# One Race and One Body

#### One Race

Acts 17:26 informs us that God "...made from one blood every nation of men to dwell on all the face of the earth..." (NKJV, KJV, YLT, etc.). Other translations of the same verse

read somewhat differently but teach the same truth. "...he made of one every nation of men to dwell on all the face of the earth..." (ASV). "...he made from one man every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth..." (ESV). "From one man he made every nation of men, that they should inhabit the whole earth..." (NIV). "...He made out of one source material every nation of mankind to inhabit the entire surface of the earth" (Wuest's New Testament Expanded Translation). (The derived Greek text from which the KJV and similar translations were translated relies on a large quantity of manuscripts, while the ASV and other translations depend on a derived Greek text from three or so older manuscripts, therefore, supposedly of higher quality.)

Irrespective of the translation above to which one turns respecting Acts 17:26, it ought to be obvious to every Bible-believer that actually there is only one race—the human race. Dissimilarities of skin pigmentation, hair color, eye color, physique, ethnicity, culture, language, gender (i.e., male or female), age, economics, education, social status, habitat and such like are relatively irrelevant and do not alter the fact that every person is a part of **THE human race**. Everyone—who has ever lived, is now living or who shall ever live—has Adam and Eve as his or her first biological, ancestral parents (Genesis 1:28). We're all related to Adam and

Eve; every human being ultimately belongs to the same extended family. We are all brothers and sisters through Adam and Eve. Later in human history and following the universal flood of Noah's day, God at that time charged Noah's family to repopulate the earth (Genesis 9:1). Therefore, every human being likewise is a descendant of those eight souls who disembarked Noah's ark (1 Peter 3:20). Once more, we emphasize that we are brothers and sisters through the expanded family of Noah.



We are all humans and equally related to our first parents—Adam and Eve—and subsequently related likewise to Noah's family. It is no wonder, then, that God is no respecter of persons (Romans 2:11; 1 Peter 1:17). That being true, the Gospel—God's plan for the redemption of humanity—is for all of mankind irrelevant of dissimilarities of skin pigmentation, hair color, eye color, physique, ethnicity, culture, language, gender, age, economics, education, social status, habitat and such like. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek" (Romans 1:16 NKJV). "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). "... make disciples of all nations..." (Matthew 28:19). No member of the human race is exempted from the potential blessings of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### One Body

When **anyone**, irrespective of dissimilarities of skin pigmentation, hair color, eye color, physique, ethnicity, culture, language, gender, age, economics, education, social status, habitat and such like, conforms to that Gospel, then, he or she is "saved" and added to the church of the Bible by Jesus Christ Himself (Acts 2:47). The New Testament categorizes all of humanity into two groups—Jews and non-Jews or Gentiles. Through compliance with the Gospel, people from those two groups become **one body**.

Therefore remember that you, once Gentiles in the flesh—who are

called Uncircumcision by what is called the Circumcision [Jews] made in the flesh by hands—that at that time you were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers from the covenants of promise,



having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For He Himself is our peace, who has made both one, and has broken down the middle wall of separation, having abolished in His flesh the enmity, that is, the law of commandments contained in ordinances, so as to create in Himself one new man from the two, thus making peace, and that He might reconcile them both to God in one body through the cross, thereby putting to death the enmity. And He came and preached peace to you who were afar off [Gentiles] and to those who were near [Jews]. For through Him we both have access by one Spirit to the Father. (Ephesians 2:11-18)

Non-Jews and Jews who obey the Gospel are "fellow citizens...and

members of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:19). Non-Jews and Jews "who do not obey the Gospel" (2 Thessalonians 1:8; 1 Peter 4:17) remain interrelated and equal through their biological, ancestral relationship to Adam and Eve, as well as to Noah's family, but they are not family members of the household of God—the "one body" (Romans 12:4-5; 1 Corinthians 12:12, 20; Ephesians 4:4; Colossians 3:15)— "the church" (Ephesians 1:22-23; 5:23; Colossians 1:18, 24). "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free—and have all been made to drink into one Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:13). "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:27-28). Each child of God, without distinction owing to dissimilarities of skin pigmentation, hair color, eye color, physique, ethnicity, culture, language, gender, age, economics, education, social status, habitat and such like enjoys spiritual equality salvation. (Only roles differ for male and female Christians, elders, deacons, preachers, and teachers.)

#### Conclusion

The artificial distinctions of the dissimilarities of skin pigmentation, hair color, eve color, physique, ethnicity, culture, language, gender, age, economics, education, social status, habitat and such like do not detract from anyone's membership in THE one race—THE human race. Neither do the peculiarities from one person to another reduce the spiritual equality and membership of any Christian in the one body—the one church of the Bible. All we are one race—the human race. All we who have believed Jesus Christ to be the Son of God or the Messiah (John 8:24), have contacted the saving blood of Jesus Christ (Revelation 1:5) by being buried in baptism into the death of Christ (Romans 6:3-4) and have been resurrected therefrom to walk in newness of life with Him (Romans 6:4-5) are "one in Christ" (Galatians 3:28). (Repentance—Acts 2:38—and professing Jesus to be the Christ—Romans 10:9-10—go along with Gospel obedience, which leads to forgiveness of past sins.) Human beings are brothers and sisters through a common ancestry with Adam and Eve, and all Christians are "heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ" (Romans 8:17).

#### Are You Spiritually Blind?

Being spiritually blind is a great, eternal tragedy, and I feel certain that most people reading this would immediately proclaim that they are not spiritually blind. Hopefully, that is true; however, we should not be so quick to assert such a statement.

For one thing, we must realize that at one time we were all spiritually blind.

Before we surrendered our lives in faith to Jesus, all of us were lost in sin. Paul declared in Ephesians 5:8, "for you were once darkness...." Scripture associates sin with darkness. When we are walking in physical darkness, we are in effect blind because we cannot see obstacles in our way. Similarly, when we are walking in sin, we are in darkness and are spiritually blind. All of mankind eventually chooses to sin against God and becomes spiritually blind. Paul affirmed this spiritual truth when he wrote, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). Yes, it is a great tragedy to be spiritually blind; however, we also need to realize that Christ came to deliver us from such a state. Part of Ephesians 5:8 was mentioned earlier, but Paul continued in the same verse, "... but now you are light in the Lord." Yes, we were all once in darkness, but we do not have to continue in darkness. We can become light by following the light of the world, Jesus Christ (John 9:5). Jesus made that statement and then proved it by giving physical sight to a man that had been born blind. Jesus came to earth to deliver us from the power of darkness. Paul declared that Jesus came to earth "to open their eyes, in order to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins and an inheritance among those

who are sanctified by faith in Me" (Acts 26:18). Only Christ can give us sight, and until we submit by faith to Him in baptism for the remission of our sins (Mark 16:16), we will remain spiritually blind.

Yet, there is one more thing we must consider. We may have done that in the past but are spiritually blind again. In Revelation 3:14-22, we find a letter written to the church in Laodicea. Verse 17 states that those Christians did not know that they were "wretched, miserable, poor, blind, and naked." Notice that these Christians were said to be blind. Obviously, they were not physically blind. They were not spiritually blind because they no longer believed in Jesus or were living such wicked lives. They were blind because they were lukewarm (3:16); they were no longer fully committed to Jesus. Unfortunately, I believe there are many Christians today in a similar situation. Due to the stresses and temptations of life, they are no longer fully committed to Christ and have become lukewarm and are, in effect, blind.

Sadly, multitudes of people today do not realize they are blind; yet, many others choose to remain blind. No one would choose to remain physically blind if the alternative were available. We might wonder why anyone would choose to remain blind. There might be several reasons, but briefly let us notice three.

**Firstly**, some choose to remain blind due to fear. The parents of the blind man in John 9 were asked why their son could now see (9:19). They knew who had made it possible for their son to see, but they were afraid to confess that because they feared the Jews (9:22). They were afraid of what the religious leaders would do to them. Thus, they remained spiritually blind due to fear. Similarly, many today believe the truth about Jesus, but they are afraid of what others may think or say about their faith, and so, they never do anything about it. Their faith is dead or worthless (James 2:26), and they remain spiritually blind.

**Secondly**, some choose to remain blind because of their allegiance to their religious leaders. After this blind man was healed, we would think that crowds of other sick and blind people would be brought to Jesus, but we do not read of such actions. Instead, we find that the friends and neighbors of the blind man brought him to the Pharisees (9:8, 13). Instead of rejoicing that a blind man had been made to see (something which had never happened before the coming of Jesus, 9:32), they were critical because it was done on the Sabbath Day. In effect, these people brought this man to their religious

leaders and asked them to solve the situation for them. These men had the power and were supposed to have all the answers. It seems they were not going to believe or do anything until their religious leaders approve them.

Masses of people are living in a similar situation today. They are following some religious leader or group, and they are not going to change their beliefs. Unfortunately, many attempt to justify such a lifestyle by asserting that if one is sincerely following a certain belief system, then surely God would save him despite his error. Jesus clearly pointed out the foolishness of such a life in Matthew 15:14. "They are blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind leads the blind, both will fall into a ditch." We must be sure we are following the true teachings of God as revealed in Scripture rather than the teachings of man (Matthew 15:7-9).

**Thirdly**, many people remain blind due to pride. The religious leaders of John 9 are examples of this distressing situation. They were facing a miracle that confirmed the deity of Jesus. They could not deny the miracle, but they could not accept the evident conclusion either. They claimed to be the only ones who could see, but in actuality, they were blind. Because of their pride and position in life, they refused to accept the plain truth as articulated by the blind man (John 9:30-34). They ridiculed this man and threw him out of the synagogue. They thought he could teach them nothing of a spiritual nature.

Likewise, multitudes today are living in a similar condition. Many are prideful of their education, social prominence or other things and refuse to seriously consider biblical teachings. Even in the church, some look down on others of lesser educational attainments and sometimes consider their religious views as not worthy of serious consideration. I have heard people say, "I am satisfied with my life!" They are satisfied with whatever situation in which they are and refuse to even consider an alternative belief. They are like the religious leaders of John 9 as described by Jesus in verse 41. "...But now you say, 'We see.' Therefore your sin remains." Isaiah pictured the sad condition of such people in Isaiah 5:21, which reads, "Woe to those who are wise in their own eyes and prudent in their own sight!"

The miracle in John 9 reminds us of the danger of spiritual blindness. It is easy to say, "I see," even while being blind. There is no shame in being blind; the only shame is in remaining spiritually blind. Let us always reflect on our lives and be sure that we can truly see spiritually.

#### PARADOXES OF CHRISTIANITY; ALONE, YET NOT ALONE

A paradox is defined as, "a statement that seems self-contradictory or absurd, yet in fact expresses a possible truth" (www.dictionary. com). The Bible is full of paradoxes. In this article, we will see that the Bible teaches that a Christian is alone, yet not alone.

#### AN EXISTING PROBLEM: SPIRITUAL ALONENESS

God made us as social beings. He meant for our relationships to have a social aspect to them. God created us to have friends (Proverbs 17:17; 18:24; 27:17). In the beginning of the creation, God said it was not good for a man to be alone. Therefore, He made a helper for man—a woman (Genesis 2:18-24). A husband and wife are to be best friends—a picture of Christ and His church (Ephesians 5:22-33).

There is something far worse than social aloneness and that is **spiritual aloneness**. Spiritual aloneness happens to every human being who becomes accountable to the law of God when he comes to realize the difference between right and wrong (Deuteronomy 1:39; Romans 7:7-13) and chooses to sin against God's law (1 John 3:4). He separates himself from a relationship with God (Isaiah 59:1-2).

This took place in the Garden of Eden. Adam and Eve had an open and special relationship with God. When Eve was tempted by the serpent, she and her husband fell into sin when they ate the forbidden fruit (Genesis 3:1-6). Thereafter, they attempted to hide from God (Genesis 3:7-8). It is very clear that they once had a wonderful relationship with their Creator, but then



horribly struck them that they were spiritually alone. They had separated themselves from God by sin. It only got worse after this as Cain murdered his brother Abel. The text says, "he went out from the presence of the Lord" (Genesis

4:16). Cain was spiritually alone without God. Every accountable human being has followed in the footsteps of Adam, Eve and Cain by choosing to sin against God. It is an ever-existing problem in our modern world.

Jesus' famous parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11–31) illustrates sinfulness. As one reads the parable carefully, he discovers that there were two lost boys. The first one that had gone away from the house realized how spiritually alone he was, and he sought to return to his father's house. He was greeted by his father. His older brother, though, was not happy about the news. At the end of the parable, it is the older brother who was **outside** the father's house. He was spiritually alone as he represented the Pharisees who needed to be restored to God.

Man has a *vacuum* in his heart, and it can only be filled by God Himself (Ecclesiastes 3:11). We need to realize our spiritual bankruptcy before God and that we desperately need Him (Matthew 5:8). God had begun already, before time, to initiate a plan to redeem those who were made in His image. Ultimately, God's strategy was to send His Son Jesus Christ to die for our sins and to reconcile us back to Himself so that we would not be left alone (1 Peter 1:20; Ephesians 1:3-14). We can have a relationship with our Creator and the sin problem can be repaired by trusting in the blood of God's dear Son, through water immersion to cleanse our sins (Acts 22:16; Romans 6:3-4; Colossians 2:11-12).

#### AN EXAMPLE OF ALONE, YET NOT ALONE

Even after we become Christians, there are times in our lives when we can feel that we are alone. Just because we trust and obey the Gospel does not mean that life is going to be convenient and easy. In fact, becoming a child of God may result in one's life becoming more difficult. If we have a strong faith, then we will realize the spiritual paradox that actually we are not alone.

Think about Joseph (Genesis 37-50). He was sold into slavery by his brothers into a foreign land. Potiphar's wife attempted to seduce him to commit adultery, and then, she falsely accused him, leading to his imprisonment. Later, the butler forgot Joseph and what he had done for him. It would have been quite easy for Joseph to think he was abandoned and he was all alone. Yet, God was actually with him! Stephen stated, "...God was with him and delivered him out of all his troubles, and gave him favor and wisdom in the presence of Pharaoh, king of Egypt; and he made him governor over Egypt and all his house" (Acts 7:9-10; Genesis 39:1-2, 21).

