... In that He says, 'A new covenant,' He has made the first obsolete. Now what is becoming obsolete and growing old is ready to vanish away" (Hebrews 8:6,13).

In our dispensation, Christians are not required to go to the temple. Stephen, the martyr, stated that we can worship any place. "However, the Most High does not dwell in temples made with hands" (Acts 7:48). Paul also confirmed the same truth. "God, who made the world and everything in it, since He is Lord of heaven and earth, does not dwell in temples made with hands" (Acts 17:24). Christ taught a universal place. "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). The "gathering together" with Christ is what is important, not the place of gathering.

The worship today is in the "true tabernacle", which is the church. Hebrews 8:2 speaks of Jesus as "a Minister of the sanctuary and of the true tabernacle which the Lord erected, and not man...." The "first covenant" had a "worldly sanctuary," but this is past. "Then indeed, even the first covenant had ordinances of divine service and the earthly sanctuary. For a tabernacle was prepared: the first part, in which was the lampstand, the table, and the showbread, which is called the

sanctuary" (Hebrews 9:1,2). The inspired writer showed that the old sanctuary had animal sacrifice, and obviously the church auditorium does not offer "beasts". "For the bodies of those animals, whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest for sin, are burned outside the camp" (Hebrews 13:11).



#### CHURCH IS NOT MATERIAL

The church existed before church buildings were built. The early church met in the homes of Christians, and often in secret because of persecution. It was hundreds of years before specially-constructed meeting houses began to be used. The New Testament calls the church itself a spiritual building, a house, and a temple. "For we are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, you are God's building ... Do you not know that you are the temple of God and that the Spirit of God dwells in you?" (1 Corinthians 3:9,16). "For this One has been counted worthy of more glory than Moses, inasmuch as He who built the house has more honor than the house. For every house is built by someone, but He who built all things is God" (Hebrews 3:3,4).

The teaching by Christ of "binding" and "loosing" helps us understand the place of worship, bound and loosed. He said, "...whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16:19b). Worship is bound (John 4:24), but it is loose as to the place, which can be anywhere — under a tree, in a home, in a church auditorium.

True worship in an auditorium is more important than the building. In it we must be holy, conscious of Him in Whose presence we have come. "Be holy, for I am holy" (1 Peter 1:16).

Calling the church building a "sanctuary" is not God-approved and is unnecessary. We must respect what takes place in an auditorium, but we should not have an attitude of sacredness toward the building itself. "Let all things be done decently and in order" (1 Corinthians 14:40).

#### **Introduction:**

- For Peter, the sound of a rooster crowing brought the deepest of sorrows.
- As we examine that moment in Peter's life, we will also consider when the rooster crows for us.

#### **Body:**

#### I. WHEN THE ROOST-ER CROWED FOR PETER.

A. In the Upper Room, Jesus warned, "You will all fall away because of Me this night..." (26:31.)

(NKJV uses the word "stum-

ble," NRSV has "become deserters".



- **B.** Peter refused to accept this and began a 3-step journey toward a crowing rooster:
- The first step was doubt. He questioned Jesus' word (Vs. 35; 1 Corinthians 10:12).
- The second step was distance. He followed from afar (vss. 56,57).

- The third step was denial. He swore he did not know Jesus! (Matthew 26:70-72,74).
- C. Luke tells us that at this point: "... the Lord turned and looked at Peter" (Luke 22:61). In the midst of all that was happening to Him, Jesus knew exactly what was happening to Peter.
- **D.** When Peter realized what he had done, "... he went out and wept bitterly" (Vs. 75).

#### II. WHEN THE ROOSTER CROWS FOR US.

- **A.** We have all stood where Peter stood! Too often, when reality hits our good intentions, we deny Christ.
- **B.** When the rooster crows, it is time for three reactions:
- A time for remembrance. "And Peter remembered..." (Matthew 26:75a; Revelation 2:5).
- A time for repentance. "*He went out an wept bitterly...*" (vss. 75b; 2 Corinthians 7:10.)
- A time for renewal. "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" (John 21:15-17).
- **C.** When the rooster crows, it is not the end unless we allow it to be the end!
- **D.** Lessons we all need to learn:
- Anyone can fall (Romans 3:23).
- When you fall, it does not have to be the end (1 John 1:9).

#### **Conclusion:**

The Devil has two favorite lies:

- "It is too soon..."
- "It is too late."

### The Crucifixion of Jesus

A number of individuals have through the years mentioned hearing brother Doug Leatherman preach on the crucifixion of Jesus. A request was made to put his sermon into manuscript form. Upon receipt of the writings, I read them and was moved by the simple yet graphic discussions about Jesus's death on the cross. The reason for putting this into print is to send it to many parts of the world to help others have a better understanding of what Jesus has done for each of us individually. Our Lord did what no one else could do for you and me.