#### Exemplifying This Principle: Alone, Yet Not Alone

Let us apply this paradox of truth to our lives today. In Matthew 14:28-31, a raging storm came roaring on the Sea of Galilee, and the disciples thought they were going to drown. Jesus was asleep during the storm. The disciples woke Him and asked a question that was filled with anxiety and worry. The disciples felt they were alone, but they were not alone, because Jesus was in the ship with them. Jesus is with us, too, when we are going through the storms of life. Let us neither doubt nor fear, but let us always remember that He will guide us and will help land us peacefully on the blissful shore beyond this life.

In Matthew 6:25-34, Jesus gave us commandments to not worry. In fact, He stressed it three times! We sin when we allow worry to conquer our lives! Jesus stated that the Creator takes care of the birds. If He takes care of the birds, then how much more will He take care of His children? God holds the future in His hands!

Do you have difficulty facing moral choices such as fornication or drinking alcoholic beverages? Do you have that strong desire to gaze at pornography? Remember that Joseph faced some difficult choices, too. He realized that he would sin against God if he participated in those immoral activities. Joseph was not the only one to run away that day. In fact, the devil ran away as well because Joseph resisted him! James 4:7,8 states, "Therefore submit to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded." Remember that God always provides a way of escape if we will just resist the temptation and go through the door of escape (1 Corinthians 10:13)!

#### CONCLUSION

Are you experiencing spiritual aloneness? Do you now feel the guilt and shame of sinning against a holy and righteous God? Do you see the spiritual chasm you created for yourself? Jesus has rebuilt the bridge over the chasm and desires for you to walk across it and to return to your Creator by being born again by obeying the Gospel of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:18-20; 2 Thessalonians 1:7-9). You will be added to God's family—the church. In the church, we are a community that is not alone. We can help one another and encourage one another on our journey to Heaven!

#### Comfort

Have you ever noticed that the Bible notes cycles in life? Two such verses are 2 Corinthians 1:3-4, which read, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our tribulation, that

we may be able to comfort those who are in any trouble, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God." Notice in these two verses that God comforts us, and because He comforts us, we are to

comfort one another. Think about how you feel when someone offers you comfort

by a hug, just a listening ear or merely sitting at your side without a word. Notice the full cycle. God comforts us, and then, we comfort others just as God has comforted us. Remember, God is the God of all comfort. He comforts as no other.

# Evangelism! The Work of the Church

Imagine this: a person hears and understands the Gospel, he repents of his sins and is baptized into Christ. Immediately, God transforms his body into immortal substance, and he goes to his eternal home.

Wouldn't that be wonderful? No struggles. No temptations. Not one soul ever being lost! What a perfect plan!

Why didn't God think of that? Wait! If every Christian was taken to be with God the moment he was born into the family, who would be left in the world to bring that message of salvation to others? No one! So the saving power of the Gospel would have ended on the first day of the beginning of the church, and the world would have been lost in total darkness ever since then!

So, that is why we live in this alien environment, in this world whose lord is Satan—so that each one of us can be the light of Christ, shining in all the darkness of sin. Think back to your own conversion: in most cases, was it not the result of some caring Christian loving you enough to teach you the Truth? That explains why you are here, facing whatever trials and troubles Satan brings into your life. You are here to bear fruit in the form of souls saved from eternal damnation.

Jesus' farewell words to His followers included the all-important command, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned" (Mark 16:15-16). In time, as a result of their obedience to that command, great persecution occurred, and "...those who were scattered went everywhere preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). Through the dedication of those first Christians, in less than one generation, the apostle Paul could write by inspiration: "...the word of the truth of the gospel, which has come to you, as it has also in all the world..." (Colossians 1:5-6).

Even though almost 2,000 years have passed since that time, neither the command to Christians nor the work we have been left in the world to do has changed. Yet, the population has changed! How can the relatively small number of Christians take the Gospel to more than seven billion people? Is it humanly possible?

If the work was to be done solely through the efforts of humans, it would not be possible, but Jesus promised, "...lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). In John 14:18, He promised, "I will not leave you orphans." What is the message? It is that this work He has entrusted in our hands is still **His work**, and that He will be with us every step of the way.

In practical terms, what does that mean? If we look back at history, we can see: In every age, God has provided the tools the church would have to have to evangelize the world, and much more has been done than history records. God does His part. He lays the tools on the table, and then, it is the decision of Christians and the church whether or not we will use the equipment He has provided.

- Today, to evangelize such a large population, a nucleus of Christians is vital. We have just such a nucleus in the U.S.
- In order to "go into all the world," the Christians must be able to travel abroad. We have that freedom.
- Those Christians must have a currency that can be used wherever they go. We have that currency.
- English has become the world's primary language, and it is our mother tongue.

In these vital points, God has blessed the church here in the US with the necessary basic tools for going into all the world with His message of salvation. However, with so many souls, today, He knows that firstcentury tools will not be enough. So, what equipment has He laid in our hands that the early Christians did not have?

- The Bible is available in all major languages of the world and most of the minor ones at very little cost. Through the circulation of the printed Word, the message has gone before us and has helped to **make a highway** in the desert.
- The postal system is a reliable method for taking letters, Bible courses and books to every corner of the world.
- Radio and shortwave radio make it possible for people everywhere to hear the Gospel.
- Printing presses, computers and copiers mean that duplication of the message can be done inexpensively anywhere.
- Television has opened the world to the visual preaching of the Gospel via satellite.
- reasonable cost.
- The Internet is increasingly available to even the most isolated people. Churches have websites with archives of thousands of lessons available to those who can access them.
- CDs and DVDs are inexpensive tools for recording volumes of materials—the Bible in different languages and versions, commentaries, concordances and other reference materials so that even those who have no access to religious books and libraries can study God's Word.

#### WHY, GOD?

If you have ever questioned the motives or works of God, you are not alone. The Book of Habakkuk shows a meaningful dialogue between God and His prophet, Habakkuk. Looking at the historical setting, Judah (God's covenant people) was caught up in sin. In the 620s B.C., under the reign of King Josiah, Judah had experienced spiritual reform and, in many ways, had turned back to God. Habakkuk's dialogue came after the death of Josiah and following Judah's return to its sinful ways. Habakkuk questioned God twice. First, he perceived that God was inactive in the face of wickedness, and he questioned how He could allow such egregious sin to go unpunished. Second, Habakkuk questioned how God could use a more wicked people (Babylon) as a means by which to punish a less wicked people (Judah). As we look at two things that God says in response to Habakkuk, it is my hope that we can keep them in our hearts when we find ourselves asking, "Why?"

First, we serve a God who never ceases His works. In response to Habakkuk's first complaint, God said, "Look among the nations, and see; wonder and be astounded. For I am doing a work in your days that you would not believe if told" (1:5). In our mortal minds, it is impossible to see the complex ways in which God is working in this world. In the ensuing verses, God explained to Habakkuk that He had not turned a blind eye to sin and injustice. In the same way today, God is not turning a blind eye to the things of this world. Our God is very much at work, in ways we could never understand.

Second, **faithfulness to God is paramount,** even in the face of tribulation and lack of understanding. After Habakkuk's second complaint, God told him, "The righteous shall live by his faith" (2:4). There are two things we need to understand about this statement. First, **faithful living brings God's spiritual blessing.** God's message to Habakkuk was that those who are faithful to Him through hard times will live. Those faithful to God will be blessed by God. Second, **faithfulness is not a singular action, but a way of life.** As one writer said, "The true believer, declared

righteous by God, will persevere in faith as the pattern of his life."

In the face of uncertainty, we, as followers of God, can persevere. We do so in living by faith and understanding that God, even when we do not understand, never ceases His work on this earth. That brings me joy and hope, and I pray it does the same for you. God loves you.

In like manner, a person's word is only as good as the integrity of the person. It's easy to make promises but something else to fulfill them. Many times, excuses follow promises, or the person who made the promise conveniently disappears.

Aren't you glad our God is faithful in His promises? What promises He makes to us! Peter reminds us how wonderful they are. "By these He has given us very great and precious promises, so that through them you may share in the divine nature, escaping the corruption that is in the world because of evil desires" (2 Peter 1:4). Just thinking of what He promised us should cheer any heart. He has promised to be with us always (Matthew

28:20). He has promised us eternal life (1 John 2:25). He has promised His help and strength through the course of our lives (2 Thessalonians 3:3). He promises never to allow us to be tempted beyond our ability to resist (1 Corinthians 10:13). He promises that Heaven will far exceed any suffering we endure here and now (Romans 8:18). #### Our Father

"Or do you think that the Scripture says in vain, 'The Spirit who dwells in us yearns jealously'?" (James 4:5) Some have understood this Scripture to be saying that the human spirit is given over to lustful envy, not wanting to even consider the idea that the reference could be to jealousy on the part of the Holy Spirit.

First of all, this reference to "what the Scripture says" is not a direct quote from any other passage. Evidently, it is a summarizing statement of God's deep love and concern for the hearts of His people. As far back as Exodus 20:5, He described Himself with these words: "...I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God." In 2 Corinthians 11:2, we see a further declaration: "For I am jealous for you with godly jealousy. For I have betrothed you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ."

The Holy Spirit, in inspiring the writing of Scripture, is the master of choosing the right words to convey His exact meaning with the joy or sorrow He wants us to understand. Listen to His cry of anguish over the unfaithfulness of Israel:

Thus says the Lord GOD to Jerusalem: Your birth and your nativity are from the land of Canaan; your father was an Amorite and your mother a Hittite. As for your nativity, on the day you were born your navel cord was not cut, nor were you washed in water to cleanse you; you were not rubbed with salt nor wrapped in swaddling cloths. No eye pitied you, to do any of these things for you, to have compassion on you; but you were thrown out into the open field, when you yourself were loathed on the day you were born. And when I passed by you and saw you struggling in your own blood, I said to you in your blood, 'Live!' Yes, I said to you in your blood, 'Live!' I made you thrive like a plant in the field; and you grew, matured, and became very beautiful. Your breasts were formed, your hair grew, but you were naked and

bare. When I passed by you again and looked upon you, indeed your time was the time of love; so I spread My wing over you and covered your nakedness. Yes, I swore an oath to you and entered into a covenant with you, and you became Mine," says the Lord GOD. Then I washed you in water; yes, I thoroughly washed off your blood, and I anointed you with oil. I clothed you in embroidered cloth and gave you sandals of badger skin; I clothed you with fine linen and covered you with silk. I adorned you with ornaments, put bracelets on your wrists, and a chain on your neck. And I put a jewel in your nose, earrings in your ears, and a beautiful crown on your head. Thus you were adorned with gold and silver, and your clothing was of fine linen, silk, and embroidered cloth. You ate pastry of fine flour, honey, and oil. You were exceedingly beautiful, and succeeded to royalty. Your fame went out among the nations because of your beauty, for it was perfect through My splendor which I had bestowed on you, says the Lord GOD. But you trusted in your own beauty, played the harlot because of your fame, and poured out your harlotry on everyone passing by who would have it. You took some of your garments and adorned multicolored high places for yourself, and played the harlot on them. Such things should not happen, nor be...Also My food which I gave you—the pastry of fine flour, oil, and honey which I fed you—you set it before them as sweet incense; and so it was," says the Lord GOD. Moreover you took your sons and your daughters, whom you bore to Me, and these you sacrificed to them to be devoured. Were your acts of harlotry a small matter, that you have slain My children and offered them up to them by causing them to pass through the fire? And in all your abominations and acts of harlotry you did not remember the days of your youth, when you were naked and bare, struggling in your blood." (Ezekiel 16:3-22)

Can we read such words—the words as of a devoted husband to a faithless wife—and fail to comprehend God's anguish at being so heartlessly rejected by the chosen bride for whom He had done so much? Should we be surprised that the love which reached out in protectiveness and ownership would also

carry an aurora of jealousy over the object of that love? Is that response not normal in the human heart, and are we not made in the image of God?

The words that were given to Hosea in chapter 11 of that book are equally heartrending. In this portrayal, God is the loving Father with His toddler son:

When Israel was a child, I loved him... I taught Ephraim to walk, taking them by their arms; But they did not know that I healed them. I drew them with gentle cords, with bands of love, and I was to them as those who take the yoke from their neck. I stooped and fed them... My people are bent on backsliding from Me. Though they call to the Most High, none at all exalt Him. 'How can I give you up, Ephraim? How can I hand you over, Israel? How can I make you like Admah? How can I set you like Zeboiim? "My heart churns within Me; My sympathy is stirred..." (Hosea 11:1-4, 8-9)

Are you a parent? Have you felt the vulnerableness created by the allpervading love in your heart for your child? Have you experienced his joy at triumphs and his anguish at defeats? Have you gently led him along the step-by-step path to maturity? Have you felt his pain when he fell? And when there was nothing you could do to save him from his own bad choices, did the cutting and bleeding in your heart seem even greater than his own suffering?

This is the choice of precise words used by God's Spirit to describe what we, as His children, are in position to do to Him. Love in any heart creates vulnerableness. It is no less true of the love God has for us. We can, in empty and meaningless words "call Him the Most High"—use Him—but at the same time deny Him that first position in our hearts. The end result creates a struggle within Him: His justness and righteousness demand that unfaithfulness ultimately be punished, as Admah and Zeboiim were caught up in the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. On the other hand, His love for even that faithless wife and wayward child causes His heart to churn within Him with anguish and sympathetic pain because of their rejection.

Yes, His Spirit within us "yearns jealously" over us, because of His intense love (James 4:5). Never does He willingly give up one of His own.

#### The Pink Fairy Armadillo



On day six of creation, God created the beasts of the earth (Genesis 1:25). Among beasts that God created is one on the extreme end of its family tree, the pink fairy armadillo, also called a sand-swimmer because it is said to move through soil as fast as a fish swims in water. It is an animal that deserves a better understanding of its physical features and lifestyle. Let's look into the life and features of this "beast of the field" (Genesis 2:19).

The pink fairy armadillo is the smallest member of the armadillo family, only being 3.5 to 4.5 inches long and weighing about 4.2 ounces. Its life is spent in the deserts of central Argentina, and this armadillo inhabits sandy plains, dunes and scrubby grassland habitats. It gets its name from the pink color of the shell, which comes from underlying blood vessels that show up through the shell, giving it a pale rose or pink color. The pink fairy armadillos have small eyes, silky yellowish white fur and a flexible dorsal shell that is solely attached to its body by a thin dorsal membrane.

This animal is nocturnal and lives largely alone. It has a diet of mainly insects, worms, snails and various plant parts that it finds chiefly by the sense of smell and hearing. Its burrowing ability comes from its two front claws, which are extraordinarily strong and very tough.

Heavy storms and rainfall will force the pink fairy armadillos to come

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out of their burrows where they spend most of their day. The reason for this is that if the tunnels flood, their fur will get wet, and with wet fur, they cannot warm their bodies back up, especially at night. This, of course, would be fatal for this small creature.

The armadillo families are well known for the leathery shells covering the majority of their backs. The pink fairy armadillo has this characteristic also, but its shell is much softer and more flexible. This protective shell of the animal, as earlier mentioned, is only attached by a thin membrane along the spinal column of the animal, which means it is very loose on the body. It can curl up to protect the vulnerable soft underside, which is covered with a dense covering of white hairs. The armored shell consists of 24 bands that allow the animal to curl up in a ball, and the armor is flattened in the back portion of the animal so that it can compress dirt behind it as it is digging. This compression strategy is thought to help prevent tunnel collapses. It is also thought that the shell can help with temperature regulation. Since the underlying blood vessels are so close to the surface, the animal can control the amount of surface area exposed to the environment in order to gain or lose heat by moving blood deeper into its body or closer to the surface.

The pink fairy armadillo is really one of the incredibly unique beasts of the field that God has created. May we always be thankful for the exceptional creatures that have been created around us.

#### What Isaiah Would Preach Today

Isaiah was a prophet of God who preached in the 8th century B.C. He has been called the most majestic of the prophets as he wrote in eloquent and captivating language to his audience. He preached in Jerusalem during the reign of several kings (Isaiah 1:1). While Isaiah's preaching differed from preaching today, because his message was inspired by God, there are still many similarities. Likewise, we must base our preaching upon the inspired Word of God (2 Timothy 3:16-17; 1 Peter 4:11). There truly is nothing new under the sun (Ecclesiastes 1:9). Isaiah was a powerful preacher in his own era, and his messages still have application today. As we read through the Book of Isaiah, notice some of the major themes in his preaching and some of the things he would say if he were still preaching today. There is a sense in which as we read this book, apply it to our lives and share it with others that although he is dead, he is still speaking (Hebrews 11:4).

#### God Doesn't Accept All Worship

Sometimes people have the mistaken idea that God will accept whatever they offer to Him as worship, regardless of how it is presented. Isaiah would tell people today, just as he told them in ancient Israel, that this is not true. Isaiah rebuked people for offering up worship to God while mistreating people who are made in His image (Isaiah 1:11-15). God would not continue to accept their worship while they did not live in line with the Law in other aspects of their lives. They provoked the Lord's anger as they lived sinful lives and thought as long as they checked the box for worship that all would be well (Isaiah 1:2-9). People need to learn this lesson today. Just because we offer worship to God does not mean that He will accept it if our hearts are not right. We must worship in spirit and in truth (John 4:24). If we offer in worship what He asked, but do not live like we should, our worship will be rejected. If we treat people properly but worship according to our own will

and wishes, then our worship will be rejected (Isaiah 29:13). If Isaiah were preaching today, he would say worship is not something to take lightly, and God does not accept all worship (Amos 5:21-27).

#### God Is a Porgiving God

Though God's people were idolatrous and wicked, Isaiah held out hope. If they would repent, God would forgive their sins, making them as white as snow (Isaiah 1:18). God pleaded with them through Isaiah's preaching to be clean and to cease doing evil (Isaiah 1:16). He wanted them to treat the oppressed properly and to live up to their full spiritual potential (Isaiah 1:17). If they were willing to turn and to do the right thing, they would prosper. Yet, if they rebelled, they would suffer the consequences (Isaiah 1:19-20). God is known for His wrath in the Old Testament, but not enough Bible students realize the grace contained within the Old Testament as well (Exodus 34:6-7). The same God who forgives sins and extends pardon in the New Testament was offering abundant forgiveness in the Old Testament (Psalm 86:15; 103:8; 145:8). Isaiah showed a portrait of a God who does not desire to crush His people but, instead, to console them as they turn from error (Isaiah 40:1-2).

Today, Isaiah would no doubt warn people about sin and its consequences while reminding them that forgiveness is attainable (Acts 2:37-38). God does not want anyone to lose his soul. That is why He sent Jesus to be the sacrifice for the world (1 Timothy 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9). God desires to be known as the Redeemer and as the One who gives second chances to people who desire to learn from their mistakes (Isaiah 43:1). So many people give up too soon. Maybe they think they have done too many bad things or run too far from the Father's house to return, but such is not true. The blood-stained hands of Israel could be made white as snow if they repented (Psalm 51:7). The blood-stained hands of those who killed Jesus and opposed the church could be cleansed as they responded to the Gospel (Acts 22:16). Today, for those who seek the Lord, the same forgiveness is offered in Jesus Christ (Acts 13:38-39).

#### God Is Holy and Idolatry Is Foolish

One of the most famous passages in the Book of Isaiah is the vision

the prophet had in Chapter Six. Isaiah saw the Lord who he described as high and lifted up and the one Who is sitting on the throne (Isaiah 6:1). Isaiah also saw the seraphim who cry out "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord of hosts, the whole earth is full of His glory" (Isaiah 6:3; cf., Revelation 4:8). More than twenty times throughout the book, Isaiah referred to God as the Holy One of Israel (Isaiah 1:4; 5:19; 5:24; 30:12; 30:15; 41:14; 43:3). Isaiah would remind the people of God today that the Lord is the Holy One, and we should, in turn, be holy as He is holy (1 Peter 1:15-16).

The sin that plagued Israel most often was idolatry. Isaiah preached sternly against the folly of Israel's idolatry. Readers of his message are often tempted to chuckle as Isaiah mocked the idolatrous practices of his contemporaries (Isaiah 44:9-20). He reminded Israel then that there is only one God and there is no other God besides Him (Isaiah 45:6, 18, 22). Idolatry still exists today, and we need to be reminded that there is only One Who is worthy of our worship and devotion (Colossians 3:5). Isaiah would encourage Christians not to set their sights too low on the things of this earth but instead to lay up treasures in Heaven (Matthew 6:19-21). There are repeated warnings in the New Testament encouraging Christians to steer clear of idolatry (1 Corinthians 8:4-6; 1 John 5:21).

As we read Isaiah's inspired message, we need to see that with which they struggled then is that with which people still struggle today. The God Who had outstretched arms to forgive then will forgive today. Furthermore, preachers and teachers of the Word of God need to be bold enough to preach the Word (2 Timothy 4:2). **Isaiah was probably not well liked by many of his fellow Israelites, but he preached the truth anyway.** We need more preaching like that done by Isaiah, believing on Jesus and willing to suffer for His sake (Philippians 1:29). Let us study Isaiah's message and allow him to continue to speak to us today (Romans 15:4; 1 Corinthians 10:6, 11).

### Bible Commentaries and Reference Books

Donald R. Fox



Some forty-five years ago, a close friend gave me The People's New Testament by B.W. Johnson. It has simple explanatory notes and commentary on the Scriptures. It uses both the King James and the Revised versions in conjunction with Scripture crossreferences. All are easy to use, and for this, I am thankful, I am a down-to-earth man, and The People's New Testament was the very tool I needed as I started my studies of the Word of God. Currently, the pages are loose and in need of rebinding. I use it all the time and teach from it. Sometimes, I say that my complete brain is in this Testament; almost every page is loaded with per-

sonal notes I have written over the years.

Although I really enjoy Johnson's, the *People's New Testament*," I always remember that the Scriptures themselves are the final standard. My notes and B.W. Johnson's explanatory remarks are just that, our view or understanding of the Scriptures. For the greater part, B.W. Johnson's notes and my own annotations are correct and in accordance with the Scriptures. The point I am

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making is that the Word of God—the Bible—is the final and only true standard. We must not go beyond what is written. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Timothy 3:16-17 KJV).

#### Mistakes & Errors Are Part of Men's Endeavors

Johnson's explanatory notes are the work of a man, and men make mistakes. As an example, let us notice Johnson's commentary on Acts 2:1. Scripture says, "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place." Johnson states, "they were all... in one place. Not only the apostles, but the hundred and twenty disciples. They probably had an intimation that the promised day had come." With that comment, Mr. Johnson alludes that the apostles and the 120 disciples were all baptized with the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:2-4). The Bible does not teach this. Please note the last verse in Chapter 1, where it reads, "And they gave forth their lots; and the lot fell upon Matthias; and he was numbered with the eleven apostles" (Acts 1:26). Back to Acts 2:1; who are the "they"? Of course, it was the twelve apostles and not the 120.

## Only the Apostles Could Impart a Miraculous Gift of the Holy Spirit

Let us study an example of only the apostles having the baptismal measure of the Holy Spirit. The preacher Philip conducted missionary work in Samaria. The Bible says:

But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. Then Simon himself believed also: and when he was baptized, he continued with Philip, and wondered, beholding the miracles and signs which were done. Now when the apostles which were at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had received the word of God, they sent unto them Peter and John: Who, when they were come down, prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Ghost: (For as yet he was fallen

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upon none of them: only they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus.) Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost. And when Simon saw that through laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Ghost was given, he offered them money, Saying, Give me also this power, that on whomsoever I lay hands, he may receive the Holy Ghost. (Acts 8:12-19)

Philip confirmed his "preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ" (Acts 8:12) by performing "miracles and signs" (Acts 8:13). Why was it necessary to send for Peter and John who were at Jerusalem? Answer: Only the apostles were immersed, that is, had the baptismal measure of the Holy Spirit. "The preacher sent there was not an apostle. He had miraculous powers but could not confer them. There is no record of their impartation, save in or by apostolic presence" (Johnson's explanatory notes in part on Acts 8:14). We note that Mr. Johnson was correct in this case. The apostle Paul stated in Romans 1:11, "For I long to see you, that I may impart unto you some spiritual gift, to the end ye may be established."

Only the apostles could impart a gift of the Holy Spirit by the laying on of their hands. Only the apostles were promised "the Comforter" (John 16:7). This "Comforter," the Holy Spirit, would "guide" the apostles "into all truth" (John 16:13).

We all use reference books to increase our understanding and to take advantage of scholars' knowledge of the Word of God. When a scholar or a commentator makes a mistake or misunderstands the Word of God, we don't reject the whole reference book or the commentary, now do we? Our reference library has expanded to the World Wide Web. There are at our fingertips and clicks away a means to increase our understanding of all sorts of information. I choose to use all these facets of knowledge for good and to reject sinful or erroneous aspects of these tools. As the proverbial expression goes, "Don't throw the baby out with the bathwater." Let us be grateful for the abundance of research material at our disposal, but let us use it cautiously and prudently.

## You Must be Circumcised

The mention of circumcision instantly draws Bible students to the Old Testament. Circumcision was an important element of a covenant relation-

ship with God.

God promised to multiply Abraham, make him father of many nations and give his descendants land (Genesis 17:1-8). The declared. Almighty "Every male child among you shall be circumcised; and vou shall be circumcised in the flesh of your foreskins, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between Me and you" (Genesis 17:10-11).



God made it clear that the uncircumcised male would not remain in a covenant relationship with Him. "And the uncircumcised male child, who is not circumcised in the flesh of his foreskin, that person shall be cut off from his people; he has broken My covenant" (Genesis 17:14). Those who wandered in the wilderness did not circumcise their boys, and so God commanded they do so as they prepared to enter the promised land (Joshua 5:2).

Circumcision was only effective if one kept the Law perfectly. No Jew, outside of our Lord, ever did that. They were thus lawbreakers, and their circumcision was made ineffective.

Christians are now God's circumcision (Philippians 3:3), but our circumcision is of the heart. "For he is not a Jew who is one outwardly, nor is circumcision that which is outward in the flesh; but he is a Jew who is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the Spirit, not in the letter; whose praise is not from men but from God" (Romans 2:28-29).

Christians receive the cutting off of the sins of the flesh in baptism. "In Him you were also circumcised with the circumcision made without hands, by putting off the body of the sins of the flesh, by the circumcision of Christ, buried with Him in baptism, in which you also were raised with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead" (Colossians 2:11-12).

Anyone who would enjoy the blessings of Christ's covenant must be circumcised in baptism. Failing to be baptized will result in being cut off from Heaven.

In the Old Testament, the prophet Elijah sought to do right, and was persecuted by a ruling woman named Jezebel. In the New Testament, John the Baptist stood firm about the truth of certain things and

was hated by a king's wife. Herodias plotted to have John the Baptist killed. If he knows truth—and most people, including rulers go against it—is he to capitulate [surrender] or hold to truth? Proverbs 23:23 admonishes, "Buy the truth, and do not sell it…"

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# Persecution

(and the lack thereof)

In a Bible class recently, we discussed Romans 8:17, "and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if indeed we suffer with Him, that we may also be glorified together." The point was well made that all of these wonderful adjectives (e.g., heirs, heirs of God, joint heirs) were conditional on us suffering with Him.

Then, we spent a few minutes in class discussing persecution. A slide was presented that revealed Christian persecution in areas like northern Africa and many communist countries. The point was made that we don't suffer much in America, and class members gave possible reasons why (i.e., the founding fathers upheld many Christian principles, etc.). After the discussion, we moved on to verses 18 and following, but my mind stayed on verse 17.

The passage says, "if indeed we suffer with Him," but the reality is in America we try really hard to avoid suffering. The honest truth is we don't like to get out of our comfort zones, and so, we plan programs and activities that don't require us to have hard conversations with the lost. The only time we really speak up is when people who share our beliefs and worldviews surround us. Many congregations spend a great deal of their annual budget on "internal" programs so that members don't feel like they have to go out into the community and confront those who are lost. So, is the reason we are not suffering or being persecuted, because we have chosen an easier path?