Douglas Leatherman, M.D. is well qualified to write about the crucifixion of Jesus. He is an avid student of the Word of God. He is a medical doctor who was widely respected during his time of practice. He has served the church of Christ in many ways in a number of congregations. He has been a teacher, a deacon, has preached on a number of occasions and has been a counselor for numerous people. He is considered to be an excellent instructor in the Word.

Due to health problems Doug is no longer active in his medical practice but remains active in the work of the church. Doug and Peggy, his wife, now reside in Enid, Oklahoma. They have a son and two daughters along with several grandchildren. While health problems have not allowed them to move at the same pace in life, it has not dampened their desire to remain true to the Word of God and help reach the lost.

# The Crucifixion of Jesus

## Douglas Leatherman, M.D.

In this lesson a discussion of some of the physical aspects of the passion, or suffering, of Jesus Christ will be explored. We shall follow Him from Gethsemane through His trial and His scourging to His last hours on the cross. This material is an accumulation from



various books, papers and commentaries over the past several years. I realized that I had taken the crucifixion more or less for granted all these years — that I had grown callous to its horror by an easy familiarity with the grim details and had formed a distant friendship with Him who gave His all for my sins. It finally occurred to me as a physician that I did not know or even presume to understand the actual immediate cause of His death.

The Gospel writers do not help too much on this point, because crucifixion and scourging were so common during their lifetime that they undoubtedly considered a detailed description to be totally superfluous; so we merely have the concise words of the evangelist Matthew, "Pilate having scourged Jesus, delivered Him to them to be crucified ... and they crucified Him." (Matt 27)

Dr. Pierre Barbet, a surgeon, did extensive research on this — both on an historical and experimental basis. However, he relates to too many relics and questionable artifacts in which he postulates the cause of death. The infinite spiritual suffering of the Incarnate God in atonement for the sins of fallen men I have no competence to discuss. However, the psychological and anatomical aspects of our Lord's suffering we can explore in some detail. That is, what did the body of Jesus of Nazareth actually endure during those hours of torture?

### The Cross

Crucifixion is the execution of a person by fixation to a cross. It apparently was first known by the Persians. Alexander and his generals brought it back to the Mediterranean world — to Egypt and Carthage. The Romans apparently learned the practice there and (as with most everything the Romans did) rapidly developed a high degree of efficiency and skill in carrying it out. A number of Roman authors (Livy, Tacitus, Cicero) comment on it. Many innovations and modifications are described in ancient literature.

The Christian or Latin cross as known today can only be traced back to the fifth century A.D. — and that an ivory cross in a London museum. Early Christians abhorred the cross and refused to write or describe it. The most common form used was the "T" or Tau cross, which was comprised only of two parts: the stipes, an upright pole or beam, and the patibulum, or cross armpiece. This was the common form used at the time of Christ. It was efficient, quick, and deadly. There is overwhelming evidence in recent archaeological findings that this was the most common type used.

The upright post (stipes) or beam was permanently fixed in the ground with a notch at the top into which the patibulum or crossbar could be slipped without

trouble. This crossbar would weigh from one hundred to one hundred and twenty pounds and the condemned man was made to carry this to the site of execution. It was during the Dark Ages that the cross was depicted in paintings, giving us the impression that Christ carried the entire cross.

These same painters also placed the nails in the hands, again a misconception, for they would easily strip out through the fingers. If we turn to the early scholars of both modern and ancient anatomy, we always find that *the forearm is included in the anatomy of the hand*. This does not refute the saying of Jesus to Thomas, "Behold, my hands."

A titulus, or small sign, stating the victim's crime was usually carried in front of the procession and later nailed to the top of the cross; this would give it somewhat the characteristic form of the Christian or Latin cross.

### The Physical Suffering of Christ

The initial agony and suffering began in the garden of Gethsemane when Christ knew His time had come. Luke tells us, "And being in agony, He prayed more earnestly: and His sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground" (Luke 22:44).



Many critics have questioned this; however, a brief search into medical literature reveals a condition known as hematodrosis or bloody sweat. It occurs in the sweat glands of the body when a person is under extreme physical and mental anguish. This process of bloody sweat started the weakening and possible shock of the physical body of our Savior.

We move rapidly through the betrayal and arrest. It must be stressed again that important portions of the suffering of Christ are missing from the Gospel accounts. This may be frustrating but in order to adhere

to our purpose of discussing only the purely physical aspects of the suffering, we will not delve into the emotional torment He must have suffered.