Over and over, the Bible talks about Christians being persecuted and suffering. For instance, 2 Timothy 3:12 says, "Yes, and all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution." Jesus spoke of persecution in His famous Sermon on the Mount. "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:10).

Spend a few minutes looking over passages like:

1 Peter 3:14 Romans 12:14; 17-21 John 15:18-19 Matthew 5:44 Acts 14:22 John 16:33 2 Corinthians 4:8-12 James 1:2-3

Beloved, do not think it strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened to you; but rejoice to the extent that you partake of Christ's sufferings, that when His glory is revealed, you may also be glad with exceeding joy. If you are reproached for the name of Christ, blessed are you, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you. On their part He is blasphemed, but on your part He is glorified. But let none of you suffer as a murderer, a thief, an evildoer, or as a busybody in other people's matters. Yet if anyone suffers as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God in this matter. (1 Peter 4:12-15)

Is it possible the reason we don't suffer persecution is because we do not speak up? Is it possible we have become such friends with the world that it does not hate us for our religious beliefs? Is it possible that we have stopped identifying sin to those with whom we come in contact? Is it possible that we don't suffer because we avoid the hard conversations about the consequences of sin? Is it possible we don't suffer persecution because our pulpits no longer speak out strongly on judgment and hell, but rather, they continuously proclaim love and grace? Is it possible that we aren't persecuted because we expect the lost to come to us rather than we going out as we have been commanded?

I know that one day every knee will bow down and acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord. I pray that on that occasion, we don't find ourselves outside the body of Christ because we desired comfort over persecution.



20 But now Christ is risen from the dead, and has become the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. 21 For since by man came death, by Man also came the resurrection of the dead. 22 For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ all shall be made alive. 23 But each one in his own order; Christ the firstfruits, afterward those who are Christ's at His coming. 24 Then comes the end, when He delivers the kingdom to God the Father, when He puts an end to all rule and all authority and power. 25 For He must reign till He has put all enemies under His feet. 26 The last enemy that will be destroyed is death. 27 For He has put all things under His feet. **NOTES:** The main point of this section is the importance of the resurrection. Without the resurrection of Christ, everything we do or believe is worthless, and we have no hope. The last paragraph touches on the same subject as Romans 5:12-19 and emphasizes the positive aspects of the resurrection. All powers and even Satan has been made subject to Christ, and one day, even death will be subject to Christ. The exception is God the Father, to whom Christ will always be subject.

Jeroboam. the son of Nebat. could have been a man of greatness, but he perverted God's way and became a ringleader in sin. We may think of the religion he began as a type of all manmade religions and get lessons that will help us to be on guard against such in every generation.

First, we may note that it had its origin in the human heart. "Jeroboam said in his heart" (1 Kings 12:26).



There are only two types of religions in the world. One has its origin in the will of God, and the other is in the will of man. Isaiah 55:8 says, "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are my ways your ways," and this has always been so. Jeremiah 17:9 reads, "The heart of man is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked." Out of the heart of man can never come a system of religion that meets the demands of God or the needs of the human soul. We constantly need to be aware that not only anything opposite but any deviation from or substitute for what God wants is presumptuous and rebellious. The advice of Proverbs 3:5 is still so valuable for us. "Trust in the Lord with all thy heart, and lean not on thy own understanding. In

all thy ways acknowledge Him and He will direct thy paths."

A strange question that faces us is this: Why would a person want to worship God at all if he was not sure his worship would please Him? Even a pagan with a false god would try to please that god. Yet, both Jews and Christians fall into the category mentioned by Jesus, "The people worship me with their lips but their heart is far from me, for in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matthew 15:9).

Second, we note that the establishment of this false religion had something in common with many false religions of today: He set up the golden calves in Bethel and Dan for his own selfish ends. How many of us do things related primarily to our own selfish ends? Jesus did not die for church buildings, gymnasiums and the many things for which we spend most of our resources. He died for souls, and yet, when a program is designed primarily for salvation of souls, most of the congregations in the nation contribute very little for its implementation.

Jeroboam presented his proposal for a manmade religion as for the good of others, of course. "It is too much for you to go up to Jerusalem" (1 Kings 12:28). It was hypocritical from the beginning, but that does not mean that every person doing it was hypocritical. We make a serious error when we speak and act as if all those who are members of false religions are hypocritical and dishonest. We are reasonably sure many of their leaders are. When we hear a man pretend to quote Acts 2:38 as "Repent, for the remission of your sins," we know he had to know what he left out to misquote it. There are many things done in the name of expediency that are contrary to the will of God. Remember that in order for a thing to be expedient, it must be a part of what is authorized. If God says, "Drive this nail into this board" it may be expedient to use a hammer instead of an axe, but it is improper to classify sawing the board in two as expedient. If God said, "Sing," it may be expedient to sing one or two songs, but it is not expedient to introduce a different kind of music.

In any case, it was contrary to the Word of God. Jeroboam said, "Behold thy gods which brought thee up" (1 Kings 12:28). The command of God was plain. "Have no other gods" (Exodus 20:3; Deuteronomy 5:7). There might be any number of rationalizations Jeroboam could have used. He

might have said, "These are not 'other' gods. When I said, 'These be thy gods,' I merely meant that they represented God that brought us up." This is the sort of thing that could be said by anyone who had a false god.

Whatever rationalization may be given, the command of God was plain in Exodus 20:4, "Thou shalt not make any graven images." The carnal mind wants to walk by sight and find excuses to do what it wants. Naaman said, "I thought." Even Saul of Tarsus said, "I verily thought" (Acts 26:9). Yet, the ladder to Heaven must come from Heaven. Jesus said in John 14:6, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No man cometh to the Father but by me." All the false religions that claim to be Christian claim to come by Jesus. However, a person cannot come to God by Jesus by disregarding the commands of Jesus and substituting, "I think." There is a place for "I think" or "It seems to me." That place is where God did not speak specifically about the thing. When God said "sing," He did not tell me to sing bass or tenor. I think I can sing bass better than I can sing tenor. Baptism is commanded. I think I may baptize in a creek, a river or a baptistery because God did not specify one of those. However, I have no right to substitute, "I think sprinkling is as good as baptism (immersion)" since He specified.

As always, this false religion became a snare to others (1 Kings 12:30). It is always easier to swim with the tide and go with the flow than to stand for what is authorized in the face of popular efforts to do otherwise. It usually is the beginning of a downhill path, having no regard for purity of doctrine or life. "He made priests of the lowest of the people" (1 Kings 12:31). It is important for us to realize that the kind of God we visualize and worship will determine the kind of life we live.

Like all false religions, they had a form of godliness but denied the power thereof. It had the appearance of being right. There were altars, priests and the ordained feast "like unto the feast that is in Judah" (1 Kings 12:32-33). There are thousands who would say, "There is practically no difference in my church and the church of Christ. We all have approximately the same kind of service, prayer, Bible study, communion and both practice baptism." The difference is that one was ordained of God while the other was not. It would not matter if all outward practices of a group were the same as what God ordained if they did it by the authority of some man rather than

by the authority of God; it would not be right. For example, if a person is baptized to satisfy his mother rather than "obeyed from the heart the form of doctrine delivered" (Romans 6:17), he would not thus be made free from sin even if he said, "I am being baptized for the remission of my sins."

In summarizing Jeroboam's mistakes as he formed this false religion, we may say there were at least four. First, he put politics before righteousness. Millions do that today. Some would vote for a man because he happened to be a Democrat or a Republican, or black or white, regardless of whether he was a confessed drug addict, a convicted criminal or anything else. Second, he put convenience ahead of duty. Millions also do this, even those connected with the Lord's church. Third, he put what he thought was expedient ahead of obedience. Many today make success their standard. Often those connected with the false movements have said, "Our growth and success prove that God is with us." You could prove Hinduism, Catholicism or paganism was right by that standard. Fourth, he failed to realize that we reap what we sow. Since Adam's time, men have been deluded into thinking, "The end justifies the means." "My opposition to the war is a good cause. So, I have the right to burn down a bank and shoot its president to show that I think it is wrong to be violent." "I oppose abortion as murder; therefore, I will shoot the doctor who is performing it." Many in the church today are acting just as irrationally, for they are sowing tares and looking for a harvest of wheat.

The story of Jeroboam shows both the basis and result of all false religions. We cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity of doing what God says, the way God says do it, for the purpose God says do it, at the time and place God says do it and with the motive approved of Him.

## IT'S NOT MERELY A RELIGION

Our Lord Jesus Christ did not merely found a religion. Rather, He established the kingdom of God. Therefore, the people who make up His kingdom or church (Matthew 16:18-19) are subject to the Lordship of Jesus. They live by the standards of righteousness of the kingdom of God. Jesus Christ is the Head, and His disciples are the members of His body (Colossians 1:18).



This body has only one Spirit—the Holy Spirit; only one heart—a new heart; only one mind—the mind of Christ; only one line of thinking—the Word of God; only one faith—a supernatural faith (in origin, Romans 10:17); only one character—God's character; only one guidance—the guidance of the Spirit of Jesus (2 Peter 1:20-21).

Anyone who is not in the body of Christ does not belong to the Lord Jesus. There is no use confessing Jesus as Lord if you do not obey Him or calling on Him if you do not listen to Him. Jesus said, "But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say?" (Luke 6:46 NKJV). There is no benefit from attending a church assembly if you don't behave as the Bible—particularly, the New Testament—teaches. For one to be in Jesus or to be a member of His body, a person must be born of water and the Spirit (John 3:3-5).

Especially Christians need to demonstrate in their behavior and speech that they abide by the Word of God. Impenitent, erring Christians ultimately will be rejected and vomited out like spoiled meat (Revelation 3:16). Sins sometimes observed even among Christians include hostility, gossip, prejudice and destructive criticism. "Therefore, laying aside all malice, all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and all evil speaking" (1 Peter 2:1). This type of behavior corresponds to the ungodly world and ought not to be known among the children of God (Romans 12:1-2; James 4:4). The Lord's church is supposed to be different from the world! "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness, righteousness, and truth), finding out what is acceptable to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:8-10).

To be a Christian is to be owned and led by the Spirit of Christ. "But you are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if indeed the Spirit of God dwells in you. Now if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he is not His" (Romans 8:9).

## "Reverend" and "Father"

We often see religious leaders wearing such titles as "Reverend," "Right Reverend" or "Father." Is this practice in harmony with the teachings of the Bible?

The word "reverend" is found only once in the King James Version of the Bible. The psalmist glorified God by saying, "...holy and reverend is His name" (Psalm 111:9). The word "reverend" in that verse means that the name of God is worthy of respect, fear and awe. The New King James Version translates it, "...holy and awesome is His name." "Reverend" is never used in the Bible as a title for a mere human.

The scribes and Pharisees loved religious titles. Jesus denounced the scribes and Pharisees for loving the "...greetings in the marketplaces, and to be called by men, 'Rabbi, Rabbi.'" "Rabbi" meant "Teacher" or "Master." They loved to wear that term as an exalting title. Jesus continued by warning His disciples, "But you, do not be called 'Rabbi'; for One is your Teacher, the Christ, and you are all brethren" (Matthew 23:7-8). All who are truly Christians are equal with each other as brothers and sisters. No Christian should desire a religious title that exalts him or her above any other Christian. It should be enough of an honor to wear the name "Christian."

Jesus forbid using "Father" as a religious title. "Do not call anyone on earth your father; for One is your Father, He who is in heaven" (Matthew 23:9). This command is very clear. Yet, many people use "Father" as a religious title today. Some also use the term "pope," which means "papa," which is another way of saying "father." Jesus spoke these words many centuries ago, and the passing of time has not changed His words. Jesus still forbids the use of religious titles such as "father" and "pope."

The apostles never used such exalting titles. They were simply called "Peter," "Paul" and "John." They did not want people to exalt them or to pour words of flattery upon them (Acts 10:25-26). Instead, they exalted Jesus Christ, "But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of

our Lord Jesus Christ..." (Galatians 6:14; 1 Peter 4:10-11; 5:5-7, 11).

The attitude of Job is a good example for us. It perfectly agrees with the teachings of the New Testament on this subject. Job said, "Let me not, I pray, show partiality to anyone; Nor let me flatter any man. For I do not know how to flatter, Else my Maker would soon take me away" (Job 32:21-22).

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[Editor's Note: First, the Hebrew word underlying "reverend" in Psalm 111:9 appears often in the Old Testament when it could not be construed as a title. Sometimes, though, it pertains to mortals, in particular, Moses and Joshua (Joshua 4:14) or Solomon (1 Kings 1:51). Still, these instances did not constitute titles for humans comparable to the exaltation of God in Psalm 111:9. The reverence and awe owed to God (Nehemiah 1:5; Job 37:22; Psalm 89:7), though, was and is sometimes misplaced on someone or something other than on Almighty God (2 Kings 17:7). For instance, fallible men have attributed to themselves religious titles. Secondly, the reassignment of academic or professional titles such as "Doctor," "Governor," "Judge" or "Colonel" to brethren in religious settings amounts to the same unwarranted distinction between brethren. ~ Louis Rushmore, Editor]

Luke 3 opens with an account set purposely in a historical context. Luke says in verses 1-2, "Now in the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea, Herod being tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of Iturea and the region of Trachonitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene, while Annas and Caiaphas were high priests, the word of God came to John the son of Zacharias in the wilderness." There are the names of seven governing officials from the timeframe claimed by the author. Why is this significant? If one were writing a fraudulent document trying to fool people, he would not include the names of officials that could

be checked with other historical records. The Bible, though, never shies away from setting itself in a definite, checkable historical context. The more archaeological records that are discovered, the more the historical nature of the Bible is proven.

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# Do Not Believe Every Spirit

In First Kings 13, we read about a young prophet who had honestly and resolutely refused the king's invitation, though the king promised a great reward. The prophet said, "If you were to give me half of your house, I would not go in with you; nor would I eat bread nor drink water in this place. For so it was commanded me by the word of the Lord, saying, 'You shall not eat bread, nor drink water, nor return by the same way you came'" (1 Kings 13:8-9). What a wonderful attitude we find in this man as he respected what the Lord had told him to do. Yet, in the following verses, we read he was overpersuaded by an old prophet to come back with him and eat with him in his house—contrary to the command of God.

The old prophet, as we read, had deceived him by saying, "I too am a prophet as you are, and an angel spoke to me by the word of the Lord, saying, 'Bring him back with you to your house, that he may eat bread and drink water." The text says, "He was lying to him. So he went back with him, and ate bread in his house, and drank water" (1 Kings 13:18-19). Next, we read, "Now it happened, as they sat at the table, that the word of the Lord came to the prophet who had brought him back; and he cried out to the man of God who came from Judah, saying, 'Thus says the Lord: Because you have disobeyed the word of the Lord and have not kept the commandment which the Lord your God commanded you, but you came back, ate bread, and drank water in the place of which the Lord said to you, "Eat no bread and drink no water," your corpse shall not come to the tombs of your father" (1 Kings 13:20-22). We read as he was going back to his home, a lion met him on the road and killed him. God punished him for his disobedience, just as He did Adam and Eve in the beginning and all others who disobeyed Him.

The young prophet, who had so boldly and resolutely refused the invitation of the king who promised him a reward, could not resist the insinuations of one who pretended to be a prophet or a man of God. This has always been true,

and it is today, too. Honest and sincere people are more in danger of being drawn into deception by plausible pretenders of divinity and sanctity than by external inducement. The apostle Paul cautioned, "Now I urge you, brethren, note those that cause divisions and offenses, contrary to the doctrine which you learned, and avoid them. For those who are such do not serve our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly, and by their smooth words and flattering speech deceive the heart of the simple" (Romans 16:17-18).

Therefore, we need to beware of false prophets and teachers today who are trying to mislead people everywhere by teaching things that the Bible does not teach. The apostle John said, "Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits, whether they are of God; because many false prophets have gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1). Further in verse 6, he noted the means by which such spirits or teachers are to be tested. "We are of God. He who knows God hears us; he who is not of God does not hear us. By this we know the spirit of truth and the spirit of error." The word "we" the apostle used for himself and other apostles who were the original messengers whom Christ had promised to baptize with the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:4-8; Luke 24:46-49). The Holy Spirit was promised to them to "teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you... He will guide you into all truth" (John 14:25-26; 16:12-13). The apostles were the ones who were given the authority to bind and to loose on earth, that is, to teach and to unteach by the authority of Christ (Matthew 18:18). The apostles did so while they were living and wrote for us in the New Testament all things that God wants us to know, believe and practice (2 Peter 1:20).

Yet, there is no dearth of preachers and teachers today who are telling people things that the apostles never taught, and many simple and sincere people believe their teachings as though they were the Word of God, without investigating what the Bible actually says. Had the young prophet checked with God what the old prophet had told him to do, he would not have perished. He simply believed the old prophet, thinking he was telling him the truth. This is the same mistake many are making today. It was said of the people who lived at a place called Berea, "These were more fair-minded than those at Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness, and searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether these things were so" (Acts

17:11). They just didn't believe what they were taught, but they checked in the Scriptures whether they were taught God's Word or man's teaching.

The Bible clearly says, for instance, that no one knows when Christ will come back as He has promised (John 14:1-3; Acts 1:11). Speaking about the day of His Second Coming, He plainly said, "But of that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (Mark 13:32). Yet, there have been many false prophets in the past several years who have deceived countless people by telling them they know exactly in which year and on what date Christ was going to come. Many gullible people believed them and were disappointed.

To be saved from sin, Christ taught, "He who believes and is baptized will be saved" (Mark 16:16). The apostle Peter told people to "repent and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). Yet, most preachers are telling people today to simply "accept Jesus Christ your personal Savior" or to pray "the sinners' prayer" to be saved. Again, Acts 2:47 says Christ Himself adds the saved ones to the church He Himself built (Matthew 16:18), of which He is the Head (Colossians 1:18) and which He purchased with His own blood (Acts 20:28). Yet, preachers today are telling people to join the church of their own choice and that one church is as good as another. Many false prophets have built hundreds of churches of different names and brands in the last few hundred years after Christ had built His church in the city of Jerusalem in A.D. 33.

As we look around us and witness the many religious doctrines that are being taught in the name of the Bible today by many men and even women—who are forbidden to teach and preach men publicly (1 Timothy 2:11-12)—we must realize that there are many lying prophets who are teaching things that are contrary to what God has said in the Bible. Their conflicting false doctrines and teachings have led a great number of people to believe and to accept their errors. They have caused the religious world to be badly divided, which is contrary to the prayer of Christ (John 17:21-25). "Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits, whether they are of God; because many false prophets have gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1 NKJV).

Now He who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is, because He makes intercession for the saints according to the will of God.

And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose.

What a beautiful mental picture this creates for us: As I, through His Spirit, reach out to Christ Who takes my prayer to God, then God reaches down to His lowly human child to supply the need that is crying out from my heart! What love and care!

# The Circle of Communion

God knows that humans, left alone in this world that is strongly dominated by Satan's power and influence, cannot survive without His help. Romans 8:9-11 says that the Spirit of God dwells in us. In Romans 5:5, we are told that the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us. The apostle Peter, when before the Sanhedrin, referred to "...the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey Him" (Acts 5:32).

Romans 8:26 acknowledges that often in the weakness of humanity, we don't even have the words to properly express our needs, so the Holy Spirit makes intercession for us, pouring out our hearts' cries to our Lord Who, in turn, takes the groanings to our Father. Happily, "...this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us" (1 John 5:14).

#### Will every prayer be answered with "Yes"?

God also knows that humans cannot see the entirety of our lives, so when He sees that something for which we are praying will, ultimately, not be good for us, He doesn't grant that desire. His plan for each one of us is that "...All things work together for good..." (Romans 8:28). We should be very careful to have the desire in our hearts that God's will be done, not ours, and so we must pray with a submissive spirit, wanting only what He sees is best. Never try to PERSUADE God to do what you want done!

The man with the strange odor may have contracted jungle rot fungus in the swamps of Southeast Asia as he served in our military forces. How can we thank him properly if we are so repulsed by that old person smell that we won't get near enough to know his story?

"A hoary head is a crown of glory, if it be found in the ways of righteousness" (Proverbs 16:31). One friend tells me that, at the time of her dear husband's passing, her daughter, granddaughters and their children made a commitment to have lunch with her once a week. This gives Mrs. McLemore something wonderful toward which to look and brightens her days.

How do we honor the "hoary head"? It's not as easy when dementia or Alzheimer's takes over, causing a person to say things that would never pass their lips in an earlier time. This condition is the cruelest trick of all. It makes people even harder to love. Yet really, it's just a disguise! Don't let that gruff exterior make you forget the precious person that it houses.

Nursing homes should post a picture of each resident on his or her door—not a current picture—but one taken while they were young and in their prime. It would be a great reminder to the caregivers and families that this person was not always the cantankerous or withdrawn person that houses his or her soul. No, this elderly resident had quite a different life before being relegated to a warehouse for distributing pills and sponge baths.

They are every bit as full of life inside as my dried-out iris rhizomes. "Thou shalt rise up before the hoary head, and honour the face of the old man, and fear thy God: I am the LORD" (Leviticus 19:32).

In verse 5, God explained that they loved to go through the ceremonies of worship, but they were not really worshiping! God responded to this kind of **worship** by trying to get them to repent and return to Him.

How did God try to get their attention? In verse 6, He took away their food. In verse 7, He took away the rain! In verse 9, He ruined their crops. In verse 10, He sent pestilences like those of Egypt. In verse 11, He allowed them to be defeated. Yet, in every case, God noted, "yet have ye not returned unto me, saith the Lord."

After doing so much to try to get them to really worship Him, God said in verse 12, "... prepare to meet thy God, O Israel." In other words, "I am coming in Judgment!"

Let's be sure our worship really is worship!

## COME WORSHIP WITH US

Signs in the front yards of churches may read, "Come Worship with Us." Advertisements in a local paper may conclude with the phrase, "Come Worship with Us." Think of the implications of this invitation.

This invitation to "Come Worship with Us" implies that "worship" is important to the church that is issuing the invitation. Hopefully, it will also be important to those invited. Usually, the church worships when it gathers. Of course, it may be that a church comes together at times for other purposes, such as workdays that result in the maintenance of the building and grounds or perhaps for benevolent purposes of feeding the hungry or clothing the ill clad. Yet, most of the time, worship is the reason for a church gathering. Without this worshipful gathering, the group does not qualify as a "church." That's right!

When worshipers come, they unite their voices and send forth praise to God; they commune with God, Christ and the Holy Spirit by studying God's Word—the Bible, and the personal accumulative effect of worship will be the glorification of God and the edification of individual members. Praise, commune and learn are verbs of worship.

The invitation to "come worship with us" also implies that the hosts are confident that they have learned how to worship. The Holy Spirit teaches us that "ignorant" (1 Corinthians 14:38) worship is possible. We read in Acts 17:23 that the apostle Paul had come to the Grecian city of Athens. As he was passing down a street, he noticed an altar with the inscription, "to the unknown God." Some Athenians were fearful that they were overlooking a god who should be worshiped; therefore, they erected an altar to the unknown god. Paul said, "Whom therefore ye ignorantly worship, him declare I unto you" (Acts 17:23 KJV). Ignorant worship of God will never be acceptable to God.

"Vain" worship is also a danger. When our worship behavior is according to human tradition and not God's Word, then, it is called "vain." Jesus taught this in Matthew 15. Jesus quoted Isaiah's prophesy when he said, "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and

honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matthew 15:8-9). Their human traditions kept them from worshiping God acceptably. Hence, their worship was "vain."

Misdirected worship also fails. When the apostle John saw a glorious angel delivering a message to him, he fell down to worship the angel. The angel immediately responded, "See thou do it not: for I am thy fellowservant, and of thy brethren the prophets, and of them which keep the sayings of this book: worship God" (Revelation 22:9). John's worship was directed toward the wrong person.

Furthermore, Jesus taught the Samaritan woman that the Father seeks worshipers who worship "in spirit and in truth" (John 4:23). The word "spirit" indicates the location of worship, and the word "truth" indicates the behavior in which worship is expressed. To qualify for having successfully worshiped, an individual must have worshiped "in spirit," that is, in the human heart. We may gather in a building, but the worship must happen in the heart of each person. That's right! When we invite someone to "come worship with us," we are inviting them to come together with others to exercise their hearts by worship.

In addition to an individual worshiping in the heart, in order to worship God acceptably, an individual must also have worshiped "in truth," that is according to the truth found in God's Word. Jesus showed that this "truth" has a sanctifying effect upon people. John 17:17 records that He asked God to "sanctify" His disciples—"sanctify them by thy truth, thy word is truth." To sanctify something is to set it apart for a special purpose. Jesus' truth sets people apart as true worshipers who are following a set of specified activities. These worshipful behaviors are known to be acceptable to God. How do we know if worship behavior is acceptable? We know by the Truth—the Word of God—the Bible. Only when we practice these authorized activities are we worshiping in "truth."

The apostle Paul was standing before the Roman governor Felix when he said, "...this I confess unto thee, that after the way which they call heresy, so worship I the God of my fathers, believing all things which

are written in the law and in the prophets..." (Acts 24:14-15). Paul was worshiping God differently than the Jews (his former practice) because of the truth of Jesus being the Christ as witnessed by the law and the prophets. That truth made a difference in Paul's way of worship. It is imperative that Christians who extend invitations to "worship" make sure that the way of worship to which they invite people will be according to the truth in God's Word. God teaches us in His Word, His truth, what actions are acceptable to Him. If we pattern our worship after God's Word, then our worship activities will be acceptable to God.

Consider the benefits of a scripturally authorized way of worship. Scriptural worship engages every worshiper in a God-approved activity. God has granted us freedom to express our heartfelt praise of Him in different words of different songs, different keys, different cadences and different voices. Even the deaf can follow the words and make melody in their hearts. Even the blind can hear the words and be taught and warned. Even the deaf-and-blind can be taught and warned by a song in Braille. Yet, we all join in expressing our hearts' joy by singing; we glorify God and teach and warn each other with poetry that is rooted in truth (Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16), and we have our hearts edified by the praise of God in psalms, hymns and spiritual songs.

When a prayer leader leads us in prayer, we can all join in the thoughts of that common prayer. At one point, the apostle Paul assembled a collection for benevolent purposes; there were some destitute Christians in Jerusalem who needed the help. Interestingly, though, Paul collected these contributions from Gentile Christians! The needy Christians in Jerusalem were Jewish. So, Paul was worried whether the gift would be accepted with thanksgiving. Therefore, he asked the Corinthians to pray... "You also must help us by prayer, so that many will give thanks on our behalf for the blessing granted us through the prayers of many" (2 Corinthians 1:11 ESV). This verse teaches that even Paul's collection was an answer to many prayers. The church prayed when they came together for worship. Likewise, even today in worship services around the world, prayer leaders will invite the providential care of God into our lives and into the lives of even strangers.

When a preacher or teacher speaks, we can all join in the same meditations

and contemplations of God's Word and have our hearts opened and renewed. Lydia's heart was opened when she heard the preaching of Christ (Acts 16:14). Titus 3:5 says, "he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit..." (Titus 3:5 ESV). Ah, that renewal of the Holy Spirit comes through the Spirit's words, as recorded in the Bible.

With a common Supper on the Lord's Day, we can all commune with God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, millions of believers around the world and each other (Matthew 26:29) and have our hearts knit in a common love. Together, we remember the Lord's death until He comes.

Will a church so arrange and so define its way of worship so as to cut off the authorized common ground found in the Scriptures? For instance, those who use mechanical musical instruments in worship do so without New Testament authorization. Those who withhold the "cup" from the worshipers do so without authorization. Those who withhold the whole Supper on the Lord's Day do so without authorization. Yet, many say, "Come worship with us."

Friends, when churches of Christ say, "Come worship with us," we are inviting you to a common, simple worship service where authorized worshipful activities will take place. Who among the population can refuse that invitation on biblical grounds?