After the arrest in the middle of the night, Jesus had six trials — all containing unjust and false accusations. When He was brought before the Sanhedrin and Caiaphas the high priest, He suffered the first physical trauma. They mocked Him, spat on Him and struck Him in the face. In the morning, Jesus, battered, bruised, dehydrated and exhausted from a sleepless night, was taken to the Fortress Antonia (part of which remains today). Here Pilate examined Him and passed the responsibility to Herod Antipas. At the hand of Herod, He again apparently suffered physical mistreatment, then was returned to Pilate. It was then that Pilate ordered Barabbas released and condemned Christ to scourging and crucifixion.

There is much disagreement among the authorities as to the scourging. This was a Roman, not a Jewish, custom. The hands were tied high to a tree or post. A whip was made of a short wood handle and heavy leather straps bearing usually the sharp bones of sheep knuckles or lead balls on the ends. The Jews forbade more than forty lashes (thirty nine was the maximum allowed), but the Romans did not have this limit. The scourging was usually carried out by a Roman soldier. The whip was brought down upon the bare back, cutting the skin first; then as the beating progressed, the muscles were laid bare, bruised and bleeding with marked loss of blood. In a significant number of instances this was enough to kill a man. Ribs were

broken, nerves exposed. Again and again, down came the whip until either death or unconsciousness resulted. Both venous and arterial bleeding occurred. Large deep, dark, bruised surfaces began to appear. Finally the skin of the back would be hanging in long shreds, the whole area an unrecognizable mass of torn, bleeding tissue.

Now the half-fainting Jesus was untied and slumped to the pavement, wet in His own blood. The Roman solders saw great jest in this provincial Jew claiming to be a king. They threw a robe across His bleeding shoulders and placed a reed in His right hand and a crown of thorns was pressed upon His head. This crown was made up of flexible branches covered with long thorns (commonly used as firewood). Again there was copious bleeding because the scalp is one of the most vascular areas of the body. Because they mocked Him and struck Him across the head, driving the thorns deeper into the scalp, more blood was lost. Finally tiring of their sadistic sport, the robe was torn from His back. The adherent clots of blood and scrum clung to the robe and the back wounds were opened up again to massive bleeding and excruciating pain, almost as if He were being whipped again.

In deference to Jewish custom, the Romans returned His garments. The heavy patibulum was tied across His bleeding shoulders. The procession of Christ, Roman soldiers and the women began the slow journey to the place of the stipes. Together with the exhaustion, scourging, blood loss and deep agony, His attempt to walk erect failed, and He stumbled, awakening the painful back. The rough wood scraped across the exposed flesh. He tried to rise but human muscles had been pushed beyond their endurance. The centurion, anxious to get on with the execution, selected a North African, Simon of Cyrene, to carry the cross. Jesus followed, still bleeding, sweating and, in all probability, in cold, clammy shock, to the place of Golgotha. Upon arrival, Jesus was then thrown to the ground on His bleeding back and quickly

the centurion hammered a large spike in the wrist of one arm, then the other. The arms were not stretched taut but were left sagging to allow flexion and movement. The patibulum or crossbar was then attached to the top of the stipes. Quickly the feet were nailed, the left then the right, with




the same size large crude nail. They were nailed through the arch of the foot leaving the knees in a flexed position. The title "King of the Jews" was nailed to the top of the cross.

With the knees flexed, toes downward, the full pressure of the body was placed on the nerves of the feet. When this could be tolerated no more, the body would sag so the entire body weight was borne by the nails through the forearm. This produced excruciating pain on the median and ulnar nerves of the hand until it could be tolerated no more. Again the knees were straightened as much as possible. This process of seesawing up and down further weakened and exhausted the body.

At this point, great waves of cramps would sweep over the entire body, the arms fatigue, then the legs fatigue. With these cramps came the inability to push upward. Hanging by His arms, the pectoral muscles would be paralyzed and the intercostal muscles unable to act. Air could be drawn into the lungs but could not be exhaled. Jesus fought to raise Himself in order to get even one short breath. Finally, carbon dioxide would build up in the lungs and bloodstream and the cramps

would partially subside.




Spasmodically, was able to push himself upward to exhale and bring in the life-giving oxygen. It is most likely that during this time He uttered the short seven sentences which are recorded. The first was spoken while looking down at the Roman soldiers throwing dice for His seamless garment: "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." The second was to the penitent thief: "Today thou shalt be with me in Paradise." Then looking at the terrified and griefstricken John, he said: "Behold, thy mother," and

looking to Mary, His mother: "Woman, behold thy son." The fourth cry was from the beginning of Psalm 22: "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

He had endured hours of limitless pain, cycles of twisting, joint-rending cramps, intermittent partial asphyxiation, searing pain as tissues were torn or stretched from the nail wounds. His lacerated back yielded to unrelenting pain as He plied up and down on the cross of rough timber. Then another agony began, a crushing pain deep in the chest as the pericardium (a sac around the heart) slowly filled with fluid due to the extreme trauma and shock. The heart became compressed by the fluid. Let us remember again Psalm 22:14: "I am poured out like water and all my bones are out of joint; my heart is like wax; it is melted in the midst of my bowels."