It behooves churches of Christ to continue to invite people to a way of worship that is simply rooted in the common ground of the truth of the New Testament. Peter, Barnabas and other Jews separated themselves from Gentile brethren! Paul condemned this practice to Peter's face and said what they were doing was not "according to the truth of the gospel" (Galatians 2:11-14 KJV). Paul was correct in contending for the way of truth that enabled both Jewish and Gentile Christians to commune as well as to worship together. Churches of Christ should continue contending for and providing worship services that are according to the truth of the Gospel [for all, irrespective of ethnic, racial or cultural differences ~ Louis Rushmore, Editor]. ## GOD'S CHOSEN PATH FOR YOU

Your path is dark. Your hope is almost gone. You look ahead and see only blackness. You struggle with making the right choices. You consider giving up. It's not easy. Is this all you have to which to look forward? Is the life of a Christian a bleak, dark walk through a world of despair, never knowing the right way to go?

"And the LORD went before them by day in a pillar of cloud to lead the way, and by night in a pillar of fire to give them light, so as to go by day and night" (Exodus 13:21). In this text, Moses was not the one who chose

when it was time for Israel to depart from Egypt. When he was a young man, Moses believed he would be the deliverer of Israel, but God disagreed about the timing. Moses thought God would deliver



Israel quickly, but He did not. God chose His time for Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt.

When God led Israel out of Egypt, the Israelites could not go any direction they desired. Moses didn't sit down with a map and plot a course. Israel did not vote on an acceptable route and then travel down it. Instead, God presented a pillar of clouds in the sky by day and a pillar of fire by night. Moses and Israel moved by following God's manifestation of His presence.

Jeshua, the High Priest in Nehemiah's day, declared to the people concerning God's actions, "You showed signs and wonders against

Pharaoh, Against all his servants, And against all the people of his land. For You knew that they acted proudly against them. So You made a name for Yourself, as it is this day... Moreover, You led them by day with a cloudy pillar, And by night with a pillar of fire, To give them light on the road Which they should travel" (Nehemiah 9:10, 12).

Centuries after Israel came out of Egypt, Solomon encouraged his son with the following words. "Trust in the LORD with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding; In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths. Do not be wise in your own eyes; Fear the LORD and depart from evil" (Proverbs 3:5-7).

Jeremiah cried out to the Lord and declared:

"O LORD, I know the way of man is not in himself; It is not in man who walks to direct his own steps. O LORD, correct me, but with justice; Not in Your anger, lest You bring me to nothing. Pour out Your fury on the Gentiles, who do not know You, And on the families who do not call on Your name; For they have eaten up Jacob, Devoured him and consumed him, And made his dwelling place desolate" (Jeremiah 10:23-25).

All these passages teach a single and clear lesson from the Old Testament that is still true today. We should not rely upon our own wisdom to determine our paths. If you are a faithful Christian, are you one who seeks God's chosen path for you?

We will not determine God's chosen path for us by voting on a path. We will not resolve the chosen path by reading man's wisdom. We will not determine the right path for our feet when we select the most natural path in life. Israel's path led them to the Red Sea and a guaranteed defeat at the hand of Pharaoh's armies. When you see God's chosen path for you, and you realize that it means a sure defeat for you, will you turn back, will you give up? Let us continue, trusting in the Lord with all our heart and never leaning on our own understanding. "Your word is a lamp to my feet And a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105).

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# Your Speech Betrays You

We were at an elder's house for a New Year's Eve party with others, and the teens and college-age young people were poking fun at me for my southern English. Ask any one of the teens and they'll give you a list of words I say "wrong." At that party, it made me laugh when one of our college students asked if I had "fixed" my pronunciation of "humble." I'm not sure who died and left her in charge of the English language! Leaving off the "h" on humble is a southern pronunciation, not necessarily wrong.

Clearly, though, our speech betrays us — similar to the test given by the Gileadites to the Ephraimites, recorded in Judges 12:1-7. The Ephraimites could not pronounce "Shibboleth." It came out "Sibboleth." Romanians, we learned, have a difficult time pronouncing the "th" sound. Americans have trouble rolling our r's. Our speech betrays us!

It is not just *how* we pronounce words, either. Often, it is the way we say things. While we lived in Romania, our team donated toys and fruit to a children's hospital. We put them in small bags and left them on the beds, if the child was not in the room. One time, I left one on the bed, and in the hall way, was asked about it. I responded, in Romanian, "I left it on the bed." That's how we would say it in English. A little way down the hall, the same thing happened, but I overheard a nurse tell a mom that I left it "at the bed." I did not say anything grammatically or syntactically wrong. It just wasn't the way Romanians would say it. Our speech betrays us!

What does your speech say about you? Do you show by your speech that you love and respect your spouse? Are you rude? Critical? Sarcastic? Snarky? Impatient? Sharp? Insulting? Do you show by your speech that you love and respect your children? Does your speech show you are patient? Loving? Joyful? Peaceful? Kind?

What does your speech say about you? Does it show that you love Jesus? That you follow Him? Is He not far from your lips at any given time? If He dwells in your heart and motivates your life, how can you constantly be rude, critical, sarcastic, etc.?

Consider these proverbs: "The mouth of the righteous brings forth wisdom" (Proverbs 10:31). "The tongue of the wise brings healing" (Proverbs 12:18). "The tongue of the wise commends knowledge" (Proverbs 15:2). "A gentle tongue is a tree of life" (Proverbs 15:4). "Whoever keeps his mouth and his tongue keeps himself out of trouble" (Proverbs 21:23). "The teaching of kindness is on her tongue" (Proverbs 31:26).



"...for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. A good man out of the good treasure of his heart brings forth good things, and an evil man out of the evil treasure brings forth evil things. But I say to you that for every idle word men may speak, they will give account of it in the day of judgment. For by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:34-37).

Remember, your speech betrays you. What is it saying?

# The Importance of Family Prayer Time

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# The Challenges of Young People

Today's young people are overwhelmed by the humongous number of choices before them. What is one of those choices? Sin, in its various forms, is a serious choice confronting young people (Galatians 5:19-21).

Youth is a time of explosive exploration, and thus young people must be given the right guidance and tools in order for them to be successful at overcoming temptations that may ultimately lead to sin (1 Timothy 4:12). Technology has and is continuing to advance, and the average child is hooked on it.

We are all well aware that there are always advantages and disadvantages to things. If you give your child an electronic device from the time he or she can walk and talk without proper management and supervision, most likely 13 years later, it would be practically impossible for you to get that child to put away that device. "The rod and rebuke give wisdom, But a child left to himself brings shame to his mother" (Proverbs 29:15 NKJV). Parents must exercise their duties in a timely and trustworthy manner. Children should not be exposed to toys, habits and situations that would cloud the choices they make later in life. "Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6).

The pivotal role of parents becomes strategic in the lives of youths, specifically teenagers. Ecclesiastes 12:1 reinforces that turning to God when one is young is more beneficial and advantageous compared to later in a person's life; "Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, Before the difficult days come, And the years draw near when you say, 'I have no pleasure in them.'" Young people must be taught to love God and how important it is for God to be active in their lives.

Parents must become proactive in the lives of their young ones so that they can be left with a heritage like Timothy. "When I call to remembrance the genuine faith that is in you, which dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice, and I am persuaded is in you also" (2 Timothy 1:5). Parents, if needs be, must enlist the help of others so that young people are given the best opportunities to live for God. Godliness must start with the simple things. It can never be stressed enough how important family

devotions, Sunday School classes, VBS and such like are, because they give children a spiritual platform on which to stand as they continue to grow.

In addition to the Scriptures, young people must have visible examples who they would want to emulate. In Acts 10:1-2, Cornelius, even though not yet a Christian, was practicing Christian principles. Parents of young people and fellow members of the church must be observed by youths as generous, kind, hospitable and compassionate, whether it is to members or non-members. Not only must they see the examples of adults around them, but it is important that they are encouraged and given the resources and opportunities to do likewise.

The guardians of the young should be able to say what Paul said in 1 Corinthians 11:1—"Imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ." Today's young people want to be noticed, to feel worthy and appreciated. What better way to satisfy these needs than to teach them to have the Good Samaritan attitude? We know that what we do can never be compared to what the Lord has done for us (Psalm 105:2), but we need to imitate Him anyway. One of the mistakes parents make today is telling their children what to do instead of making provisions where the child can see what they ought to do by observing their parents. Parents, what are you really laying up for your children? Material things are only for a time (Matthew 6:19-20).

Parents, are you truly cognizant of the company to which your children cling? As an adult, you can guide your children in choosing the kind of friends with whom you would like them to associate. You can do this by your good influence. This necessitates constant interaction with your children.

Children are smart, and sometimes they think they are smarter than you. That's why it's imperative that a line must be drawn between you being a parent and doing your duties as a parent. The reason Timothy was such a strong, faithful Christian stems from his godly mother and grandmother (2 Timothy 1:5). Paul knew that Timothy was a young man of moral and godly substance. Therefore, parents, we too can raise children who are trustworthy, faithful and dependable.

Your children's friends should share morally and biblically suitable interests in recreation, faith, social events, etc. because they are going to influence and to guide each other. Today's children are interconnected because of technology. Therefore, monitoring friends and activities is an uphill task. Thus, the inherent influence of godliness ought to be foremost in

the minds of parents, especially when their children start to associate with friends. "There is a way that seems right to a man, But its end is the way of death" (Proverbs 14:12).

Young people, God wants everyone in His kingdom, and, yes, that includes you. You're the greatest asset He has to continue the work of His Son, which is to seek and to save the lost (Luke 19:10). You have everything going for you with God right at the helm. You can do every suitable thing you want to do, and yet, you can also do the work of the Lord. It will bring you joy, accomplishment and fulfillment amidst this world that is filled with uncertainty and sinfulness.

There are so many painfully high statistics concerning young people today—statistics that could have been a lot lower or not at all if young people would but for a moment put God first, think about Him or strive to live godly. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God" (Romans 12:1-2).

Alcohol, illicit drugs, lewd music and all kinds of ungodly sexual activities are the going things of the day. However, there is a much better and eternal beneficial course to follow. "For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age, looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself His own special people, zealous for good works" (Titus 2:11-14).

God is pleading with you. Don't imitate your worldly friends! Your life would exhibit hypocrisy if you as a child of God were to do as they do. They may think they are having a good time now, but what about their lot in eternity—and yours if you follow their sinful ways? Their worldly living will harm your soul if you act as they do. Their riotous conduct mocks you as a Christian. Look to God! He's the only one Who counts and by Whom you ought to be guided. God is waiting for your service. Give it to Him, now!

## The Fool's Theme Song

Solomon said much about the fool. The Book of Ecclesiastes has dozens of references to him. Yet, in Ecclesiastes 10:19, Solomon sums up the life philosophy of the fool. This philosophy is described in three statements.

- 1. Men prepare a meal for enjoyment. While enjoying food is not a sin (Ecclesiastes 2:24; 5:18), the fool's selfish, self-gratifying perspective is described here. He has the "it's all about me" philosophy. Maybe he is even guilty of the sin of gluttony. Solomon noted that we "eat for strength" (10:17). Paul said that we should receive food with prayer and gratitude (1 Timothy 4:3-5).
- 2. Wine makes life merry. Only the fool would operate on this shallow, self-seeking perspective. "Happiness at all costs" is his theme. Yet, Solomon pointed out in Chapter 7 that going to a house of mourning was a better choice than going to the house of feasting (Ecclesiastes 7:2, 4). The Bible is filled with warnings about alcohol (Proverbs 20:1). The wise man knows he should avoid drinking it. It will not bring happiness, but instead it will increase one's sorrow.
- 3. Money is the answer to everything. This serves as a fitting wrap-up to the fool's theme song. Riches are deceptive and cannot provide genuine happiness and satisfaction (Ecclesiastes 5:13-17). The fool here is certainly being deceived. Sadly, how many today are deceived with this same foolish belief? The rich fool was (Luke 12:13-21). The rich young ruler was (Matthew 19:16-26). Paul warned that the love of money is a root (or a source) of all kinds of evil (1 Timothy 6:9). History is replete with stories of men and women who had tremendous wealth but died miserable, lonely and godless deaths. Some even committed suicide. Obviously, money will not answer many of life's troubles.

Have we learned anything? We live in a world that has these same warped views. It is a world that embraces the warped philosophy of the "good life." Money, food and alcohol continue to plague us when not viewed correctly.

# Where Two or Three Are Sathered Together

Curiously, some in a congregation have evidently construed something Jesus said to mean that congregations of the church ought to be small, rather than grow in number. The Scripture at the center of this inquiry is, "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). I must profess that I have never heard of such an interpretation of that verse.

Part of the context in which that the phrase "where two or three are gather together" is as follows. "Assuredly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again I say to you that if two of you agree on earth concerning anything that they ask, it will be done for them by My Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:18-20 NKJV). Enough of the context appears here to show that our Lord was speaking exclusively to His apostles. Verse 18 pertains to Christ's authorization of the apostles to speak doctrinally on behalf of God. Elsewhere, the result of

their decisions on behalf of God and directed by the Holy Spirit (2 Peter 1:20-21) was called "the apostles' doctrine" (Acts 2:42).

Usually, even members of the church lift Matthew 18:20 from its context (which they should not do) to teach about the presence of our Lord as Christians assemble to worship. Yes, Jesus, Who possesses all of the qualities of the Godhead, is omnipresent (Psalm 139:7-10; Matthew 28:20), and Jesus further said that He would be present during Christian worship (Matthew 26:29).

Matthew 18:20, though, does not teach that truth. Neither does Matthew 18:20 say anything at all about the size of a local congregation of the Lord's church. On the contrary, occasionally thousands of early Christians assembled together at least sometimes (Acts 2:41; 4:4). The number of disciples assembling were called a "multitude" (Acts 4:32; 5:14; 6:2, 5; 15:12, 30).

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#### Robison's Rubies

Proverbs 22:1 states, "A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, Loving favor rather than silver and gold." Notice

the challenge of the statement. Culture might tempt people to sacrifice character and integrity in order to get ahead financially. A godly challenge is to hold onto character first. Notice the blessing of the statement. In a good name is often found "loving favor," at least by some. While some people hate the truth and its speakers, loving favor will be found in the sight of God and others who follow God's will. Notice the definition of the statement. What makes a good name? Not monetary success. Not riches. Not a good name among men but a good name with the Maker of men. A good name is given one who strives to be right with God. That name will be found in the Book of Life (Philippians 4:3).

## Paul's Placement in the Ministry

One of the greatest aspects about which Paul marveled in his own life was the fact that he, "chief" of all sinners, received forgiveness and ministry through Christ Jesus (1 Timothy 1:15-16). In the paragraph that contains these verses, Paul briefly departed from his warning about false teachers (1 Timothy 10b-11) and exclaimed thankfulness to God for what He had done for him.

And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord who has enabled me, because He counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry, although I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and an insolent man; but I obtained mercy because I did it ignorantly in unbelief. And the grace of our Lord was exceedingly abundant, with faith and love which are in Christ Jesus. This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. However, for this reason I obtained mercy, that in me first Jesus Christ might show all longsuffering, as a pattern to those who are going to believe on Him for everlasting life. (1 Timothy 1:12-16)

#### Jesus Transforms

The words "has enabled...counted...putting" (1 Timothy 1:12) point to a specific time when this reality for Paul occurred. The specific time goes back to the appearance of Jesus to Paul while on the Damascus Road (Acts 9:15-16; 22:14; 26:16-18) and his subsequent conversion in Damascus (Acts 9:6; 22:10, 16; 26:19). Paul mentioned three specific truths for which he was thankful. First, Jesus Christ gave him strength (1 Timothy 1:12a). The word translated "enabled" ["strengthened" NAS] means to strengthen or to make strong. The word describes Abraham, who was "strengthened in faith" (Romans 4:20) and the Christian who is to

"be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might" (Ephesians 6:10). Paul acknowledged, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). This enabling of the Lord sustained Paul, even toward the end of his life when he wrote from his final imprisonment, "At my first defense no one stood with me, but all forsook me...But the Lord stood with me and strengthened me, so that the message might be preached fully through me, and that all the Gentiles might hear" (2 Timothy 4:16-17). Do we draw strength from the Lord?

Second, Paul was thankful that Jesus Christ "counted...[him] faithful." The term "faithful" can mean believing but also carries the idea of being trustworthy and reliable. Faithfulness can describe God, as in the case of Sarah, who "received strength to conceive seed, and she bore a child when she was past the age, because she judged Him faithful who had promised" (Hebrews 11:11). Even Jesus, who was God in human flesh (John 1:1-3, 14), was said to be "faithful to Him [the Father] who appointed Him [the Son]" (Hebrews 3:2).

Faithfulness can also describe people. Paul described Timothy as "my beloved and faithful son in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 4:17). In First Timothy 1:12, Paul was extremely thankful that Jesus was the One who counted him faithful! This echoes Paul's statement earlier about "the glorious gospel of the blessed God which was committed to my trust" (1 Timothy 1:11). Jesus knew Paul to be trustworthy and reliable with the Gospel. Can the Lord say that about us? Are we reliable to Him?

Third, Paul was thankful that "Jesus Christ" put him "into the ministry" (1 Timothy 1:12c). The word translated "putting" generally means to place or put but can also carry the sense of making someone something, appointing or assigning one a place (Luke 12:46). Paul used an exact form of this word when he wrote that God "has committed" ["entrusting" ESV] "to us the word of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:19). God's placing Paul into "the ministry" takes us back to his experience on the Damascus Road and subsequent conversion in Damascus (Acts 9:1-18). He was blinded by a manifestation of the Lord. During that encounter, Paul asked two great questions, "Who are You, Lord?" (Acts 9:5) and "Lord, what do You want"

me to do?" (Acts 9:6a). He, of course, was told, "Arise and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do" (Acts 9:6b).

Along the way, the Lord told Ananias in a vision to seek Saul of Tarsus and teach him (Acts 9:10-12). In response to Ananias' concerns about Saul's reputation, the Lord said, "Go, for he is a chosen vessel of Mine to bear My name before Gentiles, kings, and the children of Israel. For I will show him how many things he must suffer for My name's sake" (Acts 9:15-16). God had a plan! God's placing Paul into "the ministry" also emphasized that Paul was not a self-appointed apostle who was in a position to arrogantly brag. It is also interesting to note that Paul spoke of his appointment to "ministry" ["service" ASV] rather than to apostleship. Yes, Paul was an apostle, just as legitimate as the rest (Galatians 1:10-2:14), but here he emphasized the service aspect of his work. Are you a servant of the Most High God?

All Christians have been transformed by the will of God and the blood of Jesus Christ. Although our conversion and ministry are obviously not like Paul's in every way, we should still be thankful for the transformation of life God effected through our obedience to the Gospel. This new status for Paul was all the more remarkable when considering who he was before conversion.

#### Jesus Targets

Jesus is able to reach even the vilest of sinners (1 Timothy 1:13). Paul was a "blasphemer" not only by speaking against Christ and His church, but also by forcing others to do the same (Acts 26:11). Paul as a persecutor is well documented in Acts (8:3; 9:1-2; 22:4-5; 26:9-11; cf. Galatians 1:13) and serves as the reason why many in the early church were hesitant in receiving him as a brother in Christ (Acts 9:13-14, 26). "An insolent man" ["injurious" KJV; "a violent aggressor" NAS] refers to one who is violent with the idea of being boldly disrespectful and impudent (Bauer 832). Paul not only opposed Christianity, but he did so violently! However, Paul's former life was targeted with the super-abundant grace that was poured upon him that resulted in his present standing before God! He "obtained mercy"! This is not teaching some form of unconditional election, but as Paul elsewhere confirmed, obtaining

mercy from God only comes as a result of being faithful in Him (Romans 11:30-31; 1 Corinthians 7:25; 2 Corinthians 4:1).

Additionally, Paul received mercy because he "did it ignorantly in unbelief" (1 Timothy 1:13). This clause is often taken out of context to teach false theories about amenability. This verse does not support the unaccountable for sin theory of a sincere sinner outside of Christ! The statement alludes to Numbers 15:23-31, where Moses compared "unintentionally committed" ["committed by ignorance" KJV] sin and "presumptuously" committed sin.

In Judaism, as well as in the New Covenant, there was no atonement for presumptuous sin (Numbers 15:23-31; cf. Hebrews 10:26). Paul mentioned the fact to explain how his life prior to conversion became the object of God's mercy rather than His wrath. Paul acted in "good conscience" while he sinned against Christ (Acts 23:1; 2 Timothy 1:3). Although he was lost, Paul at least thought he was serving God. His main problem was that he did not believe that Jesus was truly the Son of God. Paul changed his view about Christ on the Damascus Road, and this change of mind ultimately resulted in his obedience to the Gospel. Had Paul been in "presumptuous" sin while persecuting the church of Christ, he never would have come to repentance. No one can have "godly sorrow" while at the same time willfully resisting God (2 Corinthians 7:8-11).

#### Conclusion

One reason Christ saved Paul was to set him as a *template* for others to follow (1 Timothy 1:16). The word translated "*pattern*" refers to a prototype, standard or example. God's "*longsuffering*" is His willingness to forebear the sins of people (Exodus 34:6; Numbers 14:8). This willingness has been clearly manifested through the sending of His Son to save even the worst of sinners. If God can save a sinner like Paul and place him in the ministry, then He can save and place into His service any sinner who, like Paul, gives himself or herself over to the Lord! Have we allowed the Gospel of Jesus Christ to target and transform our lives?

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## What Oid You Come to See?

Sometimes our expectations are not met, which can be discouraging. When we examine what has happened, it may be that our expectations were off. Take for example what Jesus said of John the Baptist.

What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? But what did you go out to see? A man clothed in soft garments? Indeed those who are gorgeously appareled and live in luxury are in kings' courts. But what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I say to you, and more than a prophet. This is he of whom it is written: "Behold, I send My messenger before Your face, Who will prepare Your way before You." For I say to you, among those born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist; but he who is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he. (Luke 7:24-28 NKJV)



John was none of the things that people might have expected.

Instead, he was a unique individual with a unique role. John was considered the greatest among the prophets, but he was lesser than the least in the kingdom. How could this be? The prophets' messages included a forward-looking view to the coming of the Messiah, but John was the appointed harbinger of the Messiah's arrival (Matthew 3:1-4). Since John died before the Messiah's kingdom was established, he was not in the kingdom. So, the reference to "least" and "greatest" was one of chronology. Jesus certainly gave John high praise!

An interesting observation about both Jesus and John is that neither of them appeared to be the kind of messiah or herald the people were anticipating. This did not keep Jesus and John from fulfilling their missions, even though people's expectations were not realized.

Could it be that our expectations are the issue rather than some other solution to meet our expectations? The fact is that many of the preachers of the New Testament would not be welcomed in our pulpits today because they do not fit the profile of what we sometimes expect a preacher ought to be. The apostle Paul is nearly the exact opposite of what I read in the preacher-search ads—he was unmarried and imprisoned!


children, but we can forsake Him. Oh, how tragic when that happens!

### The Long Road to Restoration

#### Introduction

The church of Christ did not come into existence by accident or as an afterthought in the mind of God. The blessed body over which Christ is Head was promised and prophesied long before the first penitent believers were added to the church on Pentecost. The preciousness of the church is seen in the purchase price, the blood of the sinless Son of God, who loved His spiritual bride supremely, and gave Himself for her (Ephesians 5:25).

Not only was the church purchased with the precious blood of the Lamb, but it came with a pattern or a blueprint. The pattern for the church was as specific as those given for the tabernacle and the temple, institutions that were but shadows of God's present and permanent house, the church of the living God. The early church worked and worshipped according to the pattern revealed in the New Testament. However, as predicted in Scripture, departures came, first in the area of the organization of the church. Departures resulted in the establishment of Roman Catholicism. The very evil that Paul had predicted reared its ugly and divisive head (1 Timothy 4:2; 2 Thessalonians 2:1-4).

[This does not mean that remnants of true Christianity failed to persist through the centuries, though largely ignored by popular historical records. ~ Louis Rushmore, Editor]

There were men in the sixteenth century who rose up in opposition to the spiritual decadence brought on by Catholicism. However, their goals were to reform that existing apostate institution, rather than to restore the church from which the apostate body had digressed. The sincere but misguided efforts of Martin Luther and others resulted in further divisions as new denominations arose in which adherents pledged their allegiance to manmade creeds and traditions.

#### Seed Versus Succession

Just as the road to ruination for the church in many places did not occur overnight, the road to restoration would be a long one, indeed. It would begin with a belief in the valid biblical principle that "the seed is the word of God"

(Luke 8:11). Successfully tracing the church's existence back to Pentecost Day is not necessary when one recognizes this crucial truth. Planting the seed of the kingdom in the present age produces a crop of Christians identical to what sprang up on Pentecost when the Gospel was first preached. It was this realization, in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, that led honest men and women down the long road to restoration.

#### From Ecumenism to Exclusivism

In the late summer of 1801, Calvinism dominated the religious scene as thousands of worshippers converged on Cane Ridge in Kentucky for a revival that would become a turning point in the Restoration Movement in America. It was at Cane Ridge that Barton W. Stone publicly expressed his conviction that the Gospel was for all, an affront to the Calvinistic thinking so prevalent in that day. Stone's declaration ultimately led to his departure from the Presbyterian Synod of Kentucky and to the establishment of the Springfield Presbytery. However, Stone and the others who began the new presbytery soon realized that it had no more scriptural authority to exist than their former one. So, in 1804, Stone, along with the other organizers of the new association, published *The Last Will and Testament of the Springfield Presbytery*, vowing to abandon human creeds and to follow only the Bible.

It is significant to note that such sentiments were not being expressed exclusively by Barton Stone and those associated with him. Simultaneous movements toward a return to New Testament authority were occurring independently in other parts of America and beyond her borders. Men like James O'Kelly, Elias Smith and Abner Jones were initiating efforts that would help lead to a return to the New Testament pattern, and in Ireland and Scotland independent movements toward a return to the primitive order were underway. While both Thomas and Alexander Campbell would emerge as great leaders in the movement, theirs were not the first efforts made toward restoration. Yes, it would be a long journey to a complete return to the pure pattern of the New Testament, but the journey had surely begun!

The fact that several independent movements toward restoration occurred around this time is reassuring. It proves conclusively that a pattern could be perceived by honest seekers of truth who had never met

each other but who could recognize the specific teachings of Scripture and who could appreciate the principle stated earlier: "The seed is the word of God." Their dedication to that truth ultimately led to the restoration of the one church for which Jesus died.



It is a long road from ecumenism [indiscriminately inclusive] to exclusivism. It is a journey many in the past were willing to make but which many today will not begin. Most people scoff at the idea of an exclusive body of saved believers who must remain in that body to be saved ultimately in Heaven. While the New Testament church has been restored, the divisive and destructive influence of denominationalism is still powerful and pervasive. It seeks to lead us back down the road to ruination, a road well-traveled by the early apostates who corrupted the church in former days. Even from within the body of Christ, there are those now rising up to ridicule the **exclusivism** that they define as too narrow and overly restrictive.

However, let us remember that the church described in the New Testament is exclusive. There is one body with one Head, Jesus Christ

(Ephesians 1:22-23; 4:4). Only those who are obedient to the exclusive terms of admission are added to the body (Acts 2:37-38, 41, 47). The saved are in the body and nowhere else (Ephesians 5:23). It is the one body, also called the kingdom, that will be delivered up to the Father one day by the Lord Himself (I Corinthians 15:24). These great truths about the church prompted people to question the ecumenical thinking and practice of their time and to begin their return to the exclusive teaching of the New Testament.

#### Movement and Maintenance

As others have well said, we do not reverence the restorers, but we respect them for their courage and determination to travel a road fraught with dangers and discouragement. While we benefit in this generation from their sacrifices, we do not owe our existence to the so-called *American Restoration Movement*. Christians of every generation owe their existence to the gracious God of Heaven Who has preserved the seed throughout time so that honest men might seek it and obey it.

If by "movement," we mean progress toward a goal, then the Restoration Movement, in a sense, is over for some. The restoration goal has become reality for those who are part of the restored New Testament church. Such are members of the kingdom that will never be destroyed and which will always exist, in seed form at least, until the end of time. However, the maintenance must be ongoing, and disciples must diligently preserve and protect the restored pattern. Since proper maintenance of the New Testament pattern involves the responsibility to "make disciples" (Matthew 28:19), we must continue to plead with those around us to return to the pure pattern that they might know the singular blessings of undenominational Christianity. Ours is not only a charge to protect the Gospel but to "preach the gospel to every creature" on earth (Mark 16:15-16)!