It was now almost over. Loss of tissue fluid had reached a critical level, the compressed heart was struggling to pump heavy, thick, sluggish blood into the vital tissues. The tortured lungs were making a frantic effort to gasp in small gulps of air. The markedly dehydrated tissues sent their stimuli to the brain — Jesus gasped His fifth cry, "I thirst." Let us remember another verse from the prophets in Psalm 22:15; "My strength is dried up like a potsherd and my tongue cleaveth to my jaws and thou hast brought me into the dust of death."



A sponge soaked in posca, the cheap, sour vinegar wine which was the staple drink of the Roman legionnaire, was lifted up to His lips. He apparently didn't take any of the liquid. The body of Jesus now was in extremis and He could feel the chill of death creeping through His tissues. This realization brings out His sixth words, probably little more than a tortured whisper, "It is finished." His mission of atonement had been completed. Finally, He could allow His body to die. With one last surge of strength, He once again pressed His torn feet against the nail and straightened His legs, taking a deeper breath and uttering His seventh and last recorded cry: "Father, into thy hands, I commit my spirit."

In order not to profane the Sabbath, the Jews asked that the condemned man be removed from the cross. The Romans usually left the bodies on the cross to rot. The common method of ending a crucifixion was fracturing — the breaking of the bones of the legs — preventing the victim from raising himself to breathe. The victim then died from suffocation. When the soldiers came to Jesus, they found that He was dead already, so they pierced His side for confirmation, but did not break His legs, as had been prophesied in Psalm 34:20 and 22:16.




Remember God's most precious gift to man was His only begotten son. His saving power is free if we but obey his commands. Do we understand just how deep and all encompassing this love is? I think not; if it were so, then all mankind would be brothers and love would abound everywhere.

Solomon said, "The conclusion, when all has been heard is ... fear God and keep his commandments for this is the whole duty of man" (Ecclesiastes 12:13).

### The Resurrection of Jesus

Jesus, whose crucifixion we have just reviewed, said: "Come to Me all who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me for I am gentle and lowly in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light" (Matthew 11:28).



Do you not know that as many of us as were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? Therefore we were buried with Him through baptism into death, that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been united together in the likeness of His death, certainly we also shall be in the likeness of His resurrection, knowing this, that our old man was crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin. For he who has died has been freed from sin. Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him, knowing that Christ, having been raised from the dead, dies no more (Romans 6:3-9).

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- \* For just a moment, put yourself in a village in Africa, or even in a large city in India, or in the jungles of South America. You are an immortal soul, living in a perishing body. How will you knowledgeably prepare for the judgment and eternity that awaits us all?



### **Does God feel emotions?**

There are precious identifications with God in the emotions we, as humans, experience. We are made in God's image; we have the capacity to feel love, longing, sorrow — yes, what we feel is human-sized, but it is a very real sharing with what God feels toward the souls of mankind! Listen to His words:

"The Lord your God in your midst, the Mighty One, will save; He will rejoice over you with gladness, He will quiet you with His love, He will rejoice over you with singing" (Zephaniah 3:17). (1) The omnipresent God is here, in our midst, not sitting off in the distant heavens and merely observing what is going on in the world, as the religions of the East teach. (2) Our behavior elicits response from Him: gladness, singing! It is an amazing thought that the very God of creation can be moved to joyful singing because of something a mere human has done!

Through the prophet Hosea, God described His patient and gentle care for His people: "When Israel was a child, I loved him.... I taught Ephraim to walk, taking them by their arms; but they did not know that I healed them. I drew them with gentle cords, with bands of love, and I was to them as those who take the yoke from their neck. I stooped and fed them..." But in response to their disobedience and idolatry, God cried, "How can I give you up, Ephraim? How can I hand you over, Israel? ... My heart churns within Me..." (Hosea 11:1,3,4,8).

We cannot read these words without feeling in our own hearts all the emotions we know toward our own children, or toward the ones to whom we would give spiritual birth through the Gospel — the love, the patience in helping them to take their first stumbling steps, the kissing of the wounds when they fall, the gentleness and love with which we lead them along, easing their burdens whenever we can, even bending down to their little heights to provide whatever care they need. God used these very words to describe His emotionally-induced provisions for His children. But in Israel's disobedience that required correction, what strong words God used to describe what the thought of that punishment did to His own heart: it **churned** within Him! What an amazing Father we have!