# CHRIST GAVE HIMSBLF FOR ME8

"I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Galatians 2:20 NKJV)


The ancient Persians invented crucifixion about 300-400 B.C. It is probably the most painful death ever invented by humans. The English word "excruciating" is derived from crucifixion, acknowledging it as a form of slow, painful suffering. Paul spoke of crucifixion many times in the New Testament (1 Corinthians 1:18, 21, 23). The cross is the central event in the history of time!

- Christ gave His back to be scourged for me (John 19:1). The brutal act of scourging had three purposes. First, it was used to beat the prisoner as a form of punishment. Second, it was used to extract a confession from the prisoner. Finally, in cases of crucifixion, it was used to weaken the victim so he would die more quickly on the cross. Historically, it was when a person was whipped as punishment.
- Christ gave His head to wear a crown of thorns for me (John 19:2). While a crown of thorns was exceedingly painful, it was more about mockery than it was about pain. The Roman soldiers used it as a symbol of royalty and turned it into something painful and degrading. The thorn plant that was used to make the "crown of thorns" that was placed upon Jesus' head is believed to be a plant called the "Euphorbia milii."
- Christ gave His face to be slapped for me (John 19:3). Isaiah foretold of the Chosen One being slapped and the hairs of His beard being pulled out of His face (Isaiah 50:6). Christ taught, "turn the other check," and He practiced perfectly what He preached (John 18:19-34)!

- Christ gave His shoulders to carry the cross for me (John 19:17). He carried the instrument of His own punishment. The cross, which weighed 300-400 pounds, would have been too heavy for anyone to carry or drag any distance. Even in His weakened condition, Jesus carried it as far as He could. Each step He took, He took for us!
- Christ gave His hands and feet to be nailed for me (Psalm 22:16). In 1968, scientists for the first time discovered the remains of a man cru-

cified in Jesus' era. The victim was nailed to the cross in a sitting position, both legs over sideways, with the nail penetrating the sides of both feet just below the heel. The arms were stretched out, each



stabbed by a nail in the forearm. Jesus hung on the cross on Friday for six hours (9 a.m.-3 p.m.).

- Christ gave His body to be crucified for me (1 Peter 2:24). As Jesus hung on the cross, the weight of His body pulled down on the diaphragm, and the air moved into His lungs and remained there. He had to push up on His nailed feet (causing more pain) to exhale. In order to speak, air must pass over the vocal cords during exhalation. The Gospel records note that Jesus spoke seven times from the cross. It is amazing that despite His pain, He pushed up to say, "Forgive them" (Luke 23:34). He loved until the end!
- Christ gave His side to be stabbed for me (John 19:34). A soldier pierced Jesus' side to assure that He was dead, and "blood and water came out" (John 19:34), referring to the watery fluid surrounding the heart and lungs. This was a cruel act by a cruel man.

# YOUR FATHERS TEMPTED ME TEN TIMES

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews encouraged Jewish Christians to remain faithful to Christ. They were being influenced to go back to the Old Law. The writer warned Christians that disobedience brings negative judgment from God.

Hebrews 3:8-9 reads, "Harden not your hearts, as in the provocation, in the day of temptation in the wilderness: When your fathers tempted me, proved me, and saw my works forty years." The specific reference is to Exodus 17 and is a quote of the Septuagint of Psalm 95:8. It describes one of the times after the Israelites came out of Egypt that they complained to God.

In Numbers 14:22, God told the Israelites they had tempted Him ten times. Because of the ten times (which is the same number of plagues that God had brought on the Egyptians), God would make them wander for a total of 40 years. (Deuteronomy 2:14 says it was 38 more years from the time God made His statement of condemnation.)

God does not specifically mention the ten incidents. However, there are ten incidents recorded (Exodus 6:9-12; 14:10-12; 15: 23-26; 16; 17:1-7; 32; Numbers 11:1, 4-33; 12:1-15; 14). We do not know if these are the exact ones that God meant, but it is curious that Moses recorded these. The point is still true: God is patient but will bring negative judgment on those who disobey. He did so under the Old Covenant, and He will do so under the New Covenant. Study your Bible. Learn all you can about God. Make sure you obey Him. If any of this is hard to understand, ask an adult to help you.

### Will Foreign Mission Methods Work in the United States?

According to a recent article, 80% of all churches number 100 or less in attendance. Certainly this would be true of the Lord's church, if the figures in *Where the Saints Meet* are reliable.

This means that many Christians have a home situation where the church is small and often inadequate to meet the local spiritual needs. The leadership may not be dynamic. The preacher may be young and inexperienced and perhaps less effective in his work than those employed by the larger congregations. The program of activities may include little more than the basic worship services. A wide range of ages may be lumped together in classes for lack of teachers. Because of spiritual inactivity, there may be bickering, lukewarmness and worldliness, making the congregation a poor example of Christianity in the community.

In short, the local situation may leave many Christians totally discouraged about the future of their home congregation. Must such a negative picture continue? Must the church remain small? Is it possible to overcome the inadequacies and to grow?

Look at a foreign setting for a minute. A family goes into a pagan country where the church doesn't exist. There is no large body of believers to attract newcomers. There are no exciting activities to offer. There is no range of well-organized and well-attended classes to draw others. The group may even meet in the missionary's home or in some temporary rental place.

Nothing about the situation seems designed for the actual building of a nucleus of believers, yet it happens. Why is the missionary able to do what seems so difficult for already established congregations here at home?

I suggest that at least part of the answer lies in basic and often subtle differences in outlook. It doesn't take much—a little here and a little there —to add up to a completely different total.

#### Why can people be converted in mission areas?

- Because the missionary has staked his life's work on the belief that the Truth he is offering is needed and wanted, and so he goes out, asking God's help in locating those who are looking for Him, and he *expects* to make converts.
- Because he focuses the attention of his students (as well as his own) on God and the Truth they must have rather than the fellowship they may lack as they become new Christians.
- Because the missionary knows that diligent and persistent outreach is necessary to contact the unreached souls who will be responsive.

## How do these attitudes differ from the typical outlook of American Christians in a discouraging local setting?

- We are convinced that religious pleas are not wanted these days. We don't expect positive response to our spiritual overtures.
- We compare ourselves, congregationally, with local denominations and feel that we have too little to offer.
- We, ourselves, listen to our negative reasoning, and so we don't go out diligently and persistently, *prayerfully* looking for those who want to learn.

**Must such a negative picture continue?** No. The picture will change when our own attitudes change. Part of the problem that prevents us from teaching and winning the lost is *our mind-set*, not their refusal to hear.

Recent surveys confirm that more than half of the American people don't regularly participate in any church. A Gallup Poll study says that 54% of the "unchurched" would be willing to be members of a church. What they lack is the teaching and the encouragement offered by someone who already has spiritual commitment.

## Putting these figures together, do we realize what they are saying?

- The "churched" may be *satisfied*, even *polarized*, where they are.
- American society has grown steadily away from spiritual anchors since the 60's. A whole generation has grown up without those strengths or those biases for or against truth. That generation's children have grown up with the pendulum ready to begin swinging back, and many of them are open to teaching. This doesn't mean that *masses* can be *quickly* and *easily* converted, but it does mean that, one by one, conversions can be made.
- If one-half of the population is "unchurched," and if one-half of that number is willing to be "churched," then, potentially, one out of every four people might be won to Christ!
- As I have conversed with various ones during the past week, three different parents have told me of their teenagers initiating a return to religion for the whole family. One lady said, "My daughter is really searching. She told me the other day, 'Mother, it doesn't matter to me where we go, but I want us to start going to worship somewhere together." Yesterday a man said, "I was brought up going to church but the teachers in my high school years talked more about sports than the Bible, and so I dropped out. My son is a teenager now, and last year he started going to Bible School and joined the church. He kept after me, and so I went back a few weeks ago." Another lady said, "Our boys just insisted that they wanted to be in classes somewhere. We are going with them some now."
- The times are changing always, and we need to keep ourselves aware of those changes. The negative response to truth that seemed widely characteristic during the 60's and 70's is not necessarily what we will see today. Of course, our Lord's statement that the way is narrow and that there will be few to find it will always be true. Yet, another of His observations is true also: "the fields...are...white for harvest." In its own way, the era of a-spirituality has served to create in some hearts a new realization of the need for God, largely free of pre-established biases. We must open our eyes to these facts and seize the opportunities that are before us now.

There are cycles in human behavior. Because of the divisions among believers in Christ, because of indifference on the part of too many Christians, because of humanistic and atheistic teachings from every direction, because of affluence and materialism, much of the developed world is not greatly concerned about religion. Yet, in spite of these factors, religious groups that are out actively teaching are growing. Even Middle Eastern and Eastern mystical religions are mushrooming in growth among Americans. The spiritual vacuum is being felt in lives—the problem is that it is being filled with garbage instead of the righteousness of God.

## How can we go about reversing the negative trends in the church?

- **Pray. Work. Pray. Work. Pray. Work. Pray. Work.** There is no substitute for these two essentials for success.
- Take inventory of the activities of the congregation. Listen to the announcements. Do they concern—bottom line—"play" activities for the youth and teens, and "busy work" involvement for adults? "Playing" will not assure spiritual maturing and faithfulness, but bearing fruit through teaching and converting others, and through nourishing weak or new Christians will invariably strengthen the workers as well.
- **Encourage individual fellowship with Christians** in their homes and yours, praying and planning together. Let your conversation be about spiritual things rather than sports, work or school. Suggest ideas and work that can be done; talk them up and set about getting others involved. Develop training sessions for those who lack confidence in their ability to teach. Remember, if you are working and you get one other person started working, you have doubled the work force! Develop a close spiritual relationship in the church in these ways, and watch for the good changes to come.
- Realize that we don't have to be the largest group to have something to offer. If community people can see a caring quality about Christianity, a Christ-like love and oneness, if they can be taught to recognize truth, then negative factors will not be the deciding factors.
  - Use all scriptural methods in your hands to improve the local

**congregation.** Keep your eye on God and on the goal; persevere, and be always prayerful about God's work through you and about any changes in methods that need to be made.

- **Ask God to help you find those who are looking for the truth,** and then make the formal commitment to keep yourself regularly involved in a study with some non-Christian.
- In conversations, **look for spiritual openings**, and then follow through on them.
- When the setting seems right, just take the plunge and ask the person for a regular weekly study time so that the two of you can learn together.
- **Be concerned with the personal and emotional needs around you.** Too often we want to work with those whose only needed change in life is baptism and, presto, we have "instant Christians"! If we are looking only for that type of person to teach, we won't find many opportunities. Jesus said He came to call sinners to repentance, and He was accused of associating with people who would contaminate Him. He didn't have a lot of time for the Pharisees and the Sadducees, the *most righteous* people in the religious world, because most of them didn't have time for Him.

Today, the world is full of problems, and people really need the solutions given in God's Word. We, standing in Christ's stead, must involve ourselves with those who need us. We must be willing to use our homes, our food, our cars, our money, our abilities, our families, our time and our everything in God's service. With this attitude, we will have continual opportunities to teach. Our problem will be lack of time and strength, not lack of students.

Do we really want to reverse the negative trends in the church? Do we really want individual Christians and the church to grow? It can happen. The trend can be turned around. Working with God, we can do it. The choice is ours, and the resulting unspeakable happiness will also be ours when we get up and get involved.

# Noting Your Bible



#### God's Will

What is the will of God? Second Peter 1:3 tells us that we have "all things that pertain to life and godliness." God has given us His complete Word, "the faith, once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3). Therein, we find God's will for mankind. Open your Bible and begin by writing somewhere in the front: "God's Will," and let's explore this topic further.

- In the front of your Bible, next to, "God's Will," write: "Ephesians 1:3-12." Turn to Ephesians 1 and next to these verses, note: "God has made known His will in Christ (see Matthew 7:21)."
- 2. Turn to Matthew 7:21, and note: "Jesus said one must do the will of God in order to enter the kingdom (see John 5:30)."
- 3. In John 5:30, note here: "Jesus did God's will in everything and expects me to do the same (see Hebrews 10:36)."
- 4. Turn to Hebrews 10:36 and in the context of verses 35–39 write: "endure in doing God's will to receive salvation (see 13:21)."
- 5. Go to Hebrews 13:21 noting: "God helps us through Jesus to be complete in His will (also Colossians 4:12) (see 1 John 2:17)."
- 6. In 1 John 2:17, write: "Doing God's will = eternal life; Praise God! (see 1 Thessalonians 5:18)."
- 7. Turn to 1 Thessalonians 5:18 and note: "God wants me to be thankful in all things (see 4:3)."
- 8. In 1 Thessalonians 4:3, write: "God's will is sexual purity in my life (see 1 Peter 4:2)."
- 9. Go to 1 Peter 4:2 and note: "Live for the will of God, not for the lust of the flesh (see Ephesians 6:6)."

- 10. In Ephesians 6:6, write: "Seeking God's will starts with the heart/mind (see Romans 12:2)."
- 11. Next to Romans 12:2, note: "Doing God's will leads to a transformed life (see Luke 7:30)."
- 12. Turn to Luke 7:30 and write: "Don't reject God's will (see 2 Corinthians 8:5)." Also, note in the context of Luke 7, if rejecting John's baptism proved spiritually fatal for those at that time, then what of rejecting Christ's now (Mark 16:16)?
- 13. In 2 Corinthians 8:5, note: "Give yourself to the Lord by following His will (see 1 Peter 2:15)."
- 14. In the context of 1 Peter 2:13-17, write: "Submitting to my country's government is God's will (see 4:19)."
- 15. Next to 1 Peter 4:19, in the context of verses 12-17, write: "I may suffer for doing God's will; remember He is faithful (also 3:17) (see 1 John 5:14)." You may want to circle or highlight verses 13-16 of 1 Peter 4 as it gives us the reason for remaining faithful through suffering.
- 16. Turn to 1 John 5:14 and note: "He hears my petitions as I pray according to His will; walking in His light (1 John 1:7)." Let us always proclaim in word and deed: "Your will be done, Father; not mine."
